An area comprising so much of the county of Worcester and of the borough of Birmingham as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Moseley-road on the east, from Leopold-street, Birmingham, parish of Aston, to Edgbaston-lane, parish of Kings Norton, Edward-road, Pershore-road, parish of Edgbaston, to Macdonald-street, Sherlock-street, Birmingham, parish of Aston, on the west, Macdonald-street, Adelaide-street, Darwin-street, and Leopold-street on the north, and Edgbaston-road from Pershore-road to Moseley-road on the south.

SCHEDULE.

An area comprising so much of the township of Marishes, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east the North-Eastern railway, on the south Marishes Cow-lane from the railway gates to the Pickering and Malton-road, on the west the Pickering and Malton-road, and on the north Thornton-lane from the Pickering and Malton-road to the Marishes railway-station, and seven fields on the north side of Thornton-lane known as the Crabtree Field, Over Lane Field, Chapel Field, Willow Field, Nigh Willow Field, Eight Acres Field, and Little Field all in the occupation of Francis Bower, and Jeffrey Nicholson.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878

THE following areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking):—

Berwickshire.—An area in the parishes of Edrom, Swinton, Wuitsome, Dunse, and Fogo, in the county of Berwick, comprising Bellshiel farm, Kimmerghame Mains farm, Kimmerghame Mill farm, Harcarse farm, Harcarse Hill farm, Crowfootbank farm, Greenrig farm, Whitsome South Laws farm, Greenknowe farm, Middlestots farm, Kimmerghame Policies and Parks, Mount Pleasant farm, Mungoswalls farm, Wedderburn Policies and Parks, Cairnhill farm, Nisbet Hill farm, Nisbet Mill farm, Nisbet Policies and Parks, Bogend farm, together with all roads, public and private, bounding or intersecting the same.

Cheshire.—(1.) So much of the township of Hellingworth, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road, Green-lane, then the fence running to Widdows Croft, then the fence dividing Widdows Croft and Fields farm to Mill brook, then the brook to the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the township of Kingsley, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Kingsley Church, thence by Wood-lane to the footpath leading to Kingsley, by fence to water pits, by stream to stile, thence by the fence leading to the junction of Hall on the Hey-lane and Ball-lane to Crewood Common, road to Mill-lane, Mill-lane to Beech-lane junction with Frodsham-
