(1.) Leading Light at Porto Torres.

THE Italian Government has given notice, that on 25th January, 1882, a leading light was exhibited from above the fountain on the southern embankment at Porto Torres, south shore of the Gulf of Asinara.

The light is a fixed red light, and bears S. $47\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W. from the fixed white light on the eastern mole

head, distant 283 yards.

Entering Porto Torres, the red light should be kept slightly open westward of the white light; the eastern mole head should be rounded at a distance of about 25 yards; and when within the entrance, the vessel should at once haul to the eastward, as on the west side of the port the water... shoals quickly.

BLACK SEA-NORTH COAST-BUG RIVER. (2.) Sievers Point—Alterations in Colour of Leading Lights.

The Russian Government has given notice, that on the opening of navigation in Bug (Boug) River, the following alterations would be made in the colour of the leading lights exhibited at Sievers (Siverson Point):-

The lower light, previously white, will be a red light; the upper light, previously red, will be a white light.

EAST COAST. (3.) Poti-Alterations in Colour of Leading Lights.

Also, that on 15th February, 1882, the following alterations would be made in the colour of the leading lights exhibited at Poti (Potijski), for crossing the bar of Rion River :-

The outer or seaward light, previously white, is a red light; the inner light, previously red, is a white light.
