Rome, Octob. 8.

**O**N the First Instant, 40 days after the opening of the Conclave, a Scrutiny being made, there were found so many Votes for Cardinal *Ottoboni*, a Venetian, Bishop of *Porto*, and Sub-Dean of the College of Cardinals, aged 79 years and 5 Months, that every body concluded the Election would fall upon him. The next day the Duke de *Chaulnes*, Ambassador Extraordinary of *France*, had Audience of the Conclave, and was afterwards Complimented by all the Cardinals. The days following Cardinal *Chigi* continued to labour very earnestly on the Behalf of *Ottoboni*; and gained the Party of *Odescalchi*. Of the Four French Cardinals only *d'Espre* voted at first for him; but the Cardinal de *Medicis* for *Spain*, and the Duke de *Chaulnes* for *France*, concurring therein, on the 6th instant in the morning he was chosen Pope. This Election was confirmed by all the Cardinals upon another Scrutiny in the Evening, and thereupon Cardinal *Maldachini*, the first of the Cardinal Deacons, declared to the People, who were assembled in the Place of *St. Peter*; That Cardinal *Peter Ottoboni* was Elected Pope, and that he had taken the name of *Alexander VIII.* Which was followed, with a treble discharge of the Cannon from the Cattle of *St. Angela*. The Gates of the Conclave being opened, the publick Adoration was performed, the Pope sitting on the Altar in the Chapel, with a white Mitre on his head, where the Duke de *Chaulnes*, as Ambassador of *France*, made his Submissions to him, and offered, in the name of the King his Master, the restitution of *Avignon*. The Pope was afterwards carried to the Church of *St. Peter*, and from thence, having received the usual Compliments of the Cardinals, to the Church of *St. John de Lateran*, the Duke de *Chaulnes* performing the customary Functions as Ambassador of *France*. At night there were Bonfires in all the Streets, with Illuminations and all other Expressions of an universal Joy, which were again repeated last night, as they will be this; And on Sunday next will be performed the Ceremony of the Coronation. The Pope, the same Evening he was chosen, sent for his Nephew, Don *Pietro*, to the Palace; who the next day went to visit the French Ambassador, and was presented by the Cardinal *Astieri* with a very rich Coach. We have advice that the Cardinal *Ranuzzi*, late Nuncio at the Court of *France*, dyed the 27th of the last Month at *Fano*. There are now 11 Places vacant in the College of Cardinals.

*Warsaw*, Septemb. 30. The Tartars, since the raising the Siege of *Gamimec*, have made an Incurſion within seven Leagues of *Slozow*, where the King of *Poland* then was, and carried away with them a Gentleman, with his Wife and all his Family. They have made another Incurſion towards *Kiovia*: And one of their Parties entred into the *Ukraine*, and advanced as far as *Nemierow*; but it's reported that the *Moscovites* and *Cossacks* fell upon them in their Return, cut off most of them, and recovered greatest part of the Booty they had taken. We hear that the *Chant of Tartars* dyed at *Budak* about the beginning of this month.

*Vienna*, Oct. 16. We have an account from the Imperial Army in *Serwia*, that Prince *Louis* of *Baden* had resolved to Attack *Nicopolis*, *Widen*, and some other places, si-

tuated on the *Danube*: In order whereunto he had directed several Pieces of Cannon for BATTERY, with Mortars Bombs, &c. to be sent thither by Water from *Belgrade*.

*Amburg*, Octob. 20. The Elector Palatine arrived here yesterday. His Imperial Majesty has approved of the Resolution of the States of the Empire for the Removing the Imperial Chamber to *Wetzlar*.

*Frankfort*, Octob. 23. The Duke of *Lorraine* is expected here to-morrow in his way to *Amburg*, in the mean time the Troops are going into their Winter Quarters.

*Bon*, Octob. 25. The Generals *Spain* and *Witt* are gone to *Clerck*, to receive the Electoral Highness's final Orders about the Winter Quarters. This day the Dutch Troops that were employed in this Siege began to decamp, having Orders to march towards the *Meuse*.

*Cologne*, Octob. 24. The Imperial Troops that were before *Bon* are marching towards *Frankfort*, their Winter Quarters being appointed, as we hear, within the Circles of *Franconia* and *Swabia*. The *Brandenburgers* will, it's believed, take their Station between the *Rhine*, the *Meuse*, and the *Moselle*; and the Troops of *Munster* on the other side of the *Rhine*. It's said that the *Suisse* Cantons seem inclined to recall their Troops out of the French Service.

*Hamburg*, Oct. 18. The Elector of *Saxony* has taken Possession of part of the Estate of the Duke of *Saxe-Lauenburg* lately deceased; to which the Elector of *Brandenburg* and the Princes of *Lauenburg* have likewise Pretensions. Their Ministers have had several Conferences in order to accommodate this Matter; and in the mean time the Duke of *Zell*, as General of the Circle of the *Lower Saxony*, has put Garisons into *Lauenburg*, *Ratzeburg*, and *Mollen*. The *Suedes* that are in the Service of the Duke of *Holftein* continue to work with great diligence on the new Fortifications at *Temmingen*.

*Brussels*, Octob. 28. The French Army under the *Marschal d'Humieres*, being broke up, and the Troops gone into Garison, the *Spanish* and *Dutch* Forces will likewise decamp to-morrow, in order to go into their Winter Quarters. Several Regiments have in the mean time been sent to *Mons*, *Charleroy*, and *Namur*; and it's believed a good Garison will be put into *Nieuille*, a considerable Post between *Mons* and *Charleroy*. The 8000 Men of the Troops of *Hathler*, to wit, 3000 Horse and 5000 Foot, are arrived in this Province, having passed the *Meuse* at *Verlo*. The Forces of *Liege*, with a Detachment of the Garison of *Maestricht*, are marched towards *Stavelot* and *Malmody*; and it's believed they will be reinforced with some Troops of *Brandenburg* and *Munster*, to hinder the French from burning and destroying the Country on that side.

*Paris*, Octob. 29. It is confirmed that the French have made, or rather bought, a Peace

of the *Algerines*, and that upon dishonourable Terms too, which are therefore not made public here. Commissions are given out for new Levies, which are it is said to amount to 20000 men. The *Marschal de Lorge* assembles the Troops which he is to command in the Neighborhood of *Sedan*. We have an account of the Death of the *Baron d'Alfeld*, late Governor of *Bon*, occasioned by the Wounds he received in the Siege. They write from *Venice* of the 8th instant; That the *Doge*, having left the Fleet before *Napoli di Malvasia* under the Command of the General Officers, arrived on the 27th past in the Bay of *Catara*, from whence he intended to continue his Voyage homeward, with five Gallies: The same Letters tell us, That the Disorders continued in the Isle of *Cyprus*, where the people would no longer obey the *Bassa*; and that two Christian Privateers, fitted out against the Turks, had been engaged off of *la Kalona* with five Corsairs of *Tripoly*, and after a long Fight had taken one of them.

*Plymouth*, Octob. 18. On the 16th instant the Lord *Berkeley* came into this Port with the Squadron under his Command from the Westward. The same day arrived here the *Recheber*, from the *East-Indies*: There came in her Company the *Nathaniel of London*, till within 100 Leagues of the *Lizard*, where she foundred, but all the Men and most of the rich Goods, were saved: The 16th likewise sailed from hence Their Majesties Ship the *Pendennis*, with the homeward bound Ships, for the Downs. Yesterday arrived here the *Margaret of London* from *London*. A Dutch Privateer brought in a French Banker. And this day were brought in four Prizes more, one of which is a French Privateer, another a Ship bound home from the *West-Indies*, and the other two Bankers.

*Portsmouth*, Octob. 19. Yesterday arrived at *Cowes* the *Deering*, (one of the *Hudsons-Bay* Companies Ships, Captain *James Young* Commander) from *Perr Nelson*, in the *North-West* parts of *America*; from whence he departed on the third of *September* last with a very considerable Cargo of *Beaver*, having left that Factory, and another of the Companies, called *New-Sereno*, in a very good Condition, under the Government of Captain *George Geyer*; and brings advice likewise, That the Company had settled a new Factory in *Churchil-River*, which is like to turn to a very good account.

At the Camp at *Dundalk*, Octob. 13. Since my departure, Colonel *Langton's* Regiment of Horse, Colonel *Hastings's* Regiment of Foot, and Colonel *Heyford's* Dragoons, which came from *Scotland*, have joyned us; and Sir *John Lanier's*

Regiment of Horse is daily expected. The Irish Army is retired towards *Drogheda*.

*Chester*, Octob. 21. We hear by several Persons who came from *Carlisle* on Thursday last, that our Army continued encamp'd at *Dumdalke*, being very well supplied with all manner of Necessaries. And that the Irish were retired to *Drogheda*.

*Westminster*, Octob. 23. This day the Parliament met again after a short Prorogation; and His Majesty was pleased to refer them to what He said to both Houses on the 19 of this month.
