

from time to time be exercised by the said Henry Vigne as vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Sunbury and by his successors vicars or incumbents of the same vicarage for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of Saint Saviour Upper Sunbury, being:—

“All that parish of the parish of Sunbury in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which is bounded upon part of the west upon the south and upon the east by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Windmill-road where the boundary which divides the parish of Ashford in the said county and diocese from the parish of Sunbury aforesaid, diverges from the said road in a north-westerly direction and extending thence southward along the middle of the same road for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts, thereby passing over the Thames Valley Line of the London and South-Western Railway to the junction of the same road with Nursery-road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Sunbury to Feltham-hill and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Thames Valley Line of the London and South-Western Railway aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of eleven and a quarter chains or thereabouts (thereby passing through Sunbury Railway Station) to the middle of the bridge which carries the road called or known as Sunbury Common over the same line of railway and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed ‘U. S. St. S. D. 1881, No. 1’ and placed on the northern side of the said road at the point where the fence forming the western boundary of the Kempton Park Race Course leaves the same road and extending thence northward to such boundary-stone and continuing thence still northward along the middle of the said fence for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to a boundary-stone inscribed ‘U. S. St. S. D. 1881 No. 2’ and placed at the northern end of the last-described fence on the southern side of the said line of railway and continuing thence first northward to a point in the middle of the same line of railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of thirteen and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Sunbury from the parish of Hanworth in the county and diocese aforesaid. All which said hereinbefore described part of the parish of Sunbury aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than the part of the west, the south, and the east before-mentioned, that is to say upon the north-east, upon the north and upon the remaining part of the west, as follows, upon the north-east by the parish of Hanworth aforesaid, upon the north by the parish of Feltham in the county and diocese aforesaid,

and upon the remaining part of the west by the parish of Ashford aforesaid.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish of Sunbury, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Paul Wood Green Wednesbury in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield.

“Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five and published in the London Gazette upon the nineteenth day of the same month certain portions of the parish of Wednesbury and of the parish or parochial chapelry of West Bromwich both in the county and diocese aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul situate at Wood Green in the parish of Wednesbury aforesaid, and the same consolidated chapelry was called ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury.’

“And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

“And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury, should be altered by
