THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

THE following areas are now Areas Infected with Fcot-and-Mouth Disease under the abovementioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used for required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking):

Buckinghamshire.—(1.) All inclosures of land in the county of Buckingham adjoining the following place declared to be a place infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely),—the whole of the field-called Lower Westall, in the parish of Whitchurch, in the occupation of Henry Brazier, and the several inclosures of land adjoining -thereto, and all buildings standing on such inclosures, -on the northern and eastern sides thereof, and also all the land in the occupation of the said Henry Brazier situate in the said parish of Whitchurch on the southern side of the road leading from Whitchurch to Oving

(2.) So much of the township of Great Horwood, in the county of Buckingham, as lies to the south of the farm there, in the occupation of John Denchfield, and to the east of the road leading from Great Horwood to Winslow.

Cambridgeshire (Isle of Ely).—The whole of North Fen from Gold Dike on the east to Falls Drove on the west, and the whole of Ruff Fen from Mill Drove on the west to a point where Green Drove joins French Drove, including all the above-mentioned Droves, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely.

Cornwall.—(1.) The parish of Mylor, in the

county of Cornwall.

(2.) The parish of Budock, in the county of Cornwall.

Cumberland.—The petty sessional division of Bootle, in the county of Cumberland.

Essex.—The parishes of Tilty, Broxted, Great Easton, Little Easton, Thaxted, Chickney, and Takeley, in the county of Essex.

Hampshire.—(1.) Those portions of the parishes of North Stoneham, and South Stoneham, in the county of Southampton, which are bounded on the south-east by the river Itchen, on the south-west by the road leading from Wood Mill through Burger Street to the Upper Common Gate, on the west by the Winchester road as far as the lane opposite Messrs. Bull and Son's farm, and on the north and north-east by the road leading past the Bishopstoke railway station to the river Itchen.

(2.) The whole of the parish of East Tytherley, in the petty sessional division of Romsey, in the county of Southampton.

Lancushire. - (1.) The township of Clayton-le-Dale, in the petty sessional division of Black-

burn Lower, in the county of Lancaster.
(2.) The township of Samlesbury, in the petty sessional division of Blackburn Lower, in the county of Lancaster.

Lincolnshire (Holland) .- All lands comprised in a district in the parishes of Fleet, Gedney, Holbeach, and Whaplode, or some of them, in the Elloe division of the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, and intersected almost midway in a line drawn from south-west to north-east of such district by Neals Gate-road, and bounded by Ravens Bank from Saturday Bridge through Ravens Clough along Ravens Dyke in a southward direction, down Jiggles Gate to Jiggles Hurn towards the north and east, by the Fendyke-road leading from Jiggles Hurn due west:

along Joys Bank north of Fleet Lots to Jiggles or Jerkins Bank to the Plough Inn towards the south, and by Ravens Gate running due north from the Plough Inn up to Saturday Bridge aforesaid towards the west.

So much of the Henley petty sessional division, in the county of Oxford, as is bounded by the following roads, but not including such roads,-the road leading from the village of Caversham to Cane End past the Pack Saddle Inu, and from Cane End to Kidmore End, and thence to the village of Caversham.

The whole of Boulder's farm, in the parish of Hellingly, in the occupation of Thomas Brown; so much of the Limekiln farm in the parish of Chalvington, in the occupation of the executors of the late John Deadman, as lies cast of the road leading from Chalvington to the Dicker; so much of the .Claverham farm, in the parish of Arlington, in the occupation of Edward Shoosmith, as lies on the east side of the Wick Street Brook; the whole of the High Barn farm, in the said parish of Arlington, in the occupation of Edward Shoosmith; the whole of the Hole farm, in the
