THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

The declaration described in the Schedule to this Order, made by the Sub-Committee of the Executive Committee of the Local Authority for the West Riding of the county of York in and for the Petty Sessional Division of East Staincliffe declaring the existence of foot-and-mouth disease at the place therein mentioned, is hereby cancelled, and the infected place thereby declared shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

Date of Declaration.	Place where Foot-and-mouth disease was declared to have been found to exist.
