

new Bye-laws, provided that such Bye-laws be not repugnant to the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the same are to have effect. And that any such Bye-laws may impose reasonable penalties for offences against the same, not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, with or without further penalties, for continuing offences, not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for any day during which the offence continues, but that all Bye-laws shall be so framed as to allow in every case part only of the maximum penalty being ordered to be paid.

Now, in pursuance of the power given by "The Tramways Act, 1870," and of every other power enabling them thereto, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said borough of Portsmouth, acting by the Town Council of the said borough, as the Local Authority in that behalf, do make and ordain the following Bye-laws:—

1. No carriage using any tramway within the district of the said borough of Portsmouth, shall be driven on any such tramway at a greater speed than eight miles a hour.

2. No carriage using any tramway within the district of the said borough of Portsmouth, shall follow another carriage using any such tramway at a less distance from such other carriage than 50 yards, and no carriage shall be standing, or stop, or remain at one time, at any terminal station of a public thoroughfare, for a longer space than fifteen minutes.

For any breach of either of the two foregoing Bye-laws, the driver of a carriage shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.
