Rome, October 22.

ON the 13th instant the Pope was Crown'd, with the accustomed Ceremonies: He said *Mass* himself; and afterwards sung *Te Deum* for the Victories obtained by the Imperial Arms over the Turks; and concluded, having the Triple Crown on his Head, with giving the Benediction to the People. It being signified, some days before, to the Duke *de Chaulnes*, that he would not be allowed to appear at this Solemnity, 'till he had quitted the Franchises of his Quarter; he declared, That he would not, during his stay in this City, pretend to the said Franchises; and was thereupon admitted to perform the usual Function as Ambassador of France. On the 19th the Pope held a publick Consistory, and thanked the College of Cardinals for his Election. He has disposed of most of the vacant Benefices, having given his Great Nephew, *Don Pietro*, who intends to enter into Ecclesiastical Orders, the rich Abby of *Chiaravalle*: And has named Signior *Cantelmi* to be his Nuncio to the Emperor, Signior *Nicolini* to Spain, Signior *Santa Croce* to Poland, and Signior *Ranuccio Pallavicino* to the Republick of Venice.

Venice, Octob. 28. On Saturday last Prince *Antonio Ottoboni* made his publick Entry as Procurator of St. Mark. We have advice, by Vessels arrived from the Levant, That *Napoli di Malvasia* is very closely block'd up by our Troops, and the Garrison reduced to great Necessity; that Signior *Pisani* cruises on that Coast with 12 Ships; and that the Proveditor-General *Cornaro* was with the rest of the Fleet in the Port of *Spécia*, about 30 Miles from *Napoli di Malvasia*.

From the Imperial Camp near *Widin*, Octob. 18. We decamped on the 6th instant from *Nissa*; and having passed over high Hills, came, on the 7th, to the River *Tinock*, where we stay'd the 8th for our Baggage. The 9th we marched through a very narrow Pass to *Sronice*; and the 10th to *Brestaz*. We rested on the 11th; on the 12th a Party, which had been sent two days before towards *Widin*, return'd with several Prisoners, who gave an account, That the Enemy had abandoned and burnt *Orfowa*, and *Ficristau*; and that two Bassa's had posted themselves with the Troops under their Command near *Widin*, but that *Teckley* was retired towards *Sophia*: That day we advanced to *Bergfelt*; the 13th to *Drenoua*; on the 14th in the morning we entered into the Plains of *Widin*, and our Right Wing having passed three Stone Bridges over a *Moras* without any

opposition from the Enemy, drew up in Battalia not far from the Town, and there expected the coming up of our Left Wing: By this time the Turks had put themselves into a posture, and their Horie, being about 4000 strong, advanced, and charged our Left Wing, where Prince *Louis of Baden* was in Person; our Troops received them with great Vigor, and beat them back to the Intrenchments which they had lately made round the Town; but some of our Squadrons, pursuing them too far, were obliged, by the Fire of the Janisaries, that were posted there, to retire; though they, presently after, advanced again, within 40 or 50 Paces of the Ditch of the said Intrenchment, and kept their ground 'till the rest of the Left Wing was come up, and had advantageously posted themselves. In the mean time General *Veterani*, who commanded in the Right Wing, had ordered a Detachment of Foot and Dragoons to attack the Intrenchment towards the Water-side, which they did, with such Bravery and Success, that they made themselves Masters of it, and of the Town; the Troops of the Left Wing, having likewise forced the Intrenchments, entered presently after, on the other side, with a great Slaughter of the Enemy, of whom many, that endeavour'd to escape in Boats, were also drown'd in the *Damube*. While this was doing, the Turkish Horse, having passed along the River-side, fled towards *Sophia*, but being pursued by four of our Regiments, they were forced to fight their way through the Troops that were coming up with our Baggage; and in this Encounter divers of our Men were kill'd. Of the Enemy, who, at the beginning of the Fight, were 10000 strong, above 2000 were kill'd in this days Action: And on our side we had about 700 kill'd and wounded; those of chiefest Note are General *Veterani*, and General Count *Guido of Staremberg*, wounded, but not dangerously; and the Baron of *Orlick*, and the Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of *Kiesel*, kill'd. The same day Prince *Louis* sent a Summons to the Turks that were retired into the Castle, but they pretending to defend it, on the 15th we opened Trenches in order to an Attack, and sent to *Semandria* for Cannon and Mortars; but this morning the Turks beat a Parly, and desired to be conducted, with their Goods, to *Nicopolis*, which was granted them; and to morrow they are to march out, being in all, with Women and Children, about 7000 Souls.

Vienna, Octob. 31. We have advice that the Tartars, who were marching in a considerable Body towards *Hungary*, are, upon the News

of the defeat of the Turks at Nissa, returning towards Budziack. The Turkish Envoys here have not yet made any new Proposals.

Frankfort, Novemb. 2. The Imperial and Confederate Forces are now marching to their Winter quarters, which will be so ordered, that, upon occasion, a considerable Body of them may, in a short time, be drawn together on the Rhine. The Elector of Bavaria is gone to Aushourg.

Hanaw, Novemb. 3. The Imperial Regiments of Cuirassiers of Dinewaldt, Passo Caraffa, and Commercy, passed yesterday by this place towards Klotzenmarke, from whence they will continue their march, on the 5th instant, towards Frantzouta, where they are to have their Winter-quarters.

Hamburg, Novemb. 4. The Conferences are continued at Zell, between the Ministers of Brandenburg, Saxony, Lüneburg, and Anhalt, for the accommodating the Affair of Saxe-Laweburg. The Lüneburghers have begun to fortify Ratzeburg, and to erect a Magazine there. The Duke of Holstein parted from hence yesterday for Gottorp.

Cologne, Novemb. 4. General Spaen is on his march with 7000 Brandenburgers towards Aix la Chapelle; and another Party is gone towards Nits and the Lower Diocese. The Troops of Munster are going home, and will pass the Rhine here this Afternoon. The Great Chapter of this Archbishoprick have chosen the Great Master of the Teutonic Order their Sub-Dean, in the place of the Count de Leewenstein, who was deprived for his Adherence to the Cardinal of Furstemberg. We hear from Coblenz, that the Elector of Trier will begin his Journey to-morrow for Aushourg. The Electoral Prince Palatin is returned to Dusseldorp.

Brussels, Novemb. 9. Our Governor-General is gone for Flanders, to visit the Garrisons within that Province; and, at his return hither, it is said, Commissions will be given out for making new Levies of Horse. A Party of our Troops has defeated one of the Enemies near Conde, and brought 32 Prisoners to Mons. We are told, that the Marshal Humieres has sent some Troops towards the Rhine and Moselle, and that he was hindered upon his departure towards Paris.

Hague, Novemb. 11. The Count of Oxenstern, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden, had, on the 9th instant, a Conference with the Deputies of this State. The Marquis de Montbrunck, who was sent hither by the Governor of Flanders, to settle the Contributions, is returned to Brussels. We hear from Cleves, that the Elector of Brandenburg is gone from thence towards Berlin.

New- Windsor, Novemb. 4. This day being His Majesty's Birth-day, the Mayor, Aldermen, Bailiff, and Burgesses of this Borough, about six of the Clock in the Evening, assembled at the New-Guildhall of this Corporation, where was a handsome Feast prepared for them; at which were present all the Officers quartered in the Town; where they drank Healths to Their Majesties and the Royal Family; the Windows of the Town-hall being all the time

illuminated, the Bells ringing, and Musick playing, with Bonfires, and all other Demonstrations of Joy and Loyalty, suitable to the occasion.

Westminster, Novemb. 5. Yesterday being His Majesty's Birth-day, was celebrated, at Court, with an Excellent Concert of Musick, Vocal and Instrumental; and a Ball at night, where the Nobility and Gentry appeared in extraordinary Splendor. And in London and Westminster, (the Shops being every where shut all the day,) with Bonfires, Illuminations, ringing of Bells, and other the most Universal Demonstrations of Joy that were ever seen on such an occasion. And this day, the Anniversary Thanksgiving for the Discovery of the Gun-Powder-Plot, was kept with great and general Rejoycing; But that which very much added to the Solemn Observation of it, was, its being likewise the Day of His Majesty's happy landing in England.
