

[[The Bankruptcy Act, 1869.

In the County Court of Staffordshire, holden at Stoke-upon-Trent and Longton.

In the Matter of Henry Jenkinson and John Jenkinson, of Fenton, in the county of Stafford, Joiners and Builders, Bankrupts.

UPON reading a report of the Trustees of the property of the bankrupts, dated the 20th day of May, 1880, reporting that the debtors in their statement of affairs showed assets estimated to produce £151 10s., as follows:— Under a former petition filed by them a composition of 7s. 6d. in the pound was arranged by the creditors, and after the registration of the resolutions passed under that petition, all their stock-in-trade and effects were sold by auction for the purpose, as they believed, of providing for the composition, and they then estimated that the following sums of money were in the hands of Mr. Edmund Tennant, their former Solicitor, or Mr. Charles Butters, the Auctioneer employed by him:—Amount realized by sale of stock, £108; book debts, estimated to produce £40; debts received from Jackson, Fenton, £6; debt received from Lees, Sand Dealer, £4; debt received from Watson, Fenton Park, £18; debt and costs received from Hammond, Fenton, say £64—£240. And the Court being satisfied that the Trustees have fully gone into the matter with the said Edmund Tennant and Charles Butters, and find that instead of any money being owing by them to the estate the debtors owe them money, and that they have not realized any estate and cannot discover any, doth order and declare that the bankruptcy of the said Henry Jenkinson and John Jenkinson has closed.—Given under the Seal of the Court this 31st day of May, 1880.
