THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

THE following areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking):—

Buckinghamshire.—All inclosures of land in the county of Buckingham adjoining the following place declared to be a place infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely),—the whole of the field called Lower Westall, in the parish of Whitchurch, in the occupation of Henry Brazier, and the several inclosures of land adjoining thereto, and all buildings standing on such inclosures,—on the northern and eastern sides thereof, and also all the land in the occupation of the said Henry Brazier situate in the said parish of Whitchurch on the southern side of the road leading from Whitchurch to Oving.

Cambridgeshire.—An area lying around the North Farm Homestead, at Kneesworth, in the petty sessional division of Arrington and Melbourn, in the county of Cambridge, lately in the occupation of Charles Sell, but now in the occupation of John Jarman, and comprised within the following limits, namely,—bounded on the west by the Old North-road, on the north by the parish of Whaddon, on the east and south-east by a brook, and on the south by the highway leading from Kneesworth towards Meldreth.

(Isle of Ely).—The whole of North Fen from Gold Dike on the east to Falls Drove on the west, and the whole of Ruff Fen from Mill Drove on the west to a point where Green Drove joins French Drove, including all the above-mentioned Drovers, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely.

Cornwall.—(1.) The parish of Mylor, in the county of Cornwall.

(2.) The parish of Budock, in the county of Cornwall.

Essex.—The parishes of Tilty; Broxton, Great Easton, Little Easton, Thaxted, Chickney, and Takeley, in the county of Essex.

Hampshire.—(1.) Those portions of the parishes of North Stoneham, and South Stoneham, in the county of Southampton, which are bounded on
