And whereas the Justices of the Isle of Ely, in Quarter Sessions assembled, have applied to me to the effect that an Order should be made directing that the time during which the killing and taking of wild birds is prohibited shall be varied in the Isle of Ely, in the county of Cambridge, so as to be from the 15th day of March to the 31st day of August in each year, both dates inclusive.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of the said Act, and on such application as aforesaid,

(1.) Port Buso Light—Arc of Visibility Increased. (1.) Shortland Bluff Low Lighthouse—Additional Sector.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 235 (2), of 26th November, 1881, on the destruction by collision of Swan Spit Lighthouse, Port Phillip Entrance:—

The Government of Victoria has given further notice, that on 16th December, 1881, in addition to the present sectors, a sector of red light would be exhibited from Shortland Bluff Low Lighthouse, Queenscliff, visible between the bearings of about S.W. by W. 1 W. and S.W. by W. 2 W., or from Black Buoy No. 1 to Perch Buoy No. 2, at the entrance to West Channel.

This sector of light is intended as a guide in the fairway from Swan Spit to between boys Nos. 1 and 2, thus, so far, will meet the requirements previously fulfilled by Swan Spit Lighthouse (recently destroyed); but will not be of service in judging the distance from Shortland Bluff Reef.

Vessels leaving, should haul to the eastward when Queenscliff Jetty Light bears about W. by N., sufficiently to clear Shortland Bluff Reef.
