THE Corporation of Bury St. Edmunds have presented to His Majesty the following Address, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Cornwallis, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Suffolk; There has been likewise presented to His Majesty an Address from Suffron Walden; both which His Majesty received very graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Alderman, Assistant Justice, Chief Burgesses, and Burgesses of the Common Council of Your Majesties Ancient Borough of Bury St. Edmunds in the County of Suffolk.

Present us (Great SIR!) to approach You with all the Reverence and respectful Duty of Subjects, highly transported with Your Majesties unparalleled and generous Enterprize of our Deliverance from Popery and Arbitrary Power; which did not only threaten, but became absolute Conquerors over our Ancient Laws, undoubted Liberties, and Establish'd Religion. 'Tis to You alone, (Great SIR!) under Heaven, to whom we owe the great Blessings of our present and future Happiness in the Enjoyment of them. 'Tis to Your most illustrious Majesty that our Lives and Fortunes are but just Requisitions for this Generous Redemption. And 'tis under Your Majesties most Auspicious Reign, that we hope to see all Great, Good, and Glorious Things prosper and flourish. May Your days be many, and Your Arms as successful as they are terrible to all Violators of Oaths and Constitutions of Government, contrary to the known Laws and Edicts of the same. Sealed with our Common Seal, and Signed by us this fifth day of October, in the year of our LORD One thousand six hundred eighty and nine, and in the First Year of Your Majesties Reign, &c.

To the King and Queen's Most Excellent Majesties,

The humble Address of the Members, Freemen, and Inhabitants of Your Majesties Corporation of Suffron Walden.

May it please Your Majesties,

WHILE Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, being highly sensible of the Oppressions of Popery and arbitrary Power we lately were in danger to endure, we humbly beg leave to return our humble and hearty Thanks to Your Sacred Majesties for the great hazards You have exposed Your selves unto, in becoming (under GOD) our Deliverers from the same. And as therefore we do (as in Duty bound,) humbly present our selves ready at all times to defend Your Majesties Sacred Persons and Governments, and the Protestant Religion by Law establish'd, against all Your Majesties and its Enemies. So that Your Majesties may enjoy long and happy Reigns over us, are the humble and hearty Desires and Prayers of

Your Majesties most Dutiful and Faithful Subjects.

Rome, Sept. 24. On the 18th Instant the Cardinal *V. Conti* arrived here; and the next day entered into the Conclave; from whence the Cardinal *Spinola*, Governor of this City, has been forced by his Indisposition to withdraw. The same day the Cardinal *Colonna* declared, that he would transfer his 16 Votes that were given him, to the Cardinal *Barbarigo* Bishop of *Padua*; the Cardinals *Chigi*, *Altieri*, *Gravina*, *Santa*, and *Sofiana*; concurred therein, and procured for him in all 30 Votes, so that he wanted but 4 to be chosen Pope. *Barbarigo* went to *Altieri* and *Chigi* to thank them for their good will towards him, but without acquainted them, that they laboured in vain, for that in case he was Elected he would not accept the Papal Dignity; however the Negotiations on his behalf were continued the next day; but *Barbarigo* kept the Door of his Cell shut, and when *Chigi*, *Altieri*, *Medici*, and *Este* came to speak with him, he desired to be excused from seeing them. On the 22th *Barbarigo* sent, by his Confessor, his Thanks to the Conclave, and desired them not to think of choosing him; *Chigi* continues notwithstanding to make all the Interest he can for him; but has a considerable Party against him. There are Endeavours likewise using for *Carpegna*, but hitherto with little success. The Prince of *Lichtenstein*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, arrived here last Tuesday, and is lodged in the Palace of the Cardinal of *Medici*. And yesterday the French Cardinals *Bouillon*, *Bonzi*, and *Furstenberg*; and the Duke de *Chaulnes*, (who came by Sea to *Civita Vecchia*) likewise arrived, bringing with them a great Sum of Money. And tomorrow these Cardinals will enter into the Conclave, where there will be then 53 Cardinals. In the mean time the usual Compliments have passed between them and the College of Cardinals; except the Cardinal *Colonna*, who will have no Communication with *Furstenberg*, as being a declared Enemy of the Emperor and the Empire. The Duke de *Chaulnes* has given notice to the Cardinals of his arrival as Ambassador from France; and has, it's said, declared, that the King his Master is willing to restore *Avignon*. The French Gallies continue at *Civita Vecchia*.

Venice, Sept. 30. We have Letters from our Fleet of the 25th of the last month; but they only tell us, that they continued their Attacks against the Fortres of *Malvasia*, and hoped to besuddenly Masters of it.

From the Imperial Camp near Nissa in Servia, Sept. 25. Prince *Louis* of *Baden* having advice, that the Seraskier had received a Reinforcement of 20000 Men, and had posted himself near *Nissa*, he resolved to march thither; accordingly the Army decamped the 23, and came the next day in sight of the Enemy, who lay so advantageously intrench'd, that it was at first doubted whether we should attack them, but relying upon the Divine Assistance, it was resolved in a Council of War to force their Camp; we thereupon advanced; and the Enemy came out of their Intrenchments to meet us. The Fight began about five in the Evening, and continued till it was dark, when the Enemy fled, abandoning their Camp, Cannon, and Baggage, as likewise the Town of *Nissa*, which our Troops entered the next morning, and found there 29 pieces of Cannon, and great Stores of Arms, Ammunition, and Provisions. Of the Enemy (who were 40000 strong) above 6000 were killed and drowned in the *Morava*, and had not the night hindered our pursuit, the Slaughter would have been much greater. The farther Particulars you may expect by our next.

Vienna, Oct. 2. This afternoon arrived here, the Baron de *Hauck* from the Imperial Army in *Servia*, being sent to the

the Emperor, with the News of the entire defeat of the Turks near *Nissa*.

Frankfurt, Oct. 9. Yesterday were published here the Imperial *Avocators* against *France*. The Bavarian Forces have pass'd the *Neckar* at *Hydelberg*; It's believed their design is to join those commanded by Count *Sering*, which are posted on the Frontiers of *Saxia*. The Duke of *Durero* lies encamped near *Langencandel*.

From the Camp before Bonn, Oct. 11. The Orders being given for Storming the Outworks on the 9th Instant, after the appointed Signal, the Assault was begun about 4 in the afternoon by 8000 Men of the Troops of *Brandenburg*, *Holland*, and *Munster*, who pushed on their Attacks with that vigour and undauntedness, that not regarding the Enemies Mines, (which as it happened they sprang with little success) and having cut in pieces all that opposed them, they were in less than two hours Masters of the Counter-carp and two Ravelins. The Imperialists at the same time made an Assault upon the Hornwork, which they took with little loss, (the Enemy springing their Mines on that side likewise without any effect) and afterwards advanced to the Counter-carp, where they lodged themselves. In this Action it's reckoned we had about 900 Men killed and wounded, the Lieutenant-Generals *Delwich* and *Swartz* were slightly wounded, and the Colonels *Swerin* and *Crisjenack* killed, with several other Officers killed and wounded. And the Enemy lost about 600 Men. The next day the Besieged beat a Parley, and the Hostages being exchanged three Officers were sent out, who brought with them a Project of Articles, one whereof was, That 20 Persons should be permitted to march out Masked, but these being rejected, they desired the same Conditions that were granted to those of *Mentz*: On the other side, his Electoral Highness would grant them no other Terms than to march out without Arms or Baggage. But the Treaty still continues, and it's believed it will be adjusted before night; in the mean time our Miners are at work, and we have lodged our selves in the Ditch, &c. The Duke of *Lorraine* has received by an Express the news of a second Defeat of the Turks in *Servia*.

Cologne, Oct. 11. The Confederates before *Bonne* took the Outworks on the 9th Instant by Storm, whereupon the Garrison desired a Parley, and it's believed the Capitulation is agreed on seeing we hear no more shooting.

Brussels, Oct. 14. The Spanish and Dutch Armies are still encamped within two Leagues of *Leuze*; where the *Marschal d'Humieres* has posted himself between two Rivers, and has belides fortified his Camp with Intrenchments and Redoubts. On the 12th Instant our Generals to draw the Enemy to a Skirmish, and thereby to a Battle, sent out two Parties of about 120 Men each, who were supported by 2000 Foot and 3000 Horse under the command of the Prince of *Vaudemont*. They shewed themselves in sight of the Enemies Camp, but all they could do could not oblige them to stir. We expect every minute to hear of the surrender of *Bon*, the Garrison having desired a Parley after the taking of the Counter-carp, and sent out Deputies to adjust the Articles of Capitulation. The Troops of *Hannover*, to the number of 8000, are on their march towards *Brabant*, in pursuance of the late Treaty concluded between that Duke and our Governor-General. The *Marquis de Boufflers*, being reinforced with a Detachment from the Army commanded by the Duke of *Durero*, has pass'd the *Moselle* at *Thionville*, in order to meet some other Troops that are marching to join him.

Hague, Oct. 14. The Victory obtained by the Imperialists over the Turks at *Nissa*; and the taking of the Outworks of *Bon* by Storm is the great News that at present entertains us. We expect every hour to hear that *Bon* is surrendered. They write from *Flanders*, that our Army would decamp as this day, and march towards the Enemy.

Edinburgh, Oct. 2. On the first Instant a Proclamation was published here for Adjourning the Parliament from the 8th of *October*, to the 20th of *December* thereafter. Major General *Mackay* is gone to Visit the Garrisons in the North; and particularly that at the *Blair* of

Ashol. We are in daily expectation of the arrival of the Danish Forces, which are to pass from hence to *Ireland*.

Newmarket, Oct. 7. Yesterday the Vice-Chancellor, with the Heads of Houses, and the other Doctors, Proctors and Masters of Arts of the University of *Cambridge*, in their Scarlets and Formalities waited upon the King; The Vice-Chancellor Addressed himself to his Majesty in a very Handsom Speech, and proper to the Occasion: To which His Majesty returned a most Gracious Answer. And then they were one by one presented by his Grace the Duke of *Somerset* their Chancellor, and admitted to Kiss His Majesties Hand. And this day His Majesty was pleased to do the University the Honour to go to *Cambridge*, where there was prepared a very great and sumptuous Entertainment; Of which a particular Account will be given in the next *Gazette*.
