The 24th of October, 1689.

By the King's most Excellent Majesty, and the
Lords of His Majesties most Honourable
Privy-Council.

His Majesty being desirous to encourage Merchants
and others, to carry Provisions and other Com-
modities to Ireland, for the Supply of His Forces
there, and Relief of His good Subjects under
His Obedience within that Kingdom, Was this
day pleased to Order, and to hereby Order, That for
the Space of Three Months, from the First of November next,
no Custom, Excise, or other Duty whatsoever shall be de-
manded or payable in Ireland for any of the Goods or Com-
modities hereafter specified, which shall be Imported thither
from this Kingdom. Provided, That the Persons im-
porting the said Commodities, do first enter into Bonds in
England for carrying the same to Their Majesties Army,
or Landing the same in such Ports or Ports of Ireland, as
are under Their Majesties Obedience, and none others what-
soever; and shall not demand any Money or value of Money
to be paid or answered unto them in any manner whatso-
ever by reason of such Exportation out of this Kingdom.
And provided also that they give a Discharge at the
Custom-House in England, for all Duties, Customs, De-
mands and Sums of Money whatsoever payable or answer-
able, or which might have been demanded upon the Expor-
tation of any of the said Commodities out of this King-
dom. And shall further upon their arrival in Ireland
produce a Certificate from the Chief Officer of the Customs,
of the Place or Places, where such Goods and Commodities
shall have been put on Board, whereby it may appear, that
the same were truly laden in some Port of this Kingdom,
together with a Certificate of their having duly given
such a Discharge in England as aforesaid. And the
Lords Commissioners of Their Majesties Treasury, and all
other Persons to whom it may respectively appertain, are
to give the necessary Orders, and to take Care, that His
Majesties Pleasure herein be duly observed and put in Ex-
ecution.

Lisbon, Septemb. 6. The Infanta was taken ill the last
Week, which proved to be the Small Pox; This extremely
alarmed the Court, the Queen, who is near her time,
having never had them: And her Majesty thereupon re-
moved to the old Palace. The Infanta it is hoped is past all
danger.

Naples, Octob. 1. Our Viceroy is sending several Troops
to the Siege of Milan, where we hear a Camp is going to
be formed near Pavia, not without giving some distur-
bance to the French Garison at Casal. Our Privateers
have lately taken several French Prizes on the Coasts of
Italy and Sicily.

Venice, Octob. 14. We have Advice of the Doge's ar-
rival at Spalatro, and of his being ill of an Ague. On
Saturday last arrived here an Express from Rome, with
the News that Cardinal *Ottoboni* was chosen Pope; and
on Monday another, with a Letter from him to the Ca-

mate, wherein he tells them, That he could not omit gi-
ving them notice with his own hand of his Election, to
the Papal Dignity: That he did heartily wish the We-
fare and Prosperity of his dear Country, and that he would
always remember the Benefits He and his Ancestors had
received from the Republick. This last Express brought
likewise Direction to signor *Antonio Ottoboni*, the Pope's
Nephew, to repair forthwith, with his whole Family, to
Rome. He has been congratulated thereupon by all the
Persons of Quality here, and the Senate have conferred
upon him the Honour of an Supernumerary Procurator of
St. Mark, and in Recognition upon his Son Don *Pietro Ot-
toboni*, who is now at Rome, there has been great Re-
joycing in this City for three days together, with Bon-
fires, Fireworks, Illuminations, Feasting, Processions, &c.
And the Senate have named the Procurators *Antonio Gar-
riani*, *Angelo Morefini*, *Silvestro Zuccheri*, *Isaacio Carnaro*,
Leotardo Dona, *Ferizo Niccolini*, and *Sebastiano Tolosani*,
to go in the quality of their Ambassadors Extraordinary
to the Pope, with their Compliments of Congratulation.

Milan, Octob. 12. Great quantities of Provisions and
Ammunition are sent daily from hence to Pavia, where
the Forces of this State are ordered to rendezvous. It's
believed they will make a Body of 12 or 14000 Men;
and the French appear very apprehensive they have a
design upon Casal, the Garison of which place has been
greatly weakened by the Detachments sent lately to the
assistance of the Duke of Savoy against the Vaudois.

Wienberg, Septemb. 28. The King of Poland parted
the 25th from Slocow, and came the next day to Po-
morzan, where the Court will continue about 14 days.
The want of Provisions, as well as other Considerations,
have obliged the Crown-Generall to march towards Tyl-
lowitz, in order to put the Troops into their Winter-
Quarters. We hear in the mean time that Sultan *Nu-
radin*, Son of the Cham, being advanced with 12000
men towards *Campines*, had, upon the news of the
Retreat of our Army, continued his March towards
Trembowla, and made a great Ravage in the Country
thereabouts. Our Spies, who are come back from *By-
zantz*, report, That the Cham had been very sick,
but that he began to recover; and that the Grand Vicer
did very earnestly solicit him to march with all his For-
ces towards Hungary, to join the Ottoman Army; or at
least to give the Christians a Diversion; and that *Bathir-
Aga* was marched with the two youngest Sultans towards
Moldavia, where a great Convoy of Provisions was pre-
paring for the Relief of *Comitac*. But all the Letters
from *Moldavia* give an account of the Death of the Cham,
though they say endeavours had been used to keep it se-
cret, and that the Sultans *Nuradin* and *Gelga* remained
in the *Crimee* to take Care of securing that Country, a-
gainst the Invasion of the Moldovians, for which they are
making new Preparations.

Brussels, Octob. 28. The Troops of *Hannover* passed the
Canal the 25th instant, and marched to *Wiche*, where
they are still encamped. The *Marschal d'Humieres* has put
all his Troops into Quarters, except a Body of about 6000,
which are still posted near *Tourmay*. The Dutch Army march-
ed the 26th towards *Judoigne*, where they will break up,
and their Quarters will be so regulated, that upon any
motion they will in two days time be able to form a
very considerable Body. There will be very strong Gria-
nons put into *Monty, Chobleroy, Naimur*, and out other Fron-
tier Places.

Alagoz, Octob. 28. The Armies are now going into their
Winter Quarters; and the Deputies of this State that ac-
companied *Prince Waldeck* this Campaign are expected
here in a Day or two. The Spanish Envoy and the *Mar-
quis de Hontbrouck*, deputed by the Governour of *Flan-
ders*, have of late had several Conferences with the De-
puties of the States-Generall, about sending the Contribu-
tions.

tion. The Elector of Brandenburg, as we hear from Cleves, intends to part from thence the 31th of this month for *Ausbourg*.

Slego, Octob. 1. Colonel *Thomas Lloyd* being informed that the Irish had put a Garison of about 80 Men into *James Town*, which is no inconsiderable Pass, upon the River *Spann*, he marched thither with the *British* men under his Command. Upon our Approach they Fired very briskly upon us, though without doing us any other Damage than that one man was shot in his Leg, and a Horse killed. Colonel *Lloyd* having lodged his Dragoons as near the Town as he conveniently could, marched with the Horse towards a Pass upon the same River, called *Drumna-na*, Colonel *Mac Donnell's* Houle, which was immediately surrendered to him; where he found two great pontoons, which would have facilitated his going over the Water to have surrounded the Town. But about 12 at night some Protestants came and gave him notice that the Rebels had abandoned the place; whereupon he possessed himself of it, and afterwards returned thither with a considerable Booty.

Chester, Octob. 23. The French Papists that were lately brought from our Army, being about 170 in number, are now Prisoners in this Castle. We have no fresh News from *Ireland*.

Newcastle, Octob. 22. The great and continual Rains for these ten days past occasioned here on Saturday last so great a Flood, that meeting with the Spring Tyde, it overflowed all the Cellars and Shops near the Key, and brought the Boats and Keels upon the Key, and the Ships were not without much difficulty kept off, which has done great damage. The Flood was very great again on Sunday, but not so high as the day before. There are now in *Tinnuth-Haven* above 80 Sail of laden Ships. Two were lately cast away as they were coming in, and several of the Men drowned.

Portsmouth, Octob. 21. On Tuesday last passed by *Spithead* about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships, under the Convoy of Their Majesties Ship the *Pendennis*, which came into *Cowes Road* a day or two before, being bound home from the *Straits*, the *West Indies*, the *Canaries*, &c. Yesterday morning came to *Spithead* two Dutch Privateers from the Eastward, who met off of *Dover* 5 Dutch *East-India* Ships, homeward bound, having with them 2 French Ships, which they took off of the *Cape of Good Hope*, coming from the *East-Indies*.

Deale, Octob. 24. There are now in the Downs Their Majesties Ships the *Pendennis*, *Portland*, *Newcastle*, *Dexford*, *Sallee-Rose*, and *Charlotte* Yacht, with divers Merchant Ships which came from the Westward.

London, Octob. 23. This day a great number of Lords and Gentlemen of the Kingdom of *Ireland* met at *Bow Church* in *Chancery*, to render Thanks to Almighty God for the Deliverance from the Bloody Massacre and Rebellion begun by the Irish on the 23 of *October*, 1641. and after an excellent Sermon preached by the Lord Archbishop of *Tullymore*, the Lord Mayor and Sheriffs being pre-

sent in their Scarlets, they went to *Mercers-Hall*, where they were splendidly entertained at Dinner by the Reverend Mr. *Walker*, late Governor of *Londonderry*.
