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Pon the arrival here of two Ketches, within few houres one of another; the first reporting she Dutch to be before Oftend with 26, the other with 30 sail of Ships, Sir Christopher Minnes set sail this day about noon with the Squadron, under his Command, to the Eastward, of whom, we hope, in sew days to hear more. A Ketch is now bringing in a light Prize, the next may give you a farther account of it.

Tarmouth, Feb. 2. This morning past by this Town, 20 sail of laden Colliers. We have advice of a Squadron of Dutch ships about the Gun fleet, of which, two are said to be Flag-ships.

Harmiel's, Feb. 3. This morning failed by us Westward, several ships, great and small, supposed to be Collies with a Convoy, who gave some salutes of Guns at Oasiey-Bay.

Plymouth, Feb. 2. The Antitope is ready to let fail, and shole of His Majesties Ships that suffered by the late storm, will be ready at farthest, in sour or five days to go to Sea. We have advice, this Evening from Dartmouth, That the Saphire, and the Forester, have brought a Vessel into Torbay, of about 400 Tuns, 16 Guns, and 35 Men, whom we question nor to be prize; the Pilot being Datch, and the Master a Frenchman, laden from Venice, with Oyl, Soap, Rice, Sherry, &c.

Lyn, Fan. 31. A small Barke of this Town laden with Salt, arrived here this day, who came on Wednesday last out of Tinmouth Haven, without Company or Convoy, till off Scarborough he sell in with the True-Love Fregot, (suspected to be lost) and went under his Convoy as far as Humber.

Amsterdam, Feb. 5. The onely note here is Money. Holland hath called to the Provinces for the nine Millions towards the old Fleet of the 72 Ships, and for the two Millions for the building the new ones; and considering the great arrears Zealand is in, especially for the entertainment of the Lunenburgh forces, two Deputies are to be sent to quicken them in those payments.

The States of East-Friesland have again remonstrated the inconveniencies they suffer from the Lunenburgh forces, demanding to be freed from them, and offering to secure their Countrey themselves by other means. On the other side, the Princess Dowager presses as hard, that the Commander of Lierost may keep certain Villages, she there mentions, in contribution; but yet she resules to send any person to treat about the matter.

The Sieur Colbert, Envoy hither from the French King, is said to speak much for an accommodation with the Bishop, though the truth be, we begin to smel his design is not to see the Bishop ruined, but to keep up the Ball for his own ends; and that he intends to send the Count of Furstenberg under hand, to assure the Bishop, he means not wholly to have him undone. In the mean time, though we are glad to hear from Parks, that King is now for good and all declaring for us; yet we are a little startled at a hint we finde given to our Envoy there, that the King expects now we should agree about the supream command of the Fleet, when his is joyned to ours; a matter, we wonder-any scruple should be made at, considering the rule that is given in the Treaty of 1635. by which, this is to be measured.

Five Companies are on the way from France hither, in exchange for the Daulphins, and d'Estrade hath been earnest for convenient Quarters to be forthwith assigned them, searing otherwise how they will rellish the service, considering the discepute it hath got in France from the hardships of the last Campagne.

Prince Matrice hath been desired forthwith to pass to Wefel, and that two or three Deputies of the States General, or of the Council of State, may accompany him with full power upon Communication with the Prince, to act as they shall see cause upon the place.

Hagre, Feb. 5. The States of Helland are met, and among other points to be deliberated, that of the choice of a General, in all appearance will be the most confiderable. De Witte at the sollicitation, as is supposed, of Monsseur Colbert, hath proposed Monsseur de Furenne to be the man, which his Collegues dislike; of whom, some would advance the Prince of Tarante, others, Monsseur de Schomberg, he that is in Portugal: But much the greater number of the States, and among them, Zealand more obstinately, stands firm for the Prince of Orange to be General, and Prince Maurice to be Mareshalof the Army. What the issue will shew.

The Bishop of Munster, we hear, both distributed a confiderable sum of money among his Arn y; in which it is certain, the common Troopers have received sour Rixdollars a man: And it is said, he hath given our Commissions for 2x Regiments more, so as to have his Army of 30000 Men complear next Spring.

Munster, Jan. 22. His Highnels the Ptince of Munster, has been for tome dates here very intent in perfecting his new Levies, and forming the Countells of next Spring, having in the mean time placed his Troops in very good Garrisons; the Foot most in the Enemies Countries, and the Horse in his own Townes. We have reason to think here that the Dukes of Lunenburgh grow cold in their intentions to Holland, and are concerting how they may with best security to themselves, and decency to the World, break off their Contract of Succors with Holland. Towards which, it is said, they have resolved to send a six person into England, to make their excuse to His Majesty of G eat Brittaine, for what they have already done, justifying themselves upon their want of a more early knowledge, of the true grounds and defign of this Princes Armes.

Brussells, Feb. 5. In consequence of the late Enterview, held at Tervers between the Marquels de Castel Rodrigo our Governour, and the Count de Furstenberg Bishop of Strasburg, on the part of the Elector of Colen; We have advice here that the Duke of Newburgh, and the Elector of Colen are hastning their new Levies, in which the Duke of Brunswick Hannover, and several of their Neighbour Prince are taid to joyn with them, resolving to preserve the Peace of the Empire according to the Treaty of Munster, and their late Alliance of the Rhine, against any Forraign Princes, that should upon any pretence whatever march into the Empire. Which, the French, it is said, are much surprised at.

Genoua, Jan. 20. Centurion's Squadron of 3 Ships is arrived here from Gadiq, with a Million of peeces of Eight in money and barrs; the States Convoy which has been expected this moneth, it is faid will bring a far greater Treasure. The Dutch here report 15 sayl of Ships to be coming out to reinforce them, and to unite with the French, who have called all their Merchants ships from these parts to Toulon, where they are to receive the Convoy of 16 sayle designed for the Westward.

Seville, Jan. 27. The Commissioners of France and Spaine are still upon the Frontier of Handaye, treating upon the Contentious River betwirt that and Fontarabia, which at last, it is seared will goe near to begin the quartel betwirt those two Crownes.
