the day of the publication of Peace, in what place foevers cituated, except the Places and Forts which by the present Treaty are to remain to His Mist Christian Majesty sais above said; as likewise His Cain lick Majesty shall cause to be restored to His Most Christian Majesty, all Places, Forts, Castles and Posts which he shall have taken by his Arms until the day of the publication of peace, in what place soever they are scituated.

Their Majesties consint that all Kings, Potentates and Princes, Who desir to enterinto the like abligation, are tom he promise and obligation of Warrants to their Majesties for the execution of all that is

contained in the present Treaty.

It is agreed, accorded and acclared that 'tis not intended that any part of the Treaty of the Pyreneans be revoked (except only what relates to Portugil, with whom the said Lord His Cathelick Majesty has fince made a poace) but only in what shall be otherwise disposed of in this, by the giving up of the above-mentioned places; not that any party can have acquired a new Right, or received any prejudice in their respective pretensions to all those things of which we express mention is made by the present Treaty.

Hague, April 13. The Field-Marshal Wurtz ting for his March to the Rendezvous, and to res the compleating of h sown Regiment, hath pre enter to the Afferthly of the States, a list of the names of fuch Offi cers as are chosen by him to command under him, which are confirmed by the States. Several Companies a e al eady marched to Zusphen, by which addition t'e forces in that place are now encreased to 27 or 28 Companies, the rest of the forces may in sew days ar ive the e, and at the other Ren lezvous intended neer Bergen-op. Zoom. 'Tis said that the Prince of Orange intends to go into the Field as a Yoluntier. The Heer Ailua, Serjeant Major General, is ordered forthwith to repair to Zutphen, and the Count Van Hoorn to Bergen op-Zoom, to take order for the quartering the forces as they arrive, and to prevent all disorders amongst them The States have also nominated the Heers Ripperda of Buyrse Cromon, Renswoud, and Ripperda Oosterwyrers, to which are to be added several o her persons from Holland and Query sel to be deputed to the Army, to be a Counsel ahere, to advise about all affairs of importance : and the Heers Van Ommeren, Vrjbergen, Schricck and some other persons to be lent aboard the Fleet upon the same employment, Adm ral de Ruyter is again here consulting with the States Deputies ab ut the Maritime affairs. The Herr Van Zeulensiein Lieutenant General of the Infantiy, may in few days go forwa ds to receive the Lunenburg forces, expecting first the resolution of the Bishop of Munster as to the liberty of marching through his territories, of which we dai'y expect an account, the Heer Ameronghen having found the Bish p at Coast feldt, from whom he may have a speedy Audience.

Park, April 14. The Artillery is now in motion to the Rendezvius at Bapaume, and the Prince de Conde's Forces drawing towards Rocroy, where the Count de Chamitty is ordered to be present, during the absence of the Prince; whose private Assairs oblige him to some little attendance at Chantilly; where his Intendants are command-

ed to meet him.

A Courrier Extraordinary from Holland, brings Letters to H's Majesty from Monsieur d'Estrades, containing business of great importance; of which His Majesty has delivered a long Memorial, to be examined by M nsieur de Lionne.

His Ma efty has been pleased to bestow upon the Marquis se creque a small A my to be commanded by him, in the

isme Methol as the former, which was committed to him the last year, but to receive his Orders from Montheur. The Duke of Luxembourg has a like Cha ge conterned on him, subordinate to the Princede Conde.

'Tis confidently fald that His Majesty has deferred tis journey to the Fron iers for a week, and that the stroops of his Houshold are not to march until the 18th instant.

From Reche le we are told that the Duke de Resufers having lately been obliged to put in there, is again gone cut to sea 3 but with so much expedition and haste; that he had not time to sunish I imself with Provisions, contenting himfulf for the present only with such as could be sound aboard a Fleet of N rman Merchants; but that sour great Men of Wat and twelve Fluites, laden with Provisions and other Necessaries, are since put to Sea from Rocke le, with Orders to find him our upon the Cost of Gallicia; and having vidualled him, to proceed for Libbonne, to take in those serves which are to be transported thence into France. Monsieur Gabaret has Orders with his Squadron to Joyn with the Duke de Beaufort, as have also all the other of our Men of War that are plying in the Ocean.

Yesterday in the Evening arrived a Courtier from Madrid, with the approbation of all that has been already done by the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo, in the late Negotiation.

with Sir Thomas Allen off he Lizard.

Live April 6, Yesterd, y arrived here 3 ships, from Morlaix, and one from St. Maloes, all of them laden with Linnen and belonging to this place? on their way homewards they met with sour men of war, Ostenders, all of them ships of sorce; of which sort e e are many crusting can these seas, carrying from 18 to 40 Guns apiece, to the geat annoyance of the French, these privateers having lately taken and destroyed 11 of their Merchants ships in car merce Harbor.
