The Imperialists at the fame time made an Affault upon the Hornwork, which they took with little loss, (the Enemy springing their Mines on that side likewise without any effect) and afterwards advanced to the Counterfearp, where they lodged themfelves. In this Action it's reckones we had about 900 Men killed and wounded, the Lieurenant-Generals Delwich and Swarts were flightly wounded, and the Colone's Swarm and Grujenack killed, with several other Officers killed and wounded. And the Enemy lost about 600 Men. The next day the Besieged beat a Parley, and the Hostages being exchanged three Officers were sent out, who brought with them a Project of Articles, one whereof was, That ap Persistent of the Company of the Persistent of fons should be permitted to march out Masked, but thele being rejected, they defired the same Conditions that were ranted to those of Mentz: On the other side, his Electoral Highness would grant them no other Terms than to march out without Arms or Baggage. Hague, Off. 14. The Victory obtained by the Imperialits, over the Turks at Nise; and the taking of the Outworks of Bon by Storm is the great News that at present entertains us. We expect every hour to hear that Bon is surrendred. They write from Flanders, that our Army would decamp as this day, and march towards the Enemy.

Edinburgh, Off. 2. On the first Instant a Proclamation was published here for Adjourning the Parliament from the 8th of Officer, to the 20th of December thereafter. Major General Mackey is gone to Vilit the Garisons in the North; and particularly that at the Blair of Athol. We are in daily expectation of the arrival of the Danish Forces, which are to pais from hence to Ireland.
