By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. The area declared, by Order of Council dated the eleventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely)—the petty sessional divisions of Bedford, Biggleswade, and Sharnbrook, in the county of Bedford, and the borough of Bedford,—is, except the petty sessional division of Sharnbrook, hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area, except as aforesaid, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area or part of an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

3. The petty sessional division of Sharnbrook, in the county of Bedford, shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease. *C. L. Peel.*

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. The area declared, by Order of Council dated the twenty-fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, to be an area

infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely),—the county of Derby, and the boroughs of Chesterfield, Derby, and Glossop,—is, except the petty sessional divisions of Belper, Chesterfield, Derby, and Eckington, hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area, except as aforesaid, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area or part of an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

3. The petty sessional divisions of Belper, Chesterfield, Derby, and Eckington, in the county of Derby, shall continue to be and are hereby declared to be an area or areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease. *C. L. Peel.*

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. The area declared, by Order of Council dated the tenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely)—the whole of the county of Essex, and the boroughs of Colchester, Harwich, Maldon, and Saffron Walden, except the lands and buildings at the Victoria Docks, and at Thames Haven, and at Harwich, respectively approved by the Privy Council for the landing and lairage of foreign animals,—is, except the petty sessional divisions of Beacontree, Brentwood, Chelmsford, Epping, Hinckford North, Hinckford South, Lexden and Winstree, Orsett, and Tendring, hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area, except as aforesaid, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area or part of an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.
