THIS following Address was presented to the King this day, which His Majesty received very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of Your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, the Gentlemen, Traders, Freeholders, Freemen, and most of the Inhabitants of Your Majesties Borough of Newarke upon Trent in the County of Nottingham.

Great SIR,

AS we have long since given Praises publicly to God Almighty for our happy Deliverance from Popery and Slavery, so we think our selves obliged both in Duty and Gratitude, in the next place, humbly to present our unfeigned Thanks for the same to Your Sacred Majesty, and the Glorious Instruments thereof, steadfastly assuring Your Majesties, that as hitherto we have, so shall we unalterably for ever continue to be ready with all alacrity and obedience to contribute to Your Majesties Assistance, without Taxes and Portunes, as Your Majesties Occasions shall require. Concluding with our Prayers for Your Majesties long and happy Reign over us, with timely success in all Your Enterprizes, Crowned at last with insurmountable Victory over all Your Enemies.

Venice, Octob. 28. The Siege of *Napoli di Malvasia* is turned into a Blockade; which will be continued during the Winter. The Doge has been indisposed since his arrival at *Spalatro*, but is well enough recovered to undertake his Journey thither, so soon as he has performed his Quarantine. The Ambassadors named by the Senate to go and make their Compliment to the Pope, are preparing for their departure, and will be attended with a numerous Train, and splendid Equipage. In the mean time we hear from *Rome*, that the Pope is going to fill the vacant places in the College of Cardinals, and that it was believed Don *Pietro*, his great Nephew, would have a Cap at this Promotion. That the Pope had held a publick Confistory two or three days after his Coronation, and had advised with several Cardinals in particular about the present State of Affairs. And that the Cardinal of *Furstemberg* did earnestly solicit a Review of the Matter concerning the Election of *Cologne*.

Genoa, Oct. 22. On the 18th Instant arrived here from *Civita Vecchia* the twenty eight Gallies, which carried thither the Duke de *Chablais*, and the French Cardinals. We are told from *Milan*, that the Troops of that State were decamped from *Parma*; The Foot was marched towards *Cremona*; The Horse was quartered at *St. Angelo*, *Cuspiato* and *Brascardo*; and about 20 Boats laden with all sorts of Ammunition were ordered to pass down the River *Po*. It is thought that part of these Forces will take their Quarters this Winter within the Territories of *Mantua*.

Warsaw, Octob. 7. The Forces of this Crown are gone into their Winter-quarters; and the King is on his return thither; where a Dyet will be held in the beginning of *December*. The Advices from *Moldavia* say, That the Grand Visier had sent several Expresses to the *Cham* of *Tartary*, to press his sending a speedy Succor to the Ottoman Army, but that he had excused it on pretence that he had himself occasion for his Troops, to secure his Country against the Invasion of the *Moscovites*.

Vienna, Oct. 31. The Letters from *Upper Hungary* inform us, That the Imperial Troops employed in the Blockade of *Great Waradin*, had defeated a Party of that Garrison, and taken several Prisoners, who reported, That the *Bassa* endeavoured to encourage them with the Assurances he pretended to have received of a speedy Relief, but that their want of Provisions was so great, that they would very quickly be forced to Capitulate; and that the Imperialists to frighten them yet more, and to hinder their receiving any Succor from the Neighbouring Country, had built several Forts and Redoubts near the place; where they kept very strong Guards. It is confirmed, that the *Tartars*, who were marching towards *Hungary*, are returned to *Budziacke*, upon the news of the defeat of the Ottoman Army at *Nissa*. The last Letters from *Croatia* said, That the Ban or Governor of that Province was marched with the Troops under his Command, and several Pieces of Cannon, towards the River *Culpa*, but his design was not known.

Frankfort, Nov. 6. The Winter-Quarters for the Imperial and Confederate Forces are settled with the States of *Franconia*, *Swabia*, and the *Upper Rhine*; And particular care will be taken to put a sufficient number of Troops in the most considerable places about *Philipsbourg*, and *Fair Loth*, to hinder the Incurfions of those Garrisons during the Winter. The French work very hard on the Fortifications at *Landau*.

Cologne, Nov. 8. Four *Munster* Regiments that were before *Bonne*, are gone home, being commanded by General *Swartz*. And yesterday three *Brandenburg* Regiments began their march towards *Cleves*.

Brussels, Nov. 9. The Prince of *Chimay* is going to raise a Regiment of Horse; and it is said that those already on foot will be made up to 50 in each Troop; by which means there will be added 2000 Horse to the Troops now in the service of these Countreys. Our Governor General is expected back here in three or four days from *Flanders*; whither he is gone to see the *Hanover* Forces that are quartered at *Audenaerde*, *Ghent*, *Bruges*, and other places within that Province. The French have begun to repair their Line between the *Lis* and the *Schelde*.

Hague, Nov. 11. The *Sieur Dieff*, the *Brandenburg* Minister, is returned hither from *Cleves*, having left his Electoral Highness on his Journey towards

wards Berlin. The Swedish Minister has received advice of the death of Duke John Adolphe, Uncle to the King of Sweden.

Edinburgh, Nov. 4. On Friday last Sir James Oglethorpe, Lord President of the Session, arrived here, being attended with great numbers of Persons of Quality, who went out on Horseback to meet him. After his arrival he went to the Parliament House, where he met the rest of the Lords of Session, it being the ordinary time at which the Sessions uses to sit; and after every one had taken the Oaths, the Earl of Crawford did admit those who had not been formerly admitted; On Saturday they sat again, and yesterday they met, and went to Church in their accustomed Formalities, every body expressing great Satisfaction with His Majesties Choice, both of the President, and the rest of the Lords.

Chester, Nov. 6. Monday last, being His Majesties Birth-day, was observed here with much solemnity; The Cannon were thrice fired round the Castle, with 3 Volleys of Small Shot from the Garrison, and our Militia, who were drawn together on this Occasion. And the Mayor invited all the Officers of the Garrison to the *Penitence*, where they concluded the Day with Drinking Their Majesties Healths; And yesterday being the Anniversary of the *Gun-powder-Treason*, and the happy Day of His Majesties Landing in *England*, to Deliver us from Popery and Slavery, the Mayor and Aldermen in their Formalities were attended to Church by the 24 Companies of Citizens, with their Colours, and after Divine Service and Sermon was ended, the Day was solemnized with all imaginable Demonstrations of Joy in memory of so great Blessings. We have no news from *Ireland*, the Wind continuing Easterly.

Falmouth, Nov. 3. Yesterday arrived here the *Friends-Adventure* Laden with Sugars from *Surinam*. The Master and Ships Company say, they parted about 10 days ago with a Dutch *East-India* Ship homeward bound, which intended to go about Northwards.

Plymouth, Nov. 5. Yesterday the Kings Birth-Day was Celebrated here with Ringing of Bells, Firing of Guns from the Citadel, and the Ships in the Road, and with all other Demonstrations of Joy; Which were again repeated this Day. Since my last there are come into this Port 2 Dutch Privateers with a French Prize, being a Vessel bound home from *Newfoundland*; as also several English Merchant Ships outward bound.

Line, Novemb. 6. Yesterday being the Day of Thanksgiving for the Deliverance from the *Gun-powder-Plot*, as likewise that of His Majesties happy Landing, was observed here in an extraordinary manner. In the morning the Mayor and his Brethren in their Formalities went to Church, being attended by the Militia Company, and a Company of young Gentlemen and Merchants richly Cloathed; who were afterwards Treated at the Mayors House. The Great Guns were Fired from the Fort, Cliff, and Ships, and the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Fireworks, Ringing of Bells, and all other Expressions of Joy suitable to the Occasion.

Portsmouth, Nov. 7. The 4th Instant, being His Majesties Birth-day, was kept here very solemnly. The English and Dutch Men of War at *Spithead* shewed all their Bravery, with various Colours, and fired all their Cannon, as was likewise done by the Ships in the Harbour. Our Deputy-Governor gave a Noble Entertainment to the Mayor and the whole Corporation at the Platform, where they Drank Their Majesties Healths, with Firing of the Great Guns round the Town, and 3 Volleys of Small Shot from the Garrison, who were in Arms. And in the Evening the Mayor Treated the Deputy-Governor,

and all the Officers of the Garrison, in the Town-Hall; the Night concluding with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, Illuminations, Fireworks, and other the most generous Demonstrations of Joy that were ever known here on the like Occasion. And these Rejoycings were repeated on the 5th, being the Anniversary of the *Gun-powder-Treason*, and the Day of His Majesties happy Landing in *England*. Yesterday six Dutch Men of War, under the Command of a Rear-Admiral, sailed from *Spithead* to the Westward.

Cambridge, November 4. This being the Birth-Day of our Sovereign Lord King *William*, and the Day appointed by the Statutes for the Choice of a new Vice-Chancellor, the University meeting in the Senate-House, and unanimously chose the Reverend Dr. *Johnston*, Master of *Sidney-College*, their Vice-Chancellor, who immediately after his Admission to his Office, gave particular Order that Bonfires should be made in every College for the more solemn keeping His Majesties Birth-Day, which was accordingly observed by all with great Acclamations of Joy.
