

Saturday next. The Troops of *Hanover* are quartered at *Audenarde*, *Ghent*, *Bruges*, *Dendermond*, *Lier*, and in this City. The *Marschal d'Humieres*, having put his Troops into Garrison, except 5 or 6 Regiments, which lie still between *Tournay* and *Conde*, is returned towards *Lisle*. It's said he has given Orders for the fortifying of *Leuze*.

*Middleburg*, *Novemb. 1.* The five Dutch *East-India* Ships (mentioned in our last) are come in with their two Prizes; which were taken in this manner. On the 26th of *April*, one of them, called the *Normandy*, bound home from *Bengall*, carrying 18 Guns and 49 Men, arrived at the *Cape of Good Hope*: The French, knowing nothing of the War, sent their Lieutenant ashore for fresh Provisions, where he and his Company were seized by the Dutch Governor, who manned the same Boat with his own Men, and sent it off again with French Colours, and ordered them, as they passed, to call upon the 2 Dutch Ships then in the Bay, the *Netherlands*, and the *Samslag*, and to give them notice of what had passed. They got immediately under Sail, and coming up with the French Ship, gave her a Broad-side, which the French answered; but having lost 13 or 14 Men, they yielded. On the 5th of *May* arrived the other French Ship, called the *Carose*, from *Suratte*, carrying 26 Guns and 94 Men, who presently sent their Boat on Board the *Normandy*, which continued under French Colours; The two Dutch Ships bore up to her, and after some Firing, she yielded likewise, having lost three men. The Lading of these two Ships cost above 60000 *l. Sterling*.

*Hague*, *Novemb. 8.* The Deputies of this State parted from hence the 6th instant for *Dort*, to Compliment the Queen of *Spain* in her Passage by that place towards *Zealand*; where her Majesty is to Embark. Prince *Waldeck* is expected here very suddenly. The Imperialists have obtained another Victory over the Turks, who were very strongly posted, to the number of about 10000, near *Widin*, in order to cover that place, having forced their Intrenchments, killed 2000 upon the place, and afterwards taken the Town of *Widin* by Assault, and the Castle upon Artillery. *Tockeley*, who had the Command of these Turkish Forces, was retired before the Fight towards *Silistia*.

*Paris*, *Novemb. 5.* The Duke of *Savoy* does very much press this Court to send back his Troops, which are now employed towards *Rouffion*; he having him self occasion for them. Most of the Persons of Quality that served as Volunteers in the French Armies this Summer, are returned hither, the Troops being every where gone into their Winter-quarters. The Genoueses have furnished the Governor of *Milan* with a great quantity of Bombs, Powder, and other Ammunition of War, which they are here much offended at. We are told from *Rome* that the Pope intends to make very speedily a Promotion of Cardinals;

*Belfast*, *Octob. 19.* On the 9th instant landed here Colonel *Langston's* Regiment of Horse, Colonel *Hastings's* of Foot, and Colonel *Heyford's* Dragoons, which came from *Scotland*. On the 13th Col. *Hastings* marched, with his Regiment and two Troops of Horse, towards *Charlemont*; and on the 17 joyn'd the Regiments commanded by Col. *Gustavus Hamilton* and Col. *St. Johns*, (the later made up of *Derry* men) within five miles of that place, which is now actually besie-

ged by these Forces and a Detachment from the Camp at *Dundalk*, under the Command of Lieutenant-General *Douglas*. It's said the Rebels have in the Place a Garrison of 400 Foot and 2 Troops of Horse. Yesterday arrived Sir *John Lanier's* Regiment of Horse from *Scotland*.

From the Camp at *Dundalk*, *Oct. 24.* On the 17 instant one of our Parties meeting with a Party of the Rebels, killed 5, and brought in 6 Prisoners and 9 Horses. We hear since, that the Irish Army is decamped, and retiring to Winter Quarters, being in great want of all manner of Necessaries. Our Camp is plentifully furnished with Provisions.
