## From Thuriday, April 2. to Monday, April 6. 1668,

Falmouth , March 29.

His day arrived here three English thips, one from Barbado's, a fecond from the Maddra's, and the third from Malaga; the last affirming that three of the Smirna thips put out to fea a day before flie came from thence, and may be fuddenly expected on the Coasts.

**Plymouth**, March 31. The Antelope is full here taking in provisions. Yester 'ay came in a Flyboat of 400 Tuns from London, and this day three small ships of this place from St. Malo's and Morlaix.

Lyne, April 1. The 30th and 31th paft arived the Samuel from Crojick, laden with Salt, the King-Fifher from St. Malo's, an i Francis f om Morlaix, with Linnen Cloth; bringing little News befides the French preparations both by land and sea, and their great expectation of success against the Spaniards in the Netherlands.

Weymouth, April 1. Two Veffels yesterday atrived from Cherbourg in France, advertise us that the French are still raising forces in those parts, to be sent into the Netherlands; but that their general discourse is of a speedy Peace with Spaim

Portfmouth, April 2. Yesterday the Montague and Briftol were launched out of the dry Dock, and will be in little time fitted out to lea., The Ruby is now brought into the Dock, and will be in few dayes ready to follow.

Naples, Mars. 13. The five Gallies which went lately from hence with fix Companies of Spanifh Foot, to place in exchange in the room of lome other Companies in Garrilon on the Coafts of Tulcany, are hither returned, with the faid excha ged Infantry, which are here emploied in Ostriion. Several finips are lately arrived here, be onging ro Holland and other places. In few days may be expected here a part of the Spanish Fleet, with whom are to be joyned the Sollies belon, ing to this place. The Princes di Belochere and di Santo Giorgio being in the thean while emploied in levying men to be put aboard them.

, Much pains has been taken to find out thole per ons which lately marthered the Prince di Caffiglione, but hone are yet difequered; nor can it yet be imagined on what occasion shey were moved to commit lo barbarous a fact.

Venice, Mar. 24. About the end of the last week, divers of the great pieces of Canon, which were lately cash in the Arlenal, were taken thence, and fent away to be put aboard, -the two new thips, called, the Triumphant Lion, and the Thundering 14 ariour, which are now wall equipped and rea-dy to take them in, and may in little time let fail for the Levant with S. ignior Cattarin Corners in Quality of Proveditor Extraordinary to the Armata, and divers other Captains who have lately taken Employments in the fervice, and amongit others, the Marquils de Montbran, who is now here incagnito, making up his Train to appear with the greater splendor before the Duke, and to receive fuch Ordees as that he given him in relation to his emp oyment in Can lis, in the room of the Marquil's Pilla, why is to return into Savoy to attend the command of the Duke 3 befides those thips which are to be fent away upon the publique account, divers other new fhips are feiting out upon the expenses of private perfons, and are taking in Men and Accommunition to be, fent into the Levent, and to be employed, in the Elect. The greet Convoy 'is believed wil not be ready to pals for Gandia till the end of the next month, in the mean while we are daily fonding away know vellels, with labourers and necellaries, who are all orders ed to pals by the way of Zaute, and from thence to take their opportunities of putting into Candia.

From Conflattinople we have frequent Advice of the great preparations made by the Grand reignior for the catrying on of the war in Gandia, wherein he re olves to employ all the force he is is able both by Sea and Land; He lately ordered two Chiaules to Tunis and other parts of Barbary to require their affiftance with what thips could be fpared from thence, but they have hitherto defired to be exculed, having full employment for all their flips, and finding a great want of flaves to furnifh thole they have. The Seignior André Valler Proveditor of Zant, having been made choice of the employ'd as Europe from this Republick to the Ottoman Court, by Letters to the Senate hath delived to be excuted, pretending his incapacity; but this not latisfying the Senate, his diffatches will be fuddenly fent him with Orders to fet forwards upon the seccipt of them.

Young General sparr a German, is lettely entertain'd in the fervice of this Republique, to command as General of the Forreign forces employed in *Candia*, with an annual Penfion of four thouland Ducats; and General Vertmiller, as 'tis I id, to be fette into Datmatia; where Proveditor Priuli being perfectly referred to his health, is again returned to the extercile of his Charge, visiting the Frontietts and feturing the Country both from the fword and the prisque of the Enerny!

Vienna, March 26. The late progress of the French In Franche Comte, and their great preparations for the next

ampagne, obliges the Emperour to order some Regiments to draw down towards Tyroll and the adjoyning Countriers, and to take Order for the fecurity of Alfatia and Brifgord, from whence the Commissian Majettie, Command villeted the most confi etable places which are under the Emperours Jurildiction, and is now g ne to give an account chereof to the Court at Micultade.

On Sunday laft *Te Deam* was lung here f r the happy Peace concluded between Spain and Portugal, the Spanish Amballadour demonstrating the welcome of that pleasing News, by exhibiting two rountains of Wine to the people, wi irother expressions of joy usually observed on such occations.

Yellerday arrived here from kuzb the Count de Monteonculi, fonie what ill with an ApopleCical diffemper.

The States of the Lower Anitria have freely advanced the fum of 50005 Rixdollers y towards the oxpetient of the re building of the Empreses Pallace y lately ruined by fire ; and trisfaid this Give has also refolved to follow that example.

The Director of the Levans Company is daily here expected, with great quanchies of sich Meschandizes from Turky.

Some dayes tinde the Deputies from the apprt Hungary hud an Audience from the Amperour ; from which they were diffield with much larisfiction. The Turks about Arshaufel are putfuing their deliga of building Stables next the City for great numbers of Horles, which gives a jeakonfe to the neighbouring prises.

Bafle, Mart. 29. Hague, April 6. We are daily expecting the refolution of Spain touching the giving up of the Upper part of Guelderland, Damme, St Donas, an the Foit I fabella, as fecurity for a lum of moneys which is to be advanced from hence tor their fervice, which 'tis faid is concluded on alteady here 5, but the farther Ratification expected from the Marquils de Castel Rodrigo, and the Queen Regent of Spain.

The Plenipotentiaries begin now to repair to Aix la Chappelle, there being already arrived Monlieur Colbert from France, the Baron de Bergeick from Flanders, and the Heer Hieronimus Van Beverningh from the States General of those United Provinces; the other M nifters concerned may in little time appear also, and give beginning to the Treaty.

The Negotiation with Swede and feems well nigh conelu led, which, if occation requires, may affilt the other Mediators, with an Army of five thousand Horle, and leven thousand Foor.

Our forces begin now to draw tow rds their Rendezvous. On Wednefday four Companies of our Foot Guards marched away towards Bergoproom. The four Troops of the Horfe Guard, are as yet here, but mys in few dayes be in treadure's to follow them; and a Company commanded by Captain Limburg be placed here in Garriloa.

The States of Holiand and Well-Brieffund are now again affembled; and a e nominating Captains and other Officets for the New Levies, befider the Regiment of near 1600 Foot, which is to be the magned by Field-Marefhall Wurts, he is like wife to have one Company of Dragoons to attend his Orders.

The Deputies of the Admiralty have Orders to fit out the Fleet with a l convenient speed, which is to confiss of 48 Men of War, from 40 to 70 Guns a-piece, befides 12 Imali Frigats of 16 Guns a piece, with farther charge that care may be t-ken to put the rest of our Ships in such a poflure, that they may be ready to put to sea upon short warming. The Squadron of Amsterdam are most of them ready, we being told that the greater ships have taken the opportunity of the high I i cs, and have already passed the Pampus, and that above an hundred statist lie before that City, to convey fouldiers and necessaries for the Atmy to the Rendezvous appointed neer Berg-op-200m.

They fatther tell us, that the Bishop of Munster fornewhat focuples the passage of the Luneabourg Forces thorow his Territories, but his Categorical Answer to that Point will be speedily required: That the Bishop of Paderborne is confi med in the Coadjutorship of Munster, notwithslanding the Opposition made against him by the Chapter in the behalf of the Bishop of Gologne; and that the Bishop of Munfer had bein great part of his Forces to the Frontiers, and "awas believed a War might in thort time break out between them upon that account.

*Hegees-April 9.* The Spanish Ambassador having some days since received a Memorial from France, that His Most Ch islian Majesty has been contented to continue the Ceffation of Arms til the tenth of this month, thought fit to communicate it to the States, but they having not yet any great confidence of the Negotiations in France and other parts in relation to the Tr aty, are with much diligence putting their Military affins both by Sea and Land into the beft pofture they may, their forces are upon their march towards Zurphin and Berg-op-fom, the feveral places appointed for their Rendezvous, where they intend to form two flying Armiesto march as occasion may offer it felf for the defence of the frontiers. Loa and has now contented to the Leavy of the 12000 men, formerly re olved on by the States General, and Commiffions are giving out to the Officers cholen to command thema.

The Lunenburg forces are ready to begin their march, but 'tis faid that the Bill op of Man 'er refules them palfage through his Countrey, the certainty whereof we daily expect from the Here Ameronghen, who is before this arrived there, to know his refolu ion in that particular.

Pruffells, April 10. A Courrier arriving here from Madrid, brings with him an Approbation or Ratifica ion of the Alternative accepted of by the Marquils de Caffel Rodr go, with a full power to fign the Project offered by the Frenchs in order to a Peace, who has thereupon been willing to fend his Commiffion to the Ministers of His Majefty of Great Brittain, and the Stars General of the United Provinces, now at Paths, for the figung thereof; which gives us some hopes that the Negoritations b tween the two-Crowns, may have an happy illues for the refloring peace again to thele Countries.

The fame Courrier adviles us that Don Fuan parted the 25th paft from Madrid, in order to lus Voyage to thefe parts,

We are with much diligence haftning t e New Fortifications of this place, re-viewing our Forces, and putting all things into the belt Polture we are able for our defence s and already 60 o of the Dutch Fo t are marching to a Camp not far diffant from this City, that they may be there in readiness to obey fu h Orde s as shall be thought convenient to give them, should the Forces make any confiderable advance this way.

Paris, April it. A Court riving here from the Count de Guiche at Bilache, inform d his Majefty that Don Fuan was put to f. a with 20000 Spaniards bound for the Netherlands; but that a from aufing had disperfed them, obliging two of the Fleet to come to an Anchor upon the Coast of Fifcay.

From Rockelle they write that the Duke de Beanfort is lately put in there with 10 Men of War and 4 Firethips.

London. April 4. This cay feveral of the perfons who in the Easter Holidayes had allembled themselves in a rumultuous manner, breaking open feveral Prifons, and publing down the Houfes of the Inhabitants of this plate, were Indicted for High Treason at the Old Bas'y, before Sir John Keeling, Lord Chief Justice of his Majesties Court of Kings Bench, Sir Robert Athins, Sir Chriftopher Zurner, and Sir Richard Raynsford, Barons of His Majeflies Cou e of Exchequer, together with Sir William Wild Recorder of the City of London 3 where a Jury being impanelled's confifting of several Justices of the Pesce and Gentlemen of good Quality of London and Middlefex, Peter Meffenger, Richard Bafely, William Greene, Thomas Apltre , Edward Cotton, Thomas Limerick, Edward Bedel, and Richard Latimer, Eight of the principal Off nders were found guilty of the offences aforefaid, and condemned.

And it is to be oblerved, to the jult vindication of the City, that neither the perions above-named, nor any other that were apprehended upon the faid Turnult were found to be Apprentices as was given out, but fome idle perions, many of them nurled in the late rebellion, too readily embracing any opportunity of making their own advantages to the diflutbance of the peace, and injury of others.
