Their Imperials Majefries, who went the last week to Neubourg, recurned hither yesterday. The Elector of Meniz is expedied here to Morrow, and preparations are making for the meeting of all the Electors, who are expected here to foon as the Campagne is ended.

Francfort, Octob. 5. The Forces of Bavaria are moving this way, but whither their march is defigned we do not know. The Elector of Saxony continues his Head Quarters at Benffeeim. We hear that the Duke of Duras has fent. 30 Squadrons, and Twelve Batallions towards the Mofelle, to joyn, as it's believed, the Forces which are drawing together on that fide, and are to be Commanded by the Marefchal de Large.

From the Camp before Bon, Octob. 7. The Imperialists are advanced to the Ditch of the Hornwork. Our Cannon have made a great breach near the Gate of Stocken, and we are now preparing for a Storm. One of our Bombs fired yer fterday a parcel of the Enemies Hand-Granadoes.
