2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one ; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in the Act of 1878. C. L. Peel.

SCHEDULE.

An area comprising the county of Chester, and the boroughs of Birkenhead, Chester, Congleton, Crewe, Macclesfield, and Stockport, except as follows :- The foreign animals wharves at the Wallasey landing-stage and the Woodside landingstage at Birkenhead ; and the lands and buildings at Birkenhead approved by the Privy Council for the landing or lairage of foreign animals; and such landing-places in that county or in those boroughs as are at the date of this Order used for the landing of animals from Ireland.

THE METROPOLIS (FOOT - AND -MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1881.

A T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 29th day of January, 1881.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Short Title.

1. This Order may be cited as The Metropolis (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1881.

Commencement.

2. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eightyone; and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eightyone, except as regards the recovery of any penalty incurred thereunder before that day.

Interpretation.

3. In this Order-

The Act of 1878 means The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

The Metropolitan Market, or the Market, means the Metropolitan Cattle Market at Islington,

in the Metropolis, including the lairs therein. Other terms have the same meaning as in the

Act of 1878.

Markets, Fairs, Exhibitions, and Public Sales in the Metropolis.

4. No market, fair, exhibition, or sale by public auction or other public sale of animals (whether or not being fat animals intended for slaughter) shall be held in the Metropolis, except the Metropolitan Market, or a market, fair, exhibition, or sale licensed by the Local Authority of the Metropolis or of the City of London under The Markets and Fairs Temporary Order of 1881.

Special Regulations as to Metropolitan Market.

5.—(a.) Animals exposed for sale in the Metropolitan Market shall not be moved out of the Market, but shall be slaughtered within the Market, except as follows:

(b.) Animals may be moved out of the Market to a slaughter-house in the Metropolis for the purpose of being there slaughtered : or

(c.) Animals may be moved out of the Market to a lair licensed for their reception by the Privy Council, and may be kept in that licensed lair subject to conditions specified in the licence until they are taken to a slaughter-house in the Metropolis for the purpose of being there slaughtered.

(d.) Animals moved out of the Market to a slaughter-house or licensed lair shall not be again moved into the Market.

(e.) Provided that cattle, sheep, and swine so moved out of the Market shall, after their arrival at the Market, and before they are moved thereout, be marked by the owner, consignee, or other person exposing them in the Market, at his own expense, as follows:

Cattle.—By clipping the hair off the end of the tail of each of the cattle.

Sheep and Swine.—By painting or stamping a broad arrow, about six inches long, on the left side of each of the sheep or swine with the following or some other like composition, namely : —Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm.

6. Animals which have been exposed for sale in the Metropolitan Market, and have not been moved out of the Market to a slaughter-house or licensed lair as aforesaid, may be again exposed for sale in the Metropolitan Market; but in every case an animal which has been so exposed —

(i.) shall be slaughtered within the Metropolis within ten days after their first exposure in the Market; and

(ii.) shall not during those ten days be exposed in any market other than the Metropolitan Market; and

(iii.) shall not during those ten days be exposed or exhibited in or at any fair, exhibition, sale by public auction or other public sale of animals in the Metropolis.

Movement of Animals out of the Metropolis.

7.—(a.) Animals may be moved out of the Metropolis in accordance with the following regulations, and not otherwise :

- (i.) The animals may be moved out of the Metropolis with a movement licence of the Local Authority of the Metropolis, specifying the place to which and the person to whom the animals are to be moved, on a certificate of a Veterinary Inspector certifying that the animals to be moved are not affected with footand-mouth disease, and have not, to the best of his knowledge and belief, been exposed to the infection of foot-and-mouth disease, or on a declaration such as is indicated in Form A. in the Schedule to The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Order of 1881, or to the like effect, made by the owner of the animals described in the declaration, or by his agent authorized in writing for that purpose.
- (ii.) If the animals are to be moved out of the City of London, there must also be a previous movement licence of the Local Authority of the City, for movement into the Metropolis, granted on a certificate or declaration as aforesaid.
- (iii.) In every case there must also be a final movement licence of the Local Authority of the district into which the animals are to be moved indorsed on or referring to the licence of the Local Authority of the Metropolis.

- (iv.) The two or the three movement licences aforesaid required by this Article must be obtained before the animals are moved out of the Metropolis or out of the City of London (as the case may be).
- (v.) The animals after they are received at the place specified in the movement licence of the Local Authority of the Metropolis, shall not be again moved except with a further movement licence of the Local Authority of the district in which that place is situate.
- (b.) Nothing in this Article-
- (i.) Applies to animals that have been exposed for sale in the Metropolitan Market, or that have been in a market, fair, exhibition, or sale licensed by the Local Authority, or in a lair licensed by the Privy Council : or
- (ii.) Restricts movement of animals by railway through the Metropolis.

Offences.

8.—(a.) If an animal required by this Order to be marked is not so marked, the owner, consignee, or other person exposing the same, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(b.) If an animal required by this Order to be slaughtered is not so slaughtered, the person failing to cause the same to be so slaughtered shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(c.) If an animal is moved in contravention of the provisions of this Order, or of a licence of a Local Authority thereunder, the owner thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the company or person moving or conveying the animal, shall, each according to and in respect of his or their own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Revocation.

9. The Metropolitan Cattle Market (Footand-Mouth Disease) Temporary Order of 1881, is, as from the commencement of this Order, hereby revoked; but nothing in this Order shall be deemed to revive the Order of Council revoked by that Order or be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under those Orders or either of them before this Order takes effect, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, those Orders or either of them.
