Trooper Thomas Whitehorn, Landrey's Light Horse, killed while on picquet duty, 24th March; Matebe Camp. Family resides in Grahamstown.

Trooper S. Gelderbloem, Landrey's Light Horse, killed while on picquet duty, 24th March; Matebe Camp. Family resides in Grahamstown.

Trooper W. A. Easton, Landrey's Light Horse, wounded while on picquet duty, 24th March; Matebe Camp. Family resides in Grahamstown.

Corporal Edwin Lloyd Stockling, Kimberley Horse, killed while on cattle guard, 24th March; Matebe Camp. Formerly Assistant Steward in the Union Company. Parents reside at Tangley, near Andover, Hampshire, England.

Lieutenant Robert Mundy, 1st City Volunteers, heart disease, 29th March; Mafeteng. Father resides in Grahamstown.

Private Thomas Seckonyella, Mafeteng Contingent, fever, 29th March; Mafeteng.

Private Tom Makuruana, Mohale's Hoek Contingent, dysentery, 31st March; Mafeteng.

Trooper William Wenlock, Sterk Spruit Volunteers, died 26th January, at Kylesmore, from injuries caused by waggon accident on the 5th January at Barkly. Born in England; was a married man.

**T**HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under

The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. The following area (namely),—the Petty Sessional Division of Tewkesbury, in the county of Gloucester, and the borough of Tewkesbury,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

**T**HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. The following area (namely),—the parishes of Barnetby-le-Wold, Melton Ross, Kirmington, Croxton, Great Limber, Keelby, Searby-cum-Owmy, Grasby, Clixby, and Cadney-cum-Howsham, in the petty sessional division of Brigg, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, which was declared by Order of Council to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

3. So much of the petty sessional division of Spilsby, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, as is bounded on the north by the road leading from Burgh to Ingoldmells Mill, commencing at the north-west corner of a field called the Far Meadow, the property of Mr. R. S. Stephenson, and proceeding eastwardly so far as the road leading from Ingoldmells Mill to Winthorpe, on the east by the last-named road so far as a cottage in the occupation of Henry Coupland, on the south by a line drawn from such cottage to the south-west corner of a field belonging to Mr. Robert Wright, (adjoining a field called the Far Four Acres belonging to Mr. Samuel Raithby,) and on the west by the fences on the west sides of the following fields all adjoining, namely,—a field belonging to Mr. Ashlin Cutforth, two fields called respectively the Six Acres and Seg Close belonging to Mr. Henry Searby, a field called the Seven Acres belonging to Mr. William Coupland, a field called Guide Post Three Acres belonging to Mr. Charles Acred, and the before-named field called the Far Meadow belonging to Mr. R. S. Stephenson, exclusive of the above-named boundary roads, and which area includes portions of the parishes of Addlethorpe, Ingoldmells, and Winthorpe, shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.
