

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 20th day of February, 1882.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The parishes of Middleton, and Sledmere, in the East Riding of the county of York, which were declared by Order of Council to be an area or areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those parishes shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area or areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

SCHEDULE.

An area comprising so much of the parish of Bishop Burton, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Beverley and Market Weighton-road on the south; Cherry Burton-lane on the east, from the Beverley and Market Weighton-road to a quickwood fence on the north side of a grass field in the occupation of Ann Harrison; on the west, Bishop Burton-street from the Beverley and Market Weighton-road to a gate adjoining Ann Harrison's house, then by a quickwood fence on the east side of a grass field called Dove-Cotes to a quickwood fence on the north side of a grass field called Brickhills in the occupation of Ann Harrison, and then along the same fence to Cherry Burton-lane aforesaid.

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1. The area described in the Schedule to this

Order is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

SCHEDULE.

An area comprising lands in the occupation of Mr. H. J. Waters, at Panxworth, in the county of Norfolk, called Swinly Londs, lands next Car Close, Car Close, and meadows called The Cars in the occupation of Mr. Chapman, towards the north; meadow-lands next Car Close occupied by Mr. Chapman, and meadows and pastures of Mr. H. J. Waters, towards the east; a foot-path called Hemblington foot-path, towards the south; and arable land in the occupation of Mr. D. Walker called Patter Mill Close, arable land called Mowing Close, and a road next the said fields leading from Panxworth towards Horning Ferry, towards the west.

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1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The following place, declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be a place infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely),—the field known as Windmill Field with the cow-shed standing thereon, situate in the township of Great Horwood, in the county of Buckingham, in the occupation of Alfred Willmer, and the two arable fields adjoining the said Windmill Field, and in the respective occupations of George Henry Harrup and the said Alfred Willmer, together with so much of the public road leading from Great Horwood to Winslow as adjoins thereto,—is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.
