Warsaw, Sept. 14.

THe Letters from Lemberg tell us, that the Army of this Crown was set down before *Camintec*; and had begun a formal Attack against the Castle. That they had raised two Batteries; and that the Trenches, were opened by the Troops of *Lithuania*, and advanced the first night 400 paces. The Court continues at *Sticzow*. It is said, that a Dyet will be called to meet here in December next.

Vienna, Sept. 29. The Cardinal *Radziowski* arrived here yesterday from *Poland*, and the same day continued his journey towards *Rome*. We have no news from our Army in *Servia*.

Ausbourg, Sept. 29. Their Imperial Majesties, who went the last week to *Neubourg*, returned hither yesterday. The Elector of *Mentz*, is expected here to Morrow, and preparations are making for the meeting of all the Electors, who are expected here so soon as the Campaign is ended.

Frankfort, Octob. 5. The Forces of *Bavaria* are moving this way, but whither their march is designed we do not know. The Elector of *Saxony* continues his Head Quarters at *Benfheim*. We hear that the Duke of *Duras* has sent 30 Squadrons, and Twelve Battalions towards the *Moselle*, to joyn, as it is believed, the Forces which are drawing together on that side, and are to be Commanded by the *Marschal de Lorge*.

From the Camp before Bonn, Octob. 7. The 4th Instant the Imperialists advanced their Trenches very near to the Ditch of the Hornwork; and the Brandenburgers and Hollanders carried on theirs to the Glacis of the Counterscarp, with the loss of about 20 Men. The same day the Duke of *Hanouer* arrived in the Camp. On the 5th the Imperialists began to Sappe; and their Battery of 10 pieces of Cannon had made a considerable breach in the Hornwork. At the Brandenburg and the Dutch, and the Munster Attacks, they enlarged their Lines and Lodgments, and their Batteries on which are planted 66 whole and half Cannon, continued to play with good success. We had about 30 Men killed and wounded. Last night the Brandenburgers and Hollanders joyned their Trenches with a Line of Communication on the Glacis of the Counterscarp; and our Miners are now busied in searching for the Enemies Mines. The Imperialists are advanced to the Ditch of the Hornwork. Our Cannon have made a great breach near the Gate of *Stocken*, and we are now preparing for a Storm. One of our Bombs fired yesterday a parcel of the Enemies Hand-Gradoes.

Cologne, Octob. 7. The Confederate Forces before *Bonn* carry on their Attacks very vigorously; and we

are hourly expecting to hear that they are lodged on the Counterscarp; after which, they will quickly be Masters of the Town. The Troops of *Hanouer* have passed the *Rhine* at *Dusseldorp*, in their march towards the *Spanish Netherlands*; and the Duke himself is now at *Nays*. The Forces of *Saxony* and *Bavaria* are still encamped in the *Bergstradt*. The Duke of *Duras*, who has not with him above 14 or 15000 Men, is marched towards *Strasbourg* after having burnt all the Towns and Bourgs on this side the *Rhine*, between *Worms* and *Landau*.

Hambourg, Octob. 7. We have an account from *Belavac* of the ill success of the design upon *Camintec*. The Poles, being advanced to the Walls of the Castle, made an Assault, but were repulsed with the loss of a great many Men. The Enemy to pursue their advantage sallied out, beat them from one of their Batteries, and took 20 pieces of Cannon, which they carried with several prisoners into the Town. Whereupon it was resolved in a Council of War to raise the Siege.

Brussels, Octob. 7. The Spanish and Dutch Forces, under the Command of our Governor-General, and Prince *Waldeck*, are encamped between *Bruglette* and *Leffines*; and the *Marschal d'Humieres* at *Leuze*, where Monsieur *Catoy* has joyned him with 4000 Horse. We hear from *Luxemburg* that the French have forbid the Country people on those Frontiers, to tow their Grounds, and have seized upon all the Corn and Hay, which they were obliged to bring into the Fortified places. The Princess of *Vaudemont*, with several other Ladies of this Court, parted from hence yesterday to make their Compliments to the Queen of *Spain*, at her Majesties arrival in *Holland*.

Hague, Octob. 11. Yesterday the Earl of *Pembroke*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, parted from hence, being conducted by the Heer *Van Blyenrooyden*, and the Heer *Becker*, as Deputies from the States-General, in the first Coach of State, followed by between 40 and 50 other Coaches, as far as the *Hornbridge*, between this place and *Delft*: From whence his Excellency continued his Journey towards *Rotterdam*, in order to embark there for *England*. We hear from *Rossmont*, that the Troops of *Hanouer* were arrived within the Spanish Territories, and that they would pass the *Meuse* at *Venlo*. The Letters from *Geneva* of the 30th past say, that the last Company of the *Vaudors* which set out from the neighborhood of *Lausanne*, about the 20th of the same Month, and were advanced as far as *Veray*, finding the passages of the Mountains filled up with Stones and Trees, and will

well guarded besides, and beginning to want Provisions, they resolv'd to return, and had accordingly repass'd the Lake on the 27th past. We hear from *Spain* that the Succors sent to *Malpaga*, which is beleiged by the Moors, were safely arriv'd there.

From the Camp at Dundalke, Sept. 28 This day arriv'd here an Expreis from *Iniskilling*, with an account, that the Forces which were left there, hearing that three Regiments of the Irish Army, with a great number of arm'd Rabble, were come to *Boyle*, with a design to attack *Slego*, they immediately march'd thither, and had not been long there, when they understood that the Rebels mov'd towards them. Whereupon they march'd out to meet them. The Irish fired at a great distance, but our Men stay'd till they came within Pistol shot, and then gave them to warm a Charge, that they kill'd a great many of them, and put the rest to flight. Col. *Lloyd* who Commanded our Men left his Foot to pursue the Rebels, and taking a little compass about with his Horse, got into *Boyle* at one end of the Town, just as the Rebels enter'd at the other, beat them out again, and pursued 7 miles. Of the Rebels 500 were kill'd upon the place, and 3 Colonels, with 40 Officers, and about 200 Soldiers taken prisoners; and on our side we had in this brave and remarkable Action, but 20 men kill'd and wounded. Our Men took likewise and carried back with them 20000 head of Cattle. We had but 4 Troops of Horse, 5 of Dragoons, and about 200 Foot, and the Irish were 5000. For this happy Success his Grace has order'd all the Cannon, to be fired round the Camp. The Forces from *Scotland* are daily expected at *Carlisleford*.

Chester, Sept. 30. Yesterday we received an account, as well by Letters dat'd the 28th Instant, as by several Persons come from our Army of a fresh Victory obtain'd by the *Iniskilling* Men, over the Irish on the 20th Instant. The Irish Forces in *Connagh* being drawn together with a design to surprize *Slego*, and to revenge their former Losses upon the small number of our Forces that remain'd in those parts; They march'd thither Horse and Foot, to the number of 5000. The *Iniskilling* Men, who were but 500, upon notice of it march'd out of *Slego*, under the Command of Col. *Thomas Lloyd*, and having post'd themselves in an advantageous place; They there expected the Rebels, and suffer'd them to come within Pistol shot, before they fired, when on a sudden they pour'd their Small shot so thick upon them, and made such havock amongst them, that the whole Body of the Rebels presently fled; our Men pursued them, kill'd 5 or 600 and took 200 prisoners (amongst whom are Col. *O'Kellie* who Commanded the Party, Col. *Dillon*, Col. *Bourke*, and 40 other Commission Officers) and a Booty of 8000 Head of Cattle. The news of this extraordinary success being brought to his Grace the Duke of *Schomberg*, he caus'd all the Cannon round his Camp to be fired, and the like was done from the Men of War, and the rest of the Ships in the Bay of *Carlisleford*. This day we hear by a

Person who came from the Camp on Sunday last, that the Forces from *Scotland* arriv'd that day at *Carlisleford*; and that the Irish Army was de-camp'd.

Plymouth, Octob. 1. The Fleet under the Command of the Earl of *Torrington*, sail'd on the 29th past from *Torbay* to the Eastward, except about 25 Sail of English and Dutch men of War, which are order'd to cruise between *Scilly* and *Ushant*. Yesterday came in here the *Pendennis* to convoy the homeward bound Ships now in this Port.

Portsmouth, Octob. 2. Yesterday the Earl of *Torrington* arriv'd with the Fleet at *Spithead*, having sent a considerable Squadron, under the Command of the Lord *Berkley* to the Westward. The Ships that are come in are order'd forthwith to be refitted.

Whitehall, Octob. 6. His Majesty has been pleas'd to cause a Proclamation to be issued, For the careful Custody and well Ordering of the New River brought from *Chadwell* and *Amell*, to the North Parts of the City of *London*.
