Rome, Octob. 1.

**O**n the 24 instant the Duke de *Chaulnes* demanded an Audience of the Conclave as Ambassador from France; but he was answered that the College of Cardinals would not admit him thereunto before he had renounced the Franchizes of his Quarter, and that *Avignon* was restored. The 26th the French Cardinals *Bouillon*, *Borzi*, and *Furstenberg* entred into the Conclave, The 29th the Count of *Lichtenstein*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor; had Audience of the Conclave, and recommended the chooing of the Worthiest amongst them to fill the Papal Chair. The Cardinal *Cibo* answered, That they hoped to make such a Choice as would be to the general satisfaction. To morrow the Duke of *Chaulnes* is to have his Audience, the French Cardinals having prevailed with the Conclave in this Point, upon Condition that he renounce the Franchizes during the vacancy of the See. In the mean time there appears a great Party for Cardinal *Octoboni*, and in all probability he will be chosen Pope. He is a Noble Venetian, aged about 80 years.

*Venice*, October 8. We hear by a small Vessel come from *Regusa*, that the Doge *Morosini* arrived on the Twenty seventh of the last Month in the Bay of *Cattaro*, being on his return hither: The Magistrates of *Health* thereupon immediately ordered preparations to be made for his Serenity, to perform his Quarantine at *Spalatro*; and several Persons of Quality will go and wait on his Serenity there, so soon as they have the Confirmation of this news.

*Milan*, Oct. 5. Our Governour has appointed a general review of the Forces of this State; and intends to form an Army of 8 or 9000 Foot and 3000 Horse, which are to encamp near *Pavia*; whither divers Wagons have been already sent from hence with Bombs and Ammunition. The Resident of *Savoy* seems very jealous of this preparation, and has of late sent several Exprefses to *Turin*.

*Vienna*, Oct. 9. We have now received a more particular account of the late signal Victory obtained over the Turks at *Nissa*, which we will give you in our next. The last Letters from the Army said, that their Parties had been as far as *Mitroovax*, between *Nissa* and *Sophia*, without meeting with any of the Enemies Troops.

*Francfort*, Oct. 12. The Elector of *Bavaria* marches with his Forces towards *Hailbron*. The Saxons take the same way, except two Regiments that are ordered to possess themselves of several Posts in the Country of *Saxe Lawenbu*.

From the Camp before *Bon*, October 18. The 10th instant the Besieged beat a Parly and sent out three Officers to treat about the Articles of Surrender, which were finally concluded and signed on the 12th instant; and are as follow.

The Capitulation concluded between his Electoral Highness of *Brandenburgh*, as well in the Name of his Imperial Majesty, as in his own, and of his Allies, to wit, the

States-General of the United Provinces, and the Bishop of *Munster* on the one part; and the Count of *Asfeld*, Marechal de *Camp* of the French King's Armies, on the other.

I. That the Garrison shall march out of *Bonne* two days after the Signing of the Capitulation with their Arms and Baggage, Ball in Mouth, Drums beating, Trumpets sounding, Ensigns and Standards display'd, Match lighted at both ends, Having their Baneliers fill'd, Muskets and Pikes on their Shoulders, the Cavalry on Horseback, with their Swords in their Hands, and the Dragoons also on Horseback with their Fusils advanced, and all their Equipage. But as for the Standards and Colours of the Foreign Troops, they shall not be carried away, but shall be delivered up to his Electoral Highness when the Garrison marches out.

II. That all the Officers and Commissaries of Provisions and the Artillery, the Post-Master, Engineers, and all other Officers and Subjects of the French King (who are now in the Town,) shall have Liberty to depart with all their Equipage; but the Intendant Heits, and the other Intendants, Commissaries of War, Treasurers, Commissaries and Receivers of Contributions, shall remain Prisoners of War.

III. That the Garrison shall be conducted by the best and shortest way to *Thionvil*, with a sufficient Convoiy of the Troops of his Electoral Highness of *Brandenburgh*, commanded by a Colonel; and that they shall agree upon the Cities, Towns, and Villages, where they shall every night lodge, which shall not be above 3 or 4 French Leagues asunder: That they shall be furnished with all necessary Provisions at reasonable Rates; that they shall rest the fourth day: And Hostages shall be given for the due performance of this Article.

IV. That all the Cannon, Provisions, and Ammunition of War shall remain in the Town at the disposal of his Electoral Highness and his Allies.

V. That they shall carry away no Gold or Silver, except what belongs to the Garrison, as well Officers as Soldiers, all the rest shall be left without fraud, for which the Intendants and Receivers shall be responsible; and if any Deceit be committed in this Article, the whole Capitulation shall be void.

VI. That Boats shall be provided at *Bonne* to transport the sick and wounded to *Mont-Royal*, with a sufficient Convoiy, and all things necessary for them.

VII. That the whole Garrison, as well Officers as Soldiers, shall be free from Trouble upon account of any Act of Hostility by them committed, or of exacting Contributions, till this present time.

VIII. That all the Prisoners in the Town, whether Military or Politick, of his Electoral Highness, or his Allies, particularly of the Archbishopsricks of *Cologne* and *Trier*, and the Duchies of *Juliers* and *Bergues*, shall be released.

IX. That the day before their marching out 60 Wagons with 4 Horses each, shall be provided for the Baggage of the Officers at a reasonable Rate.

X. That after the Signing of the Capitulation the Star-Gate shall be delivered up to his Electoral Highness, who shall appoint a Guard there of 300 Men, under an Officer of Note, to prevent Disorders.

XI. That such of the sick and wounded, as cannot at present be conveniently removed, may remain in the Town at their own Expence, and after their Recovery, shall have Passports given them to retire to France.

XII. That the Foreign Officers and Soldiers, amongst whom are likewise comprehend'd the *Lorrainers*, and those of the Re-united Countries, shall not march out with the Garrison, but shall be obliged to enter into the Service of his Electoral Highness, or his Allies, or else shall have Passports, to return home: Yet if among those Foreign Troops there be any born Subjects of the French King, they shall have Liberty to march out with the Garrison.

XIII. All that shall be found to have been taken out of the Churches, Convents, and other Religious places in the Town,

Town, after which an exact Enquiry shall be made by Commissioners on both Sides, shall be restored. The Burgers shall be permitted to search for the Goods that have been taken from them, and what can be found, shall be restored; and all Debts contracted in the Town shall be paid.

XIV. All that shall be found belonging to the late Elector of Cologne, or to the Electress, shall be restored. And all Persons shall be obliged to discover, as far as they know, what is become of the things that are missing. The Papers and Records belonging to the Archbishoprick of Cologne shall remain entire. And all the Goods and Movables of the Cardinal of Furtemberg and his Ministers, which are still in the Town, shall be left there; and the Persons in whose Hands they are, shall be obliged to give an exact Inventory of them.

XV. They shall be obliged to discover all the Mines, and to give a List of the Magazines and Provisions.

XVI. They shall restore all that shall be found belonging to Count Schomberg.

XVII. His Electoral Highness does oblige himself, on the part of his Imperial Majesty and his Allies, that all this Capitulation, shall be punctually observed on their part. Given at the Camp before Ron, October 12. 1689.

The same day 300 Men of the Troops of Brandenburg, Holland, and Munster, took Possession of one of the Gates of the Town. And on the 15th the Garrison (which at the beginning of the Siege consisted of about 7000 Men) marched out to the number of 3500; and 1500 remained sick and wounded in the Town. The Governour, Count Alselt, was carried out in a Litter, being very much wounded. The next day, after a Thanksgiving to Almighty GOD for this happy Success, all our Artillery was thrice discharged, which was followed with three salvo's of small Shot. There are now in Bonn three Battalions of the Brandenburg, Dutch, and Munster Forces, under the Command of 3 Colonels, who are to Command by Turns. His Electoral Highness parted from hence yesterday for Cleves; and having made a short stay there, intends to go to Aushourg. Our Troops have already made Incurions into the Country of Luxemburg.

Cologne, Octob. 18. The Imperial Troops that were before Bonn passed the Rhine this day, and are marched towards Franckfort. The Elector of Brandenburg is gone to Cleves, to receive the Homage of the States of that Country; after which his Electoral Highness will repair to Aushourg: From whence we hear, that his Imperial Majesty had received advice by an Express, that the Cardinal Ortoborni was chosen Pope on the 6th instant; and that he had taken the Name of Alexander VIII.

Brussels, Octob. 19. On the 14th instant Prince Vaudemont appeared again with a strong Detachment in light of the Enemies Camp, but they kept very close. The next day the Marechal d'Humieres decamped, and retired under the Cannon of Tournay. It's believed our Army will decamp likewise to morrow. Our Governour General has sent the Marquis de Wammels to Complement the Duke of Hanover who arrived the 14th instant at Amberg. The 8000 men, of his Troops, that are to enter into the Service of these Countries have passed the Meuse at Venlo.

Hague, Octob. 21. The Dutch Army is broke up and gone into Winter-quarters, which 7000 Horse are to have near the French Frontiers. We hear that Cardinal Ortoborni is chosen Pope.

Paris, Octob. 19. We had the News yesterday, by an Express from Rome, that Cardinal Ortoborni was chosen Pope on the 6th instant: He is a Noble Venetian by Birth, about 80 years old.

Edinburgh, Octob. 10. The English Troops designed from hence for Ireland set sail the 7th instant with a fair Wind. Major General Mackay returned hither this day from the North.

Falmouth, Octob. 10. On Monday last came in here Their Majesties Ships the St. Albans and the Dover; and put to Sea again the day following.

Plymouth, Octob. 12. Yesterday failed from hence about 40 Sail of Merchant Ships, bound for New England, Virginia, New-found land, &c. under the Convoy of Their Majesties Ships the Coronation, the George, the Samuel and Henry, and the Success. The same day failed the Foresight and the Mardax, to joyn the Squadron that's cruising, under the command of the Lord Berkeley, to the Westward.

Fulham, Octob. 13. This day the Right Reverend Dr. Edward Smeeth late Dean of St. Pauls, Bishop Elect of Worcester, Dr. Simon Parrick late Dean of Peterborough, Bishop Elect of Chichester, and Dr. Gilbert Horliday, late Warden of Wadham Colledge in Oxford, Bishop Elect of Bristol, were Consecrated in the Chapel of this Palace, by the Bishops of London, St. Asaph, and Rochester, by virtue of a Commission granted to them in that behalf.

Whitehall, Oct. 14. This day the Right Honorable Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery, late Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty to the States General of the United Provinces, was Sworn one of the Lords of His Majesties most Honorable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.
