THE Imperial Forces commanded by Prince *Louis* of *Baden*, are going into their Winter-Quarters. We hope to hear very suddenly of the surrender of *Canisa* and *Great Waradin*, which places are now very closely block'd up.

Erenbretstein, Novemb. 17. The Elector of *Trier* parted from hence the 15th Instant for *Francfort*, from whence he would continue his Journey to *Auburg*. The French have put a great Garrison into *Trier*, and intend to fortifie that place this Winter.

Hamburg, Novemb. 18. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has sent the *Sieur de Canitz* to the Princes of *Lunenburg*, about the Affair of *Saxe-Lawenburg*; which it's hoped will be brought to a speedy Accomodation. His Electoral Highness is returned to *Berlin*.

Cologne, Novemb. 22. The States of this Diocels have written to the Elector of *Cologne* about the demolishing the Fortifications of *Bon*; to which they are expecting his Answer. The *Brandenburgers* have put a Garrison into *Dorsten*.

Brussels, Novemb. 20. Our Governor General returned hither on the 15th Instant from *Flanders*. The Count *de Flodorp*, who since the breaking up of the Dutch Army, has been quartered with the 3000 Men under his command in the Villages about *Leuwe*, is at last entred with the said Troops into that Town, where they are to remain this Winter. The Placaet strictly prohibiting all Commerce with the Subjects of *France* has been published at *Ghent*, *Mons*, *Nanur*, and other places in these Countries. Divers Persons of the chiefest Quality are gone to make their Compliments to the Queen of *Spain*, who is at present at *Dort*. The last advices from *Hungary* say, that part of the Imperial Army was marching towards *Valachia*, where they intend to take their Winter-Quarters. Amsterdam, Novemb. 24. Yesterday we received the news of the arrival of 21 Ships of our Moscovite Fleet in the *Texel*; They were off of the North Cape seperated from their Convoy; of whom, and 4 other Ships of the said Fleet we have yet no news. We have an account from *Legborne*, that the *Algerines* which were sent this Summer to the assistance of the Grand Signior, were passed by *Malta* in their return home, having with them several Prizes.

Hague, Novemb. 25. The Count *de Lanoy*, Envoy from the Prince of *Liege*, has had this week several Conferences with the Deputies of the States General, about Regulating the Winter-Quarters which our Troops are to have in the Country of *Liege*. The Baron *de Bongarts*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector *Palatin*, is arrived here, and will part again from hence in few days for *England*: And the *Sieur Canon* is, we hear, coming hither in the same Quality from the Duke of *Lorraine*. The Prince of *Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Friseland* and *Groningen*, continues

continues still here, and is daily present in the Council of State; where they are now about forming the State of the War for the next year. Prince *Waldeck* is expected here the next week.

Edinburg, Novemb. 21. Yesterday arrived in the Road of *Leith* a Danish Vessel with Sixty Foot Soldiers, after having been at Sea 14 days, and in very bad Weather. The Officer that Commands them has been before the Council, who have appointed Quarters for them.

Chester, Novemb. 23. We have an account from *Ireland*, that our Forces were gone into Winter Quarters; The General's Quarters being at *Lisnegarvey*. That *Charlemont* is closely block'd up by our Troops. That many of the Soldiers that had been sick, were on their Recovery. And that our Men, who upon the approach of 6 or 7000 *Irish* under the Command of Colonel *Sarsfield*, retired into the Fort at *Sligo*, after having with great bravery defended the Pass near the Town, till they had spent all their Ammunition, and killed many of the Rebels, with little Loss on our side, had been obliged through the want of Provisions to surrender the same; which they did upon very Honourable Conditions.

Pembroke, Novemb. 20. Yesterday sailed out of this Harbour six Ships laden with Provisions for *Carlingford* or *Carrickfergus*, under the Convoy of the *Europe* and the *Saphire*. And several Vessels are daily expected here with Provisions from *Bristol*.

Hull, Novemb. 23. The Danish Forces that lately arrived here are come ashore, in order to their marching to the most convenient Port to Embark at for *Ireland*; They are very fine Troops, and extremely well Equipped.

Famouth, Novemb. 21. We have an account by the *Malaga* Merchant, which arrived here 3 days ago from *Malaga*, that the Moors did Besiege *Larache*, a Spanish Garrison in *Africa*, with a numerous Army; that they had sprung several Mines, and made an assault upon the place, wherein they were repulsed with great loss, but that they continued however very much to press the Besieged.

Plimouth, Novemb. 22. This Evening came in here a Dutch Privateer with a French Prize, but what her Lading is, or from whence, we cannot yet learn.

Portsmouth, Novemb. 24. On the 20th Instant their Majesty's Ship the *Sampson* brought to *Spithead* a Ship of 400 Tuns, and 24 Guns, richly laden from the *West-Indies*, being suspected to belong to the French. The same day came in two Dutch Men of War to rest. On the 22th their Majesty's Ship, the *Rupert* sailed from hence for the *Danvers*. And this day the *Sampson*.

Whitehall, Novemb. 27. The *Heer Hep*, Counsellor and Pensionary of *Amsterdam*, and Envoy Extraordinary from the States-Generall of the United-Provinces, had on the 24th Instant Audience of the Queen Dowager, and this day of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of *Denmark*, being conducted by Sir *Charles Costrell* in the usual manner.
