THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Each of the areas described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.
2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

SCHEDULE.

(1.) An area comprising so much of the parish of Thorpe Langton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Stoke's Meadow farm on the south, Underwood's farm West Langton on the east, George Kendall's farm on the west, and George Kendall's ploughed land farm on the north.

(2.) An area comprising so much of the parish of Carlton-Curlieu, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Albert Norman's farm on the east, Barnett field and Clump Close on the north, the road leading from Kibworth to Carlton on the west, and the road leading from Tur Langton to Kibworth on the south.

(3.) An area comprising so much of the parishes of Goadby, Tugby, and Keythorpe, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Mr. Kendall's Church Close, Neather Meadow, and Sir A. Hazelrigg's Ploughed Close, and the village of Goadby on the west, Kendall's Baxted Hill, and his ten acres, Harrison's twenty acres, and Berry's Broad Meadow on the north, the Honourable Tyrwhitt Wilson's Bassetts Close on the east, Mr. Kendall's Top Hill and Side Hill fields, and the Honourable Tyrwhitt Wilson's ploughed field on the south.

(1.) An area comprising so much of the parishes of Little Bowden, and Braybrooke, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Bottom, Top, and Little Darnells, Middle field, and three ploughed fields, in the occupation of William Payne Cowley, Braybrooke; The Slip, first and second Hill, two

meadows, one ploughed field, and Crowthorns, all in the parish of Little Bowden, and five fields in the parish of Braybrooke, all in the occupation of William West, Little Bowden; three fields in the occupation of Mr. Broughton, in the parish of Braybrooke; Clack Hill field in the occupation of Sir W. de Capell Brooke, Bart., in the parish of Little Bowden, and Monks two fields also in the parish of Little Bowden.

(2.) An area comprising so much of the parish of Weston-by-Welland, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Wade's two fields, and Hayer's field on the east, the river Welland and the London and North-Western Railway bank on the north, Smith's field and Slawston-road on the west, and Rowlett's field and Ashley-road on the south.

(3.) An area comprising the parish of Abington, in the county of Northampton.

The following areas (namely),—(1.) certain premises in the township of Elland-cum-Greetland, in the West Riding of the county of York, adjoining the North Dean Railway station of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, and bounded by the property of John Maude and John Baldwin on one side, and the river Aire and the Aire and Calder canal on the other sides, and (2.) so much of the township of the Forest of Bowland, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the foot-path from Tommy Barn, by Sud Hill along the foot-path to Haw Hill, and from thence along the wall at the top of Horse-pasture and Higher Park-
