NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 102.)—NORTH ATLANTIC OCEAN.

Floating Wreck northward of Cape Finisterre.
INFORMATION has been published in the Journal Officiel of 10th June, 1881, Paris, that a French ship reports having passed the hull of a vessel, apparently of large tonnage, some timbers visible, head and stern cut down, in lat. 44° 43' N., long. 9° 27' W.—about 110 miles northward of Cape Finisterre.

This wreck presents a danger to shipping.

In this locality the drift current may be considered to set in an E.S.E. direction (true) at the rate of about one mile an hour.

(No. 103.)—EASTERN ARCHIPELAGO.—SUMATRA—WEST COAST.—PISANG HARBOUR.

(1.) *Proposed Light on Pulo Pisang.*

THE Netherlands Government has given notice, dated 23rd April, 1881, that it is proposed to establish a light on the summit of Pulo Pisang (Pisang Kroé), Pisang Harbour.

Position, lat. 5° 9' S., long. 103° 55' E.

(2.) *Harbour Light at Probolingó.*

Also, with reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 12 (5), of 20th January, 1877, on the proposed establishment of a harbour light at Probolingó, south side of Madura Strait.

Further notice has been given, dated 23rd April, 1881, that the lighthouse is in course of construction on the western harbour mole, and that the light will be a fixed white light.

CHINA SEA—GULF OF SIAM.

(3.) *Sunken Rock in Channel North-West of Koh Tron.*

Information has been received of the existence of a sunken rock lying in the northern part of the channel between Koh Tron (Phu-Quoc) and Water Island, eastern shore of the Gulf of Siam :—

This danger (Cape Clear Rock) on which the British vessel "Cape Clear" is stated to have struck, was found, by a boat sent to examine the locality, to have 4 feet water over a flat summit, yellow in colour, and about 10 feet square ; it lies with the following bearings, viz. :—

East extreme of Water Island, N. 50° W.

South extreme of Water Island, S. 73° W.

N.W. point, Koh Tron, South.

At the distance of about half a cable southward of Cape Clear Rock, a depth of 14 feet was found, and at about three-quarters of a cable 23 feet.

[The bearings as given are magnetic. Variation 2° Easterly in 1881.]
