Rome, Septemb. 17.

THE Cardinal *Colonna* arrived here the 11 instant, and the next day entered into the Conclave; where there are now 48 Cardinals. They proceed hitherto very slowly. Upon a Scrutiny some days ago there were found 32 Blanks. In another yesterday *Ottoboni* had 15 Votes, *Lauria* as many, *Geri* 3, *Ginetti* 3, *Altieri* 4, *Capizucchi* 3, The rest were Blanks. In the mean time the Creatures of the late Pope continue to have the strongest Party. An Express has been sent to the Duke de *Chaulnes*, who is coming hither as Ambassador from France, to let him know, That before he is received here in that quality, he must renounce all Pretention to the Franchises of his Quarror, and the King his Master must quit *Avignon*. *Te Deum* has been sung in the Conclave for the Victory obtained against the Turks at the *River Morava*.

Venice, Septemb. 23. We have Letters from our Fleet before *Napoli di Mavusia* of the 20th past, but they bring very little news; telling us only that their Cannon had done considerable execution, and that they understood by Deserters, That the Garison was in great want of Water.

Genova, Septemb. 17. The 15th instant arrived in this Port 28 French Gallies, with the Cardinals of *Furtemberg*, *Bouillon*, and *Bonzi*, and the Duke de *Chaulnes*; who were complimented on the part of this Senate: And the next morning they continued their Course toward *Leghorne*, from whence they intend to pass to Rome by Land.

Warsaw, Sept. 10. The Letters from *Lemberg*, of the first instant, give an account, That the Crown-Generall had resolv'd to attack *Caminnic*, where, as he was informed by several Deserters, there were but 1500 Men in Garison: That in order thereunto he had caus'd several Batteries to be rais'd, and that his Men were advanced within Musquet-shot of the place. We hear nothing of the Tartars, since the advice we had of the Cham's being come to *Budziack*; and that he assembled his Troops, which, as 'twas given out, he design'd to send to the Assistance of the Turks. We are told from *Moscow*, that their Forces were gone into Winter-quarters, but that their General, *Kneas Galitzen*, pretended he would go into the Field again in the Spring with a very numerous Army.

Vienna, Septemb. 25. We have an account from *Poland*, That the Forces of that Crown did formally attack *Caminnic*, and that they had the first night carried on their Trenches 400 Paces. There are no Letters from our Army commanded by Prince *Louis* of *Baden* since those of the 4th instant; which was then encamp'd at *Jagodina*, near the *Morava*.

Hydelberg, Septemb. 29. The principal Prisoners taken by the Hussars (who were commanded by Count *Palfi*) in the late Rencounter they had with the Garison of *Philipsburg*, are Monsieur d'*Erigal*, first Captain, and who did the Duty of Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of *Auvergne*; Monsieur de *Four*, Major of the place, & Capt. in the Regiment of *Normandy*; Monsieur de *Coursel*, Capt. of Fusiliers; Monsieur *Vandel*, Lieutenant of Fusiliers; Monsieur *Gallier*, Lieu-

tenant in the Regiment of *Normandy*; Monsieur *Geneste*, Lieutenant in the Regiment of *Auvergne*; and Monsieur *Mincour*, Corner of Dragoons. Yesterday a Party of Hussars took again several Prisoners near the Gates of *Philipsburg*, and brought them to their Quarters at *Smietheim*. The French have this week burnt *Nesstadi*, and several other places in the Palatinate.

Frankfort Octob. 2. The Elector of *Saxony* continues to have his head Quarters at *Bensheim*, and the Elector of *Bavaria* at *Handschuckheim*, near *Hydelberg*. The Duke of *Duras* has, upon the news of the loss which the Garison of *Philipsburg* sustained in the late Action with the Hussars, sent thither a Reinforcement of 1000 men from *Landaw*. There is a Bridge laid over the *Mein* at *Costheim*. And they are repairing that at *Mentz*.

From the Camp before Bon, Octob. 4. The Brandenburgers have since the first instant battered the place with 42 whole and half Cannon, and have made great Breaches in the Walls. As the Dutch and *Murster* Attack their Cannon play likewise without intermission. But the Imperialists have not yet finished their Batteries. On the second instant three Deserters came out of the Town, and reported that the Garison was reduced to 2500 fighting men. Last night we advanced within 12 Paces of the Counterescarp. This day we have Planted several Pieces of Cannon on a new Battery near the Counterescarp. And it's believed that on the 6 or 7th instant we shall give a general Assault.

Cologne, Octob. 4. The Troops of *Hanover* are arrived in this Neighborhood: They intend to pass the *Rhine* at *Dusfeldorp*, and from thence to continue their March towards the Spanish *Netherlands*. We hear from the Camp before *Bon*, That their Cannon had made large Breaches, and that they were preparing to storm the place.

Hague, Octob. 7. The Earl of *Pembroke*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, had yesterday his Audience of Leave of the States-General, to which he was conducted with the usual Solemnity. We hear from *Flanders*, That our Army was encamp'd the 4th instant at *Chievres*; And that the *Mareschal d'Humieres* was retired towards *Tournay*.

Brussels, Octob. 5. The *Mareschal d'Humieres* upon advice that the Spanish and Dutch Forces advanced towards him, decamp'd the first instant from *Lessines*, and marched to *Leuze*, and

and the next day towards Antoin on the Sebelle, between Conde and Tournay. On the third our Governor General and Prince Waldeck marched from Enghien to Chieues beyond Cambrai intending, as we are told, to follow the Enemy towards Tournay. Three English Regiments are sent into Quarters at Ghent and Bruges.

Paris, Octob. 8. We have advice that the Elector of Bavaria is advanced into the Neighborhood of Fribourg, and that 'tis not without some important design that he moves thus towards Suifferland. It is said here, That the Armies in Flanders are again within a League of each other; and that Monsieur Calvo has joyned the Marechal d'Humieres with the Troops under his Command. Monsieur de Sanguetay is declared Minister of State, and in that quality took on Tuesday last his place in the Council.

Dembroke, Sept. 25. On Monday last came into this Harbour the Sea Adventure, Captain John Tackey Commander, who parted from Carbery for the 19th instant. He says his Grace the Duke of Schomberg continued encamp near Dunalk; That divers Papists were come in, to pray his Grace's Protection; That the two Armies were within 7 Miles of each other; and that some Rebels appeared sometimes in Parties, but would not stand to engage the Muskelling men, who were continually abroad in Detachments to observe them.

Chester, Septemb. 30. The last Week sailed from Highlake a great many Ships with Provisions for Carlingford. We have no News from Ireland, but what we hear by a person that came lately from Dublin, who gives an account of the sad condition of the Protestants there, those that were out upon Bail being again made Prisoners, with many others, and that several great Houses are turned into Goals. That the Irish Army was numerous, but ill armed and in great want of Ammunition.

Falmouth, Septemb. 23. Yesterday came here the Arms of Fishing in Zealand, laden with Sugars from Surinam. She hath been some time in Milford Haven.

Portsmouth, Septemb. 28. Yesterday came to Spithead their Majesties Ships the Greyhound, and this day they came in together with the Monarque, for the purpose of their service.

August 28. On Saturday last being the day appointed by the late Act of Common Council for the Choice of Lord Mayor (by reason that Michaelmas Day this Year fell on Sunday) the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and the Members of the several Companies being assembled at Guildhall for that purpose. The present Lord Mayor Sir Thomas Pittenger was again elected to be Lord Mayor for the year ensuing. The same day Christopher Lobbes and John Hobblin Esquires and Aldermen the new Sheriffs were sworn before the Lord Mayor and Alder-

men at Guildhall; and on Monday last were presented at the Exchequer Court by the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, &c. according to a custom of London; and afterwards the Sheriffs entered and the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Officers of the Exchequer at a splendid Dinner provided for them at Drapers Hall.

Hampton Court, Septemb. 29. This day their Excellencies the Ambassadors Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces, had their Audience of Leave before their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Denmark, being conducted by Sir Charles Cottrel, Master of the Ceremonies.

Hampton Court, Septemb. 30. His Majesty parted from hence this Morning for Newmarket.
