(3). Transfers from one department of the Public Service to another will, in respect of fees, be treated as if they were new and original appointments, unless the Treasury otherwise directs by notice in writing to the Civil Service Commissioners that the transfer was made exclusively on public grounds.

**W**HEREAS the population of the said township of Sowerby, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons;

And whereas at a Meeting of the Vestry of the said township, held, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the 3rd day of June, 1880, it was resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to issue an Order under their Seal of Office, directing that the Act passed on the 5th August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vic., c. 57), entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and put in force within this township, as regards that portion of it only which relates to the providing of accommodation for holding Vestry Meetings.”

And whereas the Overseers of the Poor of the said township have made application in writing to the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above resolution:

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:

**ARTICLE I.**—So much of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,” as relates to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding Vestry or other Meetings, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said township of Sowerby.

**ARTICLE II.**—A copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette by the Overseers of the Poor of the said township.
