(*d.*) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, and, when opened, are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they have been allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

WALSOKEN.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Walsoken, in the county of Norfolk; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, except as follows :

(*a.*) In such walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(*b.*) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

CHORLTON-CUM-HARDY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Chorlton-cum-Hardy, in the county of Lancaster; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :

(*a.*) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(*b.*) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

BARROW.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Barrow, in the county of Salop; and also in the churchyard, except as follows : In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

COLLEY WESTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Colley Weston, in the county of Northampton; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, except as follows :

(*a.*) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(*b.*) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

WOOTTON WAWEN.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Wootton Wawen, in the county of Warwick; and that in the churchyard the regulations for new burial grounds as to the formation and reopening of graves be observed.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the seventeenth day of April next :

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said seventeenth day of April.

An area in the hamlets of Ambaston, and Thulston, in the parish of Elvaston, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Derwent near Borrowash Mills at the spot where the north-west fence of the Big meadow reaches the said river, thence down the said river until it is joined by New Dyke-brook near the Wiln Mills, thence along the north bank of the said brook until it reaches the three lane ends, and along Cow Lane, leading to Brook meadow by Mr. Robinson's farm, and thence along the north-west fences of Brook meadow and Big meadow until the latter reaches the river Derwent at the point of starting.
