A *Venice, Sept. 3.* All the News we have from our Army is, That they continue the Siege of *Napoli di Malvasia* with good Success; but that the *Bassa* seems resolv'd to defend the place to the last Extremity, having in it a Garison of 1000 Men, who, to avoid our Bombs, are lodged in places prepared for them under Ground. By a Vessel come from *Dalmatia* we have advice, that the *Proveditor-General Molino* having drawn together 7000 Foot, was embarked with them, in order to attack *la Gabelle*, and another Post towards *Narenta*; Signior *Antonio Lordana* marching thither at the same time with the Horse by Land. The Cardinal *Borussi* arriv'd here yesterday from *Vienna*, and, without making any stay in this City, continued his Journey to *Rome*. The Cardinals *Barbarigo* and *Delia* parted likewise from hence the last week, to assist at the Election of a new Pope.

Leighorne, Sept. 8. The Cardinals of *Furtemberg*, and other Cardinals of the French Faction, are daily expected here in their way to *Rome*; but it is not improbable the Pope will be chosen before they arrive there.

Warsaw, Aug. 26. The King parted the 10th instant from *Zolkiew*, and arriv'd the 14th at *Slozow*, where the Court still continues. The Forces of this Crown were encamped the 10th at *Barisz*, being about 10000 Foot and 6000 Horse; and those of *Lithuania* at *Tornopol*, both Horse and Foot making but 6000. The 14th they had advice, that 12000 Tartars were arriv'd in the Neighbourhood of *Caminiec*, and that they expected to be joyn'd there in few days by 20000 more, commanded by *Suitan Naradin*, The *Palatin of Bassia*, Great General of Poland, to hinder their conjunction, march'd the same day with all the Horse and Dragoons, and 1000 Foot, which the Horsemen carried behind them; and the Troops of *Lithuania* had likewise Orders to advance that way: We are expecting with some impatience an account of what has pass'd in this occasion.

Vienna, Sept. 13. The Letters of the 4th instant from the Imperial Army in *Serovia*, written in the Camp which the Turks abandoned on the 29th past, give an account that their Parties, that were sent out, had found among the Hills 30 pieces of Cannon more, and a great deal of Ammunition, which the Enemy left behind them in their flight. And that the Count *de Chavri* was come back with his Huslars, and reported, that the Enemy fled by different ways, that he had pursued some of their Troops as far as *Jagodin*, and had cut off 500 of them. That Prince *Louis of Baden* had sent to *Semanadria*, and other places, for a farther Supply of Provisions, and intended to erect Magazines in the Forts he had built on the River *Morava*; which being done, it's believ'd, he will pursue his former design of marching to *Nissa*. The Turks have abandoned *Swornich* in *Bosnia*. The Advices from *Transylvania* and *Upper Hungary* say, That the Count *de Herbeville* had reinforced the Garisons of *Lippa*, *Chonad*, and other places on the River *Merisib*, and was afterwards return'd with the Troops under his Command towards *Hermanstadt*. From *Croatia* we hear, that Colonel *Butowski* continues to keep *Gansa* very closely block'd up; but that the *Bassa* had prevail'd with the Garison to defend the place for some time longer, by shewing them Letters he pretend'd to have received from the *Serazquier*, wherein he promis'd to relieve them before the end of this month. The Emperor has nam'd the Prince of *Lichtenstein*, to go to *Rome* in the Quality of his Ambassador Extraordinary.

Hildsburg, Sept. 17. The Elector of *Saxony* arriv'd here yesterday, and in the Evening return'd to his Quarters at *Hendelsheim*, about a mile from hence: His Army is

now compos'd of 20 Regiments of Horse and Foot. The Duke of *Duras* has sent Reinforcements to *Philipsbourg* and *Landau*, and is encamp'd with the rest of his Forces near *Fort-Louis*. The French have lay'd the Towns of *Murgnew* and *Lichtenau* in Ashes, and threaten to burn likewise *Graun-Weissenburg*, and other places on that side.

Francfort, Sept. 21. The Confederate Army that was before *Mantz* (in which place there is now a Garison of Imperialists, Saxons, and Hessians, under the command of the Generals *Soyches*, and *Thunberg*) is separat'd. The Duke of *Lorraine* has taken his march with the Imperial and *Linsburgh* Horse and Dragoons, towards *Coblenz*, having before sent greatest part of the Foot, commanded by the Great Master of the *Teutnick Order*, to the Siege of *Bonne*. The Elector of *Saxony* is approach'd with his Forces nearer to this City, and has at present his Head-quarters at *Smunheim*. The Bavarians are march'd towards *Philipsbourg*, to join the Troops under the Count *Sering*; and lay two days ago on this side of *Heydelberg*, his Electoral Highness, having his Head-quarters at *Hendelsheim*. The Troops of *Hesse* are encamp'd at *Hachim*. It's said, their Imperial Majesties intend to pass this Winter at *Ausbourg*.

From the Camp before Bonne, Sept. 23. On the 16th instant we open'd our Trenches; it being resolv'd, that the *Brandenburghers* should carry on one Attack, and the *Dutch* and *Munster* Troops another. The former advanced that night 100 Paces, and had only 4 Men wounded; and the later 270 Paces, the Enemy not discovering them till towards morning, when they had 3 Men wounded. The 17th the *Brandenburghers* carried on their Trenches 200 Paces, with the loss of 6 Men kill'd, and 7 wounded; and the *Hollanders* and *Munsterers* finish'd a Redoubt at the Head of their Trenches. General *Dunneville* arriv'd in the Camp with the News, that a strong Detachment of Imperialists and *Lunenburghers* was coming to our Assistance. The 18th we fired 3 Salvo's with our Cannon, for the Victory obtain'd by Prince *Louis of Baden* against the Turks. The night following the *Dutch* advanced their Trenches 150 Paces, and had one Man kill'd, and 11 wounded. And the *Brandenburghers* rais'd some Works to cover them from the Enemies shot, that were post'd in an Outwork at some distance from the Counter-scarp, with the loss of several Men kill'd and wounded. The 19th and 20th we continu'd our Approaches at both Attacks. The 21th the *Brandenburghers* took the Outwork before-mention'd. And then we made a Line of Communication between the Two Attacks: We lost that night several Men. Yesterday arriv'd in the Camp part of the Imperial Infantry from *Mantz*, and the rest are expected this day or to morrow. The Duke of *Lorraine* likewise marches this way with the Cavalry. We are advanced so near to the Counter-scarp, that the Enemy cannot any longer annoy us with their Cannon. We are raising 6 new Batteries, of 6 half Cannon each, to make Breaches, which will be finish'd in 2 days; and then we shall make a general Assault. General *Schaumburg* continues under Confinement; and General *Swartz* has now the chief Command of the Army.

Cologne, Sept. 24. We have an account from the Camp before *Bon* that they had begun to place the Cannon on their new Batteries, and that it was believ'd they should storm the place on the 27th or 28th of this month. We do not hear that the day is yet fix'd for the Queen of *Spain* departure from *Duiseldorpe*.

Harlem, Sept. 27. We have an Account from *Flanders*, that the Spanish Forces were encamp'd the 24th instant between *Vlissing* and *Breda*; and that on the 24th they were to join the Dutch Army near *Hall*; which would then march towards the *Marschal d'Humieres*, who continued encamp'd at *Lessines*. The *Heer Diest*, the *Brandenburgh* Minister, has given Notice to the States-General of the Death of the Electress Dowager of *Brandenburgh*.

Marselles, Septemb. 19. The French Gallies 28 in number, parted the 19th instant from *Toulon* with the Duke de *Chaulnes* and the French Cardinals who are going to *Rome*.

Paris, Sept. 28. The return of the *Vaudois* into their Valleys, gives a great alarm to the Frontier places of *Dauphine*, where they keep strong Guards, as well for fear of the new Converts at home, as of a surprize from abroad. The Elector of *Bavaria* is said to be on his march with 30000 Men towards the *Upper Rhine*; to be nearer the *Suillers* during their approaching Diet. They write from *Lisse*, that the Governor of *Flanders* was marching with the Spanish Forces to join the Dutch Army at *Hall*; and that the *Marschal d'Humieres* was still encamp'd at *Lessines*. We have an account from *Brest*, that the Earl of *Melfort* is arriv'd there with his whole Family from *Ireland*.

Belfast, Sept. 6. On Monday the 2d instant his Grace the Duke of *Schomberg* march'd with the Army to *Lisnegarvy*; and on Tuesday to *Dromer*; the *Imiskilling* horse, who are in the Van, advanced the same night to the *Nury*; the Enemy, upon their approach, abandoning that place, after having set fire to it. His Grace intended to be there this day; and the *Imiskilling* forces are supposed to be now at *Dundalk*. We are expecting several Regiments from *Scotland*.

Leverpool, Sept. 17. This morning a Vessel arriv'd in *Highlake*, which part'd from *Carrickfergus* on the 15th instant; and by several Persons that came over in her, as well as Letters, we are inform'd, that his Grace the Duke of *Schomberg* had pass'd the *Nury* (which the Enemy burnt,) and was advanc'd with the Army to *Lurgan-Race*, between *Dundalk* and *Drogheda*, where he stay'd for the arrival of his Artillery, (that followed by Sea to *Carlingford*, and it's believed arriv'd there on Saturday last,) after which his Grace would march to *Drogheda*, where 'twas reported, the Enemy lay intrench'd about 20000 strong. Colonel *Villars* and the Lord *Hemist*'s Regiments of Horse, which went lately from *Highlake*, are landed in *Ireland*.

Cobler, Sept. 18. By a Vessel which came on the 15th instant from *Carrickfergus*, we have an account, That his Grace the Duke of *Schomberg* lay then encamp'd with the Army at *Dundalk*, and that he stay'd only for his heavy Cannon and Mortars, (which were left to follow him to *Carlingford* by Sea,) and then would advance to *Drogheda*, where the Enemy lay intrench'd to the number of about 20000. The Irish, upon the approach of our Troops, burnt the *Nury* to the Ground, so that when the Duke enter'd the place, he found only four or five Houses that had escap'd the Fire, which Barbarity mov'd his Grace to send them this Message, *That if, for the future, he found in his marches any more French Tricks play'd, he would not give Quarter to Man, Woman, or Child.*

Plimouth, Sept. 17. Their Majesties Ship the *Dover* arriv'd here this morning from the Fleet in *Torbay*.

Portsmouth, Sept. 19. Yesterday morning sail'd from *Spithead* Their Majesties Ship the *Harwich*, to the *Westward*. And the same day arriv'd there the

Lyon and the *Reserve*, with about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships, bound for the *Downs*, which were forc'd in here by the bad Weather.

Deal, Sept. 28. This day sail'd out of the *Downs* the *Berkeley-Castle* and the *Surfley*, with 3 Dutch Merchant Ships homeward bound from the *West-Indies*.

Westminster, Sept. 20. The Parliament met this day, in pursuance of their late Adjournment. And His Majesty having signified His Pleasure to both Houses, That they should farther adjourn to the 19th of *October* next; And that He intended they should then sit; whereof He had order'd Notice to be given by Proclamation. The Two Houses adjourn'd accordingly to the 19th of the next month.

Post-Office, General, Sept. 18. *This is to Notify That The Pacquet Boats for Ireland having been interrupted by the Rebellious Papists, are again established to go from Highlake thrice every week; and all Letters and Passengers for that Kingdom will be duly transported by the said Pacquet Boats to Belfast in the North of Ireland; from whence Care is taken to convey all dispatch Letters to all parts and places that are reduced to the due Subjection of Their Majesties King, William and Queen Mary. The first Pacquet was sent from hence on Tuesday last, being the 17th instant.*
