"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Michael, Bamford, being:—

"All those several contiguous portion of the new parish of Saint Luke Heywood, of the new parish of Saint James Heywood, of the new parish of Birkle otherwise Bircle or Birtle, and of the parish of Middleton, all in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which said portions of such new parishes and of such parish are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Luke Heywood from the new parish of Saint James Heywood aforesaid at a point at the centre of Hooley Bridge which carries Bamford-road over the River Roch and extending thence first westward then northward and then north-westward along the middle of the said river for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the point where the same river is joined by the stream called or known as Norden Water or Norden Brook which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint James Heywood from the new parish of Birkle otherwise Bircle or Birtle aforesaid and extending thence first south-westward then southward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts thereby continuing to follow the course of the River Roch aforesaid and following in part the boundary which divides the ancient civil parish of Middleton from the ancient civil parish of Bury to the point where the said river is joined by the stream called or known as Tack Lee Brook and where the last-mentioned civil parish boundary leaves the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint James Heywood from the new parish of Birkle otherwise Bircle or Birtle aforesaid and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned point in the River Roch generally northward along the said civil parish boundary for a distance of thirty-seven chains or thereabouts thereby following in part the course of Tack Lee Brook aforesaid and in part the course of the stream called or known as Gristlehurst Brook and passing under the Rochdale Bamford and Bury Trust-road to a point in the middle of the road leading from Birtle past the house called or known as Nigher Tack Lee to Top-o'-th'-Wood and extending thence that is from the said civil parish boundary first south-eastward then north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the Old Pack-road to Rochdale (now a bridle-road) for a distance of twenty-six chains or thereabouts to a point at the junction of the said last-described bridle-road with the footpath leading past the south-western side of Dobb Wood to the house called or known as Woodland Cottage such point of junction being upon the boundary which divides the said civil parish of Middleton from the civil parish of Bury aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward and then north-eastward along the said civil parish boundary for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts thereby following in part the course of the last-described road to the point at the stream called or known as Cheesden Brook where the same civil parish boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the said new parish of Birkle otherwise Bircle or Birtle from the new parish of Saint James Ashworth in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first south-eastward then northward and then again south-eastward along the

last-mentioned boundary for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts thereby following the course of Cheesden Brook aforesaid to the point at the junction of the same brook with the stream called or known as Norden Water or Norden Brook aforesaid where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint James Ashworth from the new parish of Saint Luke Heywood aforesaid and extending thence generally northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of sixty-seven chains or thereabouts thereby following for the most part the course of the last-named stream to the point a little to the south of the weir at the head of the leat or goyt which supplies the Ashworth Woollen and Cotton Mill where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Luke Heywood from the new parish of Saint Paul Norden in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first generally eastward and then north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of forty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Paul Norden from that detached portion of the parish of Middleton aforesaid wherein Kenyon Fold is situate, and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its junction in the middle of that part of the said Rochdale Bamford and Bury Trust-road which is called or known as Wheelbarrow-lane with the boundary which divides the last-described portion of the said parish of Middleton from the new parish of Saint Clement Spotland in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Clement Spotland from that detached portion of the new parish of Saint Luke Heywood wherein the houses called or known as Meadow Croft are situate and extending thence first south-eastward then southward then again south-eastward and finally south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fifty-two chains or thereabouts to its junction in the River Roch aforesaid near the Broadalgh Fulling Mill with the boundary which divides the said detached portion of the new parish of Saint Luke Heywood aforesaid from the new parish of Saint Martin Castleton Moor in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of eleven and a half chains or thereabouts thereby following the course of the River Roch aforesaid to the point near the Meadow Croft Fulling Mill where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Martin Castleton Moor from that detached portion of the said parish of Middleton wherein Kenyon Fold is situate as aforesaid, and extending thence first southward then westward and then again southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts thereby continuing to follow the course of the River Roch aforesaid to the point opposite to the hill called or known as Crimble Brow where the said last-mentioned boundary is joined by the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Martin Castleton Moor from the new parish of Saint Luke Heywood aforesaid and extending thence first southward then westward then northward then north-westward then again westward, and then finally south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fifty-eight
