

said representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Salisbury our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing of the several patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only And for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall after the benefices shall have been united into one benefice present to such united benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say the said Marquess of Lansdowne his heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the second fourth sixth eighth tenth and every like alternate turn or right of presentation for ever and the said Douglas John Kinneir Macdonald and James Patrick Hadow the trustees under indenture of settlement of the twenty-seventh of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine their heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the first third fifth seventh and ninth and every like alternate turn or right of presentation for ever.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered that that the rectory of Calstone Wellington situate in the county of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury and the rectory of Blackland situate in the same county and diocese shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council is pleased to give directions and declare that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the said united benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say :—The said Marquess of Lansdowne his heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the second fourth sixth eighth tenth and every like alternate turn or right of presentation for ever and the said Douglas John Kinneir Macdonald and James Patrick Hadow the trustees under the indenture of settlement of the twenty-seventh of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine their heirs and assigns shall be entitled to the first third fifth seventh and ninth and every like alternate turn or right of presentation for ever. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of

Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighteenth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, in the words and figures following; that is to say :—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Thomas situate at Garstang in the parish of Saint Helen Garstang otherwise called or known as Church Town in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas situate at Garstang in the parish of Saint Helen Garstang otherwise called or known as Church Town as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Helen Garstang otherwise called or known as Church Town which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Thomas situate at Garstang as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas Garstang.'

"And with the like consent of the said James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Thomas situate at Garstang as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.
