give them Battel. Hague, Octob. 4. The Lord Durfeley, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of Great Britain to this State, arrived here yesterday from England; together with the Lord Pager, who is going with the same Caracter to the Emperor. The last Letters from Bruffels tell us, That Prince Waldeck and the Governor of Flanders were advanced with the Army to Englien, with a Refolution to continue their March towards the Enemy; but that the Mareschal d'Humieres was retired from Leffines.

Eruffels, Octob. 2. Our Governor General and Prince Waldick are advanced, with the Spanish and Dutch Forces, to Englien. Mareichal d'Humieres, upon the News of their March, retired from Lessines, and lies now about Two days March from our Army! The Troops of Hanouer are faid to be on their March towards these Countreys.

The News here is that the Paris, Octob. 5. Garilon of Bon begin to be very much streightned, and that they cannot hold out much longer. The Marcichal de Lorge is gone for Germany, to put himself, at the head of the Forces at present commanded by the Marquis de Boufflers, with which tome other Troops are to joyn, in order to hinder the Confederates from taking Winter Quarters within the French Territories. not yet hear that the French Cardinals are arrived at Ame.

Chester, Septemb. 25. By a Vessel arrived in Highlake, which came from Belfast on Saturday

last, we are informed, That our Army continued encamped at Dundalke; and that a Party of 50 Iniskilling Horse had put to flight Two of the Energies Squadrons, and had purfued them almost to their Camp.
