The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations

shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as The Schleswig-Holstein Order of 1882.

2. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland only.

3. In this Order words have the same meaning as in The Animals Order.

4. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of an offence committed on or before that day.

5. Cattle brought from a port or place in either of the parts of the German Empire respectively known as Schleswig and as Holstein, (in this Order referred to as Schleswig-Holstein cattle,) and sheep and goats brought from Schleswig or Holstein in the same vessel with Schleswig-Holstein cattle, may be landed for slaughter in a foreign animals wharf, but not elsewhere.

6. The landing of Schleswig-Holstein cattle in a foreign animals wharf shall be subject to the condition that they are accompanied by a declaration and certificates, such as are indicated in the forms in the Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect.

7. If the declaration accompanying any cattle imported under this Order is untrue in any particular, as regards any one of the cattle to which it relates, the master of the vessel shall be deemed guilty of an offence against The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, with respect to all the cattle to which the declaration relates, unless he shows to the satisfaction of the Justices before whom he is charged, that he did not know of the same being so untrue, and that he could not with reasonable diligence have obtained that knowledge.

At Dethick Lea, and Holloway, in the petty sessional division of Wirksworth, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Dethick on to Tansley Moor, thence on to Riber Castle and Matlock Moor, thence by Bow Wood to Mr. Lowe's house on the Cromford-road, up to Lea Mills, up to top of Holloway, thence on the top-road to Lea village, and on to the first-mentioned road from Dethick.

(11.) So much of the parishes and townships of Repton, and Foremark, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from William Waytes house Milton along Milton-lane to a point opposite to Barnett's house at Brook End Repton, thence to the right up Monsholme-lane through Miss Measham's first Monsholme Meadow to Meakins Johny Meadow gate and fence to Old Trent Water, along the Old Trent to junction with main river, along the main river Trent by Twyford Ferry to junction with back water from Anchor Church, thence to the right along the back water, Anchor Church Pool, and brook course to John Goodall's Church Close at Foremark, turning to the left to Pale Close gate, and along the eastern and southern boundary fence of Church Close to the point where the fence intersects the foot-road from Foremark to Milton village, thence to the left along the foot-road to Milton village, turning to the right through a portion of the village to William Waytes house aforesaid.

(12.) So much of the parish of Duffield, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Derwent on the south, and on the east along the highway leading from Milford to Duffield to a point at Castle orchard, from thence by the foot-path across the fields to Hazelwood-road at New Inn, and across the Wirksworth branch of the Midland Railway to the Three-lane Ends at Kirk-hill, from thence in a straight line across the fields to the highway at Birley Grange farm, and from thence along the boundary fence between Allestree and Duffield parishes to the river Derwent aforesaid.

(13.) At King's Newton, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Portnall's shop Melbourne along the Derby-road by the Sir Francis Burdett Inn to Breach brook, thence along the brook course to the river Trent, to the right down the river to the corner of Donington Park, turning to the right along the wood round the south-western side of Donington Park to where the wood intersects the boundary of the counties

of Derby and Leicester at the northern corner of Samuel Stretton's Calf Croft, thence to the right along the fence on the boundary of those counties to the road from Donington to Melbourne, turning to the right along that road by Melbourne Railway station to the end of Chapel-street, and up Chapel-street to junction with the Derby-road at Portnall's shop aforesaid.

(14.) In the parishes of Newton Solney, and Repton, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Repton Cross through the village by the police station the Bulls Head Inn and the Shakespeare Inn to the cross roads at Repton Park Pond, thence to the right up the road by Broken Flats farm to (Higgotts) Newton-lane End, to the right down Newton-lane by Spooner's farm to Newton Solney, down Smedleys-lane by the blacksmith's-shop and Plough Inn Beer-house and foot-path to the river Trent, to the right along the river Trent to Willington Bridge, thence to the right along Willington-road over Old Trent Bridge and by Repton Church to Repton Cross aforesaid.

(15.) At Sandiacre, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point on the Sandiacre and Stanton main-road known as Orchard Head Hill to a foot-path crossing two fields known as Lady Cross and Freezland in the occupation of William Shaw junior to Forster's house, along the highway to the Derby and Nottingham-road, thence to a foot-path in the parish of Risley opposite Garrat's farm, by the right to Heaton's farm and No Mans-lane, thence by a fence to Stanton Hall sheds taking the fence by the right to the Stanton and Sandiacre main-road at Orchard Head Hill aforesaid.

Essex.—So much of the parish of East Ham, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Romford-road on the north, the London, Tilbury, and Southend railway on the south, Red Post-lane, East Ham, on the east, and Upton-lane, West Ham.

Flintshire.—The whole of the farm known as The Dee Side House farm, situate in the township of Sealand, in the parish of Hawarden, in the petty sessional division of Hawarden, in the county of Flint, bounded on the south-west by the river Dee, on the north-west and north-east by an embankment known as The Old Bank with a water-course running parallel thereto, and on the south-east by a farm known as Wood farm.

Hampshire.—So much of the parish of Millbrook, in the county of Southampton, and of the parish of St. Mary, in the borough of Southampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south by Alexandra-road, on the west by Shirley-road from Alexandra-road to Anglesea-road, on the north by Anglesea and Winchester roads to Point Out, hence on the east by Hill-lane to Alexandra-road on the borders of Southampton Common, and the whole of Southampton Common on the east of Hill-lane.

Herefordshire.—(1.) At Ross, in the county of Hereford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Prince of Wales Inn along the road to Ross to the Old Maids Walk, along such Walk to the Churchyard, thence north-westward in a straight line as the crow flies to the Old Wilton-road, along the said road to the junction thereof with the New Wilton-road, along the last-mentioned road to Mr. Collins's new road, along that road to the

Ross and Goodrich Ferry-road, and along that road to the Prince of Wales Inn, but exclusive of the said roads except the new road from Ross to Wilton from its junction with the old road up to the Royal Hotel.

(2.) At Ross, in the county of Hereford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Ross Railway Station along the Ross and Gloucester Railway to a point opposite the upper end of the meadows lying between Rudhall and Ross occupied by Mr. T. R. Webb, Mr. W. V. Bonner, and others, thence from the Railway as the crow flies northward to the Ross and Rudhall foot-path, thence along the said foot-path and Messrs. Gould's occupation road to the Ross and Ledbury-road, down the said road and over Ross-street to the Railway, and along the Railway to the station, but exclusive of the said roads and street.

(3.) So much of the parish of Cradley, in the county of Hereford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from Steens Bridge, Cradley, by the Hereford and Worcester-road to Ridgway Cross, by a lane leading from Ridgway Cross by Tan House farm to White House farm, and from thence by Home House farm to Novering's farm in a southerly direction, and thence to Arbor Hill and Bentley's farm; on the west by a brook running from Steens Bridge to Bentley's farm known as the Leddon brook, and by the highway leading from the Hereford and Worcester-road to Bosbury.

Lancashire.—(1.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Cheesden-brook on the north; Royds-brook on the south; Ashworth-brook on the west; and Knowe Hill-brook on the east.

(2.) So much of the township of Read, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south by the Padiham and Whalley-road commencing at Newtown, thence in a westerly direction to Dunkirk Gate, thence along a fence past Clough Side Wood to Cobkerr Nook, thence along a bye-lane to Newhall Gate, thence along the highway to Winns Quarry, thence by a foot-path to Symonstone Old Toll Bar, and thence by the Padiham and Whalley-road to Newtown aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the township of Higher Booths, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Burnley and Bury highway on the east, Fair Bank and New Barn farms on the west, Love Clough Printworks and Scar Foot farm on the north, and Cranberry Height and Mill Gate farms on the south.

(4.) So much of the township of Butterworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Broadshaw farm on the north, Knott Booth farm on the south, Moorbank farm on the west, and Garside farm on the east.

(5.) So much of the township of Chadderton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the township of Chadderton and the borough of Oldham on the north, the Lancashire and Yorkshire railway on the west, Oldham Cemetery (Chadderton) on the south, and Brook-street, Busk, on the east.

(6.) So much of the hamlet of Mossley, in the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county

of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Lancaster-street on the north, Market-street on the south, Stamford-road on the east, and Old-road on the west.

(7.) So much of the township of Castleton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Fenn's farm on the north, Broadshaw farm on the south, Mayfield farm on the west, and Higher Moor-bank farm on the east.

(8.) At Lytham, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from the passenger railway station along the Preston and Wyre railway to the junction cabin, east from the junction cabin along East Cliff-street across the beach by Glengarry House to the shore, south from opposite Glengarry House along the shore to Charles Mast, west from Charles Mast along Queen-street, Hastings-place, to the passenger railway station aforesaid.

(9.) So much of the township of Worsley, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north side Green-lane Broad Oak farm, on the west side along Worsley-road Worsley Court House, on the south side along the Bridgewater Canal to Monton Bridge, and on the east side along Worsley-road to the White Horse public-house.

(10.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a fence dividing the lands in the occupation of Thomas Starkie and John Oddie on the east, a fence dividing the lands in the occupation of Edmund Stafford and Richard Fitton on the west, Dark-lane on the north, and Mokin Brow on the south.

(11.) So much of the township of Edgeworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from the White Horse to Broadhead on the north and east, and by the highway from Hob-lane to Darwen on the south and west.

(12.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Whitewall farm on the north, Cheesden Bar on the east, Walmersley-road on the west, and the boundary of the borough of Bury on the south.

(13.) So much of the township of Westhoughton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from St. James Church, Daisey Hill, to the Wesleyan Chapel, Hindley-road on the north and west, and by a public footway leading from St. James Church, Daisey Hill, past Old Sirs farm to Hindley-road on the east and south.

(14.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Park Chapel on the north, Nangreaves on the east, Brookshaw on the west, and Nabs on the south.

Leicestershire.—(1.) The parishes of Barwell, and Stapleton, in the county of Leicester.

(2.) So much of the parish of Barkstone, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from Nottingham to Belvoir Castle on the north, the highway from Newark to Melton Mowbray on the east, the highway from Plungar

to Melton Mowbray on the south, and the highway from Granby to Plungar on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Carlton-Curlien, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Albert Norman's farm on the east, Barnett field and Clump Close on the north, the road leading from Kibworth to Carlton on the west, and the road leading from Tur Langton to Kibworth on the south.

(4.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Messieurs Danby, Walker, Knight, J. Bolton, George Webb, Sedgley, W. Tebbutt, Ashwell, and Smeeton.

(5.) So much of the parish of Carlton-Curlien, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Merr-road and the extreme boundary of A. Norman's farm.

(6.) The whole of the parishes of Goadby, and Keythorpe, and so much of the parish of Tugby as is included within the following boundaries, that is to say, Mr. Kendall's Church Close, Neather Meadow, and Sir A. Hazelrigg's Ploughed Close, and the village of Goadby on the west, Kendall's Baxted Hill, and his ten acres, Harrison's twenty acres, and Berry's Broad Meadow on the north, the Honourable Tyrwhitt Wilson's Bassetts Close on the east, Mr. Kendall's Top Hill and Side Hill fields, and the Honourable Tyrwhitt Wilson's ploughed field on the south.

(7.) The whole of the parish of Medbourne, in the county of Leicester.

(8.) The whole of the parish of Thorpe Langton, in the county of Leicester.

(9.) So much of the parish of Castle Donington, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway company's line from Trent to Melbourne, the highway from Castle Donington to King's Mills, the river Trent and Stud brook, and a bridle-road from Park-lane to G. T. Eaton's Bottom farm.

(10.) The whole of the parish of East Langton, in the county of Leicester.

(11.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Leicester turnpike-road on the west, the Union Canal on the north, the road from Harborough to Great Bowden on the east, and thence northwards to the point where the canal crosses the road leading from Great Bowden to the Leicester turnpike, and the northern boundary of the parish of Little Bowden on the south.

(12.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland and the London and North-Western lines on the east and west, and boundary of the parish of Thorpe Langton on the north, and the road from Great Bowden to Langton on the south.

(13.) All lands in the parish of Welham, in the county of Leicester, lying west of the village of Welham and in the occupation of Messrs. Hayres and King.

(14.) So much of the parish of Foxton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road from Harborough to Leicester on the west, the Midland railway line on the north, the road from Bowden Inn to Church Langton on the east, and the road from Leicester turnpike to Langton station on the south.

(15.) So much of the parish of Glooston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Gartrec-road on the south, Stouten Wood on the west, two ploughed fields and Bush meadow in the occupation of Mr. Rudkin on the north, and Goadby-road on the east.

(16.) The whole of the parish of Blaston, and so much of the parish of Holt as lies on the east side of Blaston and bounded by five ploughed fields in the occupation of Mr. Burton, in the county of Leicester.

(17.) So much of the township of Kibworth-Harcourt, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Kibworth to Wistow on the west, Wistow brook on the north, and the Midland railway on the east and south.

(18.) The whole of the parish of West Langton, in the county of Leicester.

(19.) So much of the parish of Allextion, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Uppingham turnpike-road on the north, East Norton station, railway, and bridle-road leading to Horninghold on the west, and Allextion-road leading to Hallaton on the east and south.

(20.) So much of the parish of Noseley, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Noseley-road and brook on the south and east, Rolleston Wood and Village road leading to New Inn and Noseley on the north and west.

(21.) At Burbage, in the parish of Aston Flamville, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Thomas Gilbert's farm on the north, the Hinckley and Lutterworth turnpike-road on the south, Soar brook on the east, and Jibbett's-lane on the west.

(22.) So much of the parishes and townships of Measham, Willesley, Oakthorpe, Stretton-en-le-Fields, Appleby, and Snarestone, in the counties of Derby and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Gallows Gate along Gallows-lane to junction with the Bosworth-road, to left down Bosworth-road to the bridge over the Snarestone brook, to right along the brook course (the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester) to Pepper Bridge, to the left along the Atherstone and Measham-road by Snarestone Church to point opposite Snarestone railway station, thence to the right under the railway bridge and along the Snarestone-road to Appleby, turning to the right by Black Horse Inn along Stoney-lane to junction with Heath-lane, to the right along Heath-lane to junction with Measham and Tamworth-road at point opposite Manor House Gate, to the right down Tamworth-road to Measham Tape Mill, thence to the left along the river Mease to the foot-bridge, thence to the right along the Stretton-en-le-Fields and Oakthorpe foot-road to the Burton and Measham main-road, crossing it and up Pickering-lane by Jent's brickyard up the hill by the Shoulder of Mutton Inn, through Oakthorpe Village to the Gin Stable-lane End, thence to the left along Gin Stable-lane crossing the Moira and Measham turnpike-road, along the Oakthorpe Colliery-road and occupation-road by Pastures farm to Willesley-lane, and to the right along Willesley-lane to Gallows Gate aforesaid.

(23.) So much of the parishes of Market Harborough, Great Bowden, and Lubenham, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the

following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by the Canal and a line drawn therefrom eastward to Highfield House on the road from the railway station to Great Bowden all in the parish of Great Bowden, from Highfield House to the river Welland on the east, on the south by the river Welland, and on the west by a line drawn from the river Welland at Plowman's Nursery Grounds northwards to its junction with the Canal as it circles Hill Crest House, the fields in the west boundary being partly in the parish of Great Bowden and partly in the parish of Lubenham.

(24.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Bowden to Thorpe Langton on the east, Langton brook on the north, Mr. Walker's big field on the south, and Mr. J. W. Walker's Far Close on the west.

(25.) So much of the parish of Foston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road from Countesthorpe to Kilby, the turnpike-road from Leicester to Welford, plough land belonging to and occupied by the Reverend Wing, and the bye-road from Foston to Peatling.

(26.) So much of the lands in the county of Leicester as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Medbourne to Welham on the north, and so much of the lands in the county of Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east and south, and so much of the lands in the counties of Leicester and Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the point where the railway line crosses the Welham-road through Welham to the point at which the bridle-road enters the road from Welham to Slawston on the west.

(27.) So much of the parish of Merevale, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by The Green Lanes, on the south and east by the brook which adjoins Beenhills farm, and on the west by the brook which separates the counties of Leicester and Warwick.

(28.) So much of the parishes of Overseal, Gresley, and Ashby-de-la-Zouch, in the counties of Leicester and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, turf and arable land in the occupation of Mr. Mason and also an Occupation-road in the parish of Gresley, in the county of Derby, on the north, turf and arable land in the occupation of Mr. Whitehead on the south, turf and arable land in the occupation of Messrs. Adams and Winterton, and the Bosworth and Burton-upon-Trent turnpike-road on the west, and grass land in the occupation of Mr. Clamp, in the parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch, on the east.

(29.) The whole of the parish of Theddingworth, and so much of the parish of Lubenham as is included within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north the extreme boundary of Theddingworth parish, on the south the road from Lubenham to Theddingworth, on the east the road from Lubenham to Laughton, and on the west the road from Theddingworth to Laughton, in the county of Leicester.

(30.) So much of the parish of Stonton Wyville, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Stonton brook on the north and west, the road from Tur Langton to Glooston on the south,

and the boundary of the parish of Glooston on the east.

(31.) So much of the parish of Smeeton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Kibworth to Smeeton on the north, the road from Gumley to Debdale on the south, the turnpike-road from Debdale to Kibworth on the east, and the road from Gumley to Smeeton on the west.

(32.) So much of the parishes of East Norton, Loddington, and Tugby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the north, Uppingham turnpike-road on the south, Loddington-road on the east, and Tugby Wood-lane on the west.

(33.) So much of the parishes of Castle Donington, and Diseworth, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Kegworth-lanes to Isley Walton and Diseworth as far as N. C. Curzon's farm premises the Wilderness, thence along the south-east fence known as Stud folds to Diseworth by Samuel Fletcher's farm premises the Hall farm, by the Holbow brook as far as Mr. Archer's farm-house The Grange, up Donington-lane to the Four Turns, thence to Richard Vesty's farm-house, thence along the north fence to Hemington-lane, and thence to the Wilderness aforesaid.

(34.) So much of the parishes of Bradley cum Neville Holt, and Great Easton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Medbourne-road on the west, Blaston-road on the north, Great Easton-road and Mr. Marchant's premises on the east, and Sir Bache Cunard's American House Cropsale and Marchant's Cropsale on the south.

Lincolnshire (Holland).—So much of the parishes of Frieston, and Fishtoft, in the petty sessional division of the Hundreds of Kirton and Skirbeck, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Roman Bank or Old Sea Bank on the south, and west from George Fletcher's house to Hobhole Sluice, on the north by Hobhole Drain from Hobhole Sluice to Fishtoft Bridge near the Rectory, and on the east by Frieston Scrane End-road from Fishtoft Bridge to George Fletcher's house aforesaid, but exclusive of the Frieston Scrane End-road.

Norfolk.—The parishes of Wigenhall St. Mary the Virgin, Wigenhall St. Germans, and Tilney-cum-Islington, in the county of Norfolk.

Northamptonshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Weston-by-Welland, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Wade's two fields, and Hayer's field on the east the river Welland and the London and North-Western Railway bank on the north, Smith's field and Slawston-road on the west, and Rowlatt's field and Ashley-road on the south.

(2.) So much of the lands in the county of Leicester as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Medbourne to Welham on the north, and so much of the lands in the county of Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east and south, and so much of the lands in the counties of Leicester and Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the point where the

railway line crosses the Welham-road through Welham to the point at which the bridle-road enters the road from Welham to Slawston on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Warmington, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east, the village of Tansor on the south, the river Nen on the west, and the parish of Fotheringhay on the north.

(4.) The whole of the parish of Ashley, and the whole of the lands in the occupation of Messrs. E. Berry, Charles Berry, and Robert Wade which lie in the parish of East Carlton, in the county of Northampton.

(5.) The parish of Crick, in the county of Northampton.

Nottinghamshire.—(1.) So much of the township of Brough, in the parish of North Collingham, in the county of Nottingham, as is comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the north by Norrell-lane, on or towards the east by a line leading from Mr. Barlow's farm to Norrell-lane, on or towards the south by Danethorpe-lane leading from Mr. Barlow's farm to the Foss-road, and on or towards the west by the Foss-road leading from Newark to Lincoln.

(2.) So much of the parish of Willoughby, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway commencing at the Widmerpool boundary and ending at Back-lane Willoughby on the east, the boundary river of the counties of Nottingham and Leicester on the west, Back-lane Willoughby and along the highway to Wymeswold Bridge on the south, and the boundary fence of the parishes of Willoughby and Wysall on the north.

(3.) Within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent on the south from Barton Boat in the county of Nottingham to and including a field known as Curzens Meadow at Long Eaton in the county of Derby in the occupation of John Shepperd, by a fence to Long Meadow-lane crossing the Midland railway to Clays Works, and on the east side of the Erewash railway, on the west to a point where the railway crosses the river Erewash into the county of Nottingham, on an occupation-road by John Hallam's farm in the parish of Toton, on the north to the Stapleford and Toton-road by a stream of water to the Nottingham-road by Moor Wood, by a fence in Harlys Field, on the east to a road leading to Attenborough by a fence dividing Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Handburry's land and Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Morriss's by a wire fence down to Barton Boat.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Attenborough, and Toton, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the west by a road from Barton Boat to Toton village, from thence along the Long Eaton and Nottingham-road to Chilwell brick-yard, along Bramcote-lane, on the north by Chilwell boundary fence to the Hop Pole Inn, on the east by the said boundary fence to the river Trent, on the south crossing the river Trent to Barton Wood, and along the Wood side to Barton Boat aforesaid.

Rutland.—(1.) The whole of the parish of Thorpe-by-Water, in the county of Rutland

(2.) So much of the parish of Liddington, in the county of Rutland, as lies between the

parish of Thorpe-by-Water, and the following roads, that is to say, the road from Liddington to Gretton, Northamptonshire, and the road from Liddington to Thorpe-by-Water.

(3.) So much of the parish of Caldecott, in the county of Rutland, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Welland on the south, the road leading from Thorpe-by-Water to Rockingham railway station on the north and west, and the road from Liddington to Gretton on the east.

(4.) The whole of the parish of Glaston, in the county of Rutland.

Shropshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Sheriff Hales, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Lodge Wood and private road leading from thence to Lilleshall Abbey and to Lilleshall House, thence His Grace the Duke of Sutherland's drive to Sheriff Hales Manor, and thence to Lodge Wood aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parish of Baschurch, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the water-course from Walford Heath to Fenemere brick-yard, thence the boundary fence which divides T. Slaney Eyton's property to the high-way leading from Merrington Green to Walford Heath water-course aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parish of Hinstock, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Lightwood-lane leading from the Woodseaves and Hinstock main-road to the Chester main-road at the Sweet Apple Tree, then the Chester main-road to the foot-road at Hinstock Villa, then the foot-road from Hinstock Villa to the Woodseaves and Hinstock main-road, and thence to the end of Lightwood-lane at Mount Pleasant.

(4.) So much of the parish of Chetwynd, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road from Blue House to Canal Bridge, Chetwynd End, thence by Water-lane to Vineyard-road, along the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Salop by Meertown brook, thence to Masons-place, and thence by foot-road to Blue House aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Childs Ercall, and Stoke upon Tern, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from the post office at Childs Ercall to Eaton village, thence the highway from Eaton to Ollerton village, and the highway from Ollerton to the post office at Childs Ercall aforesaid.

Staffordshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Brewood, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Stafford and Wolverhampton road from Gravelly Way Cross-roads to Standeford Bridge, thence by Saredon brook to the river Penk, by the river Penk to Stone Bridge, thence by the highway to Engleton Cross-roads, and by the highway from there through Crateford to Gravelly Way Cross-roads aforesaid.

(2.) Apesford farm in the township of Bradnop, in the county of Stafford, in the occupation of Samuel Bailey, together with the several farms in the occupation of George Tetterton, James Bassett, William Bailey, William Whieldon, John Fearnihough, William Rider, Herbert Eardley, Thomas Robinson, and Thomas Plumb, and all roads and bye-roads passing through such area.

(3.) So much of the parish of Brewood, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Wolverhampton and Stafford turnpike-road, from where it crosses the boundary of the parish of Brewood at Coven Heath, to the Canal Bridge at Slade Heath; thence by the Staffordshire and Worcestershire Canal to the boundary of the parish of Brewood at The Laches; and thence by that boundary southward to the aforesaid turnpike-road at Coven Heath.

(4.) So much of the parish of Harborne, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the boundary of the borough of Birmingham by Greenfield-road, by the portion of High-street between the western end of that road and Moor Pool-lane, by Moor Pool-lane to the Moor Pool, thence by the brook flowing from that Pool to the boundary of the borough of Birmingham, and by that boundary to Greenfield-road aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Betley, Audley, and Madeley, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from Betley village to Cook's Gate, thence by the highway which passes Heighley Castle to the turnpike-road from Madeley to Betley, and thence by that road to the first-mentioned highway at Betley village aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parish of Cheddleton, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from Basford to Leek as far as Leek brook (the boundary of the parish), thence by Leek brook to the boundary of the township of Bradnop, by that boundary to the road from Ball fields to Cocket Knob, and by that road and its continuation to Ringe Hay and the highway aforesaid.

(7.) So much of the parishes of Elford, and Croxall, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from the river Tame over the arch and by the school at Elford village to the turnpike-road from Tamworth to Burton-upon-Trent; thence by that road to Salter's Bridge at Oakley; and thence by the river Tame to the highway aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the parish of Handsworth, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Villars-road, thence by the Hamstead or Old Walsall-road to the Tame Valley canal, thence by that canal to the boundary of the county of Warwick, and thence by that boundary to Villars-road aforesaid.

(9.) So much of the parish of Swinnerton, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the western side of the highway from Millstone Green through Acton village to Whitmore.

(10.) So much of the parish of Rushall, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Walsall to Aldridge from Longwood Locks to Darbys Crossings, thence along Bosty-lane to the Midland Railway bridge near Daw End, thence along the Midland Railway to the Birmingham Canal, and thence along that Canal to Longwood Locks aforesaid.

(11.) So much of the parish of Whitmore, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the northern side of the road from Shutlanehead by Woodhouses to Nethersit Hay.

(12.) So much of the township of Weston Jones, and of the parish of High Offley, in the

county of Stafford, as lies to the west of the turnpike-road from Eccleshall to Newport, and to the south of the highway or road from the said turnpike-road by Loynton and Shebdon to Batchacre Hall.

(13.) So much of the parish of Longdon, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the north-eastern side of the turnpike-road from Lichfield to Rugeley, and on the south-eastern side of How brook.

Warwickshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Elmdon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry turnpike-road on the north, Olton-road on the south, Elmdon-lane leading to Solihull on the east, and Olton-road leading to the Birlingham and Coventry-road on the west.

(2.) So much of the borough of Birmingham, and of the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Birmingham and Warwick canal on the north; Warwick-road, Greet, in the parish of King's Norton, from Anderton's-road to Golden Hillock-road on the south, Golden Hillock-road from canal bridge to Warwick-road on the east, and Anderton's-road as far as the said canal bridge from Sparkbrook-road on the west and north-west.

(3.) So much of the hamlet of Erdington, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway on the south, Chester-road on the east, Grange-lane on the north, and the road leading from Bromford to Erdington on the west.

(4.) So much of the parish of Sheldon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bacons End to File Cross, File Cross to Mackadown, Mackadown to Marston Green, Marston Green to Windy-harbour, and Windy-harbour to Bacons End.

(5.) So much of the parish of Allesley, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry and Birmingham-road on the south, Church-lane and Staircase-lane on the west, Lower Coundon-lane on the north, and Coundon-lane on the east.

(6.) So much of the parish or township of Walsgrave on Sowe, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Wythen-lane on the south and south-west, Shilton-lane on the north and north-west, the Oxford Canal on the north, and the boundary of Sowe Common on the east.

(7.) So much of the parish of Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Readycap Hill-road on the south, the outside of Church Grove farm, Sindridge-road by Whitehouse Common to the Blue Houses on the east, by road to White Horse Inn, Brick Kiln-lane, and Rectory-road to the Gas Works on the north and west.

(8.) So much of the parish of Aston, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Chester-road from Castle Bromwich Hall to the Midland railway, thence to Bronford Bridge, to Stetchford Bridge, the river Cole to Coleford, the lane by Bucklands End, over the Green to the Coleshill turnpike-road, and on to the road to Castle Bromwich Hall aforesaid.

(9.) So much of the hamlet of Whittington, in the parish of Grendon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following bound-

aries, that is to say, the parish of Atherstone on the east and south, the London and North-Western railway on the west, and the lane leading from Alder Mill to the Merevale Crossing on the north.

(10.) So much of the parish of Chilvers Coton, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Astley to Stockingford on the west, the road to Temple House on the north, Park Wood on the east, and High Park Wood on the south.

(11.) So much of the parish of Stoke, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry and Binley-road on the south, the river Sowe on the east, certain property in the occupation of J. Gulson on the west, and certain property in the occupation of W. Pridmore on the north.

(12.) So much of the parish of Stoneleigh, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry and Tile Hill-road on the south, Banner-lane on the east, and Broad-lane on the north and west.

(13.) So much of the borough of Birmingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Tame from Lichfield-road to the Midland railway on the north and north-east, Warwick Junction canal from Tame to Church-road, Nechells, on the west and north-west, Church-road, Nechells, on the west and south-west, Washwood Heath-road on the south, and Common-lane to the Midland railway on the east.

(14.) So much of the parish of Coleshill, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Bacons End to Tile Cross on the north, the river Cole on the west and south, and the road from Bacons End to Windy-harbour on the east.

(15.) So much of the parish of Wootton Wawen, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Alcester to Henley in Arden, and the road leading out of the said road to Hungerhill Bridge on the east, and the stream from Hungerhill Bridge to the west boundary of the parish on the north.

(16.) The whole of the parish of Preston Baggott, in the county of Warwick, including the road on the east of that parish leading from Claverdon-road to Yarnagle Common, and so much of the parish of Rowington, in the said county, as is bounded on the east by the Birmingham and Stratford-on-Avon Canal.

Worcestershire.—(1.) So much of the borough of Birmingham, and of the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Birmingham and Warwick canal on the north; Warwick-road, Greet, in the parish of King's Norton, from Anderton's-road to Golden Hillock-road on the south, Golden Hillock-road from canal bridge to Warwick-road on the east, and Anderton's road as far as the said canal bridge from Sparkbrook-road on the west and north-west.

(2.) So much of the township of Oldbury, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Newbury-lane as far as the Twin Colliery, from the Twin Colliery by the boundary line of the counties of Worcester and Stafford to the Dudley and Oldbury-road at Brades village, from Brades village by the Dudley and Oldbury-road to Furnace Bridge on the Birmingham and Wel-

verhampton Canal, and from Furnace Bridge by the Birmingham and Wolverhampton Canal to Newbury-lane aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parish of Cotheridge, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Teine on the south, Bromyard-road on the north, certain lands in the occupation of Lambert Nicholls on the east, and certain lands belonging to the Reverend William Comyns Berkeley on the west.

(4.) So much of the parish of Yardley, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bromwell and Six-ways lanes on the east, Cole brook on the west, Robinhood and Hall-green lanes on the south, and Spring and March lanes on the north.

(5.) So much of the parish of Yardley, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Paradise and Church roads, Yardley Wood, on the east, Stoney-lane on the west, Billesley Common-lane on the north, and Wurstock-lane on the south from Hannah-lane to Church-road, Yardley Wood, aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parish of Tenbury, in the county of Worcester, as lies on the right of the Tenbury and Rochford-road from the end of G. R. Godson's walk to the Gravel Pit, thence the foot-path to Wire Bank Orchard and Kyre brook down to G. R. Godson's garden, and thence the path to the Tenbury and Rochford-road.

(7.) So much of the parish of Powick (including the hamlet of Woodsfield), in the county of Worcester, as lies on the south side of the main-road from Worcester to Malvern Link.

(8.) So much of the parish of Yardley, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Stratford-road on the east, Stoney-lane on the west, Cote-bank road and Swanhurst-lane on the south, and Moseley College-road over Greet Bridge to Stratford-road on the north.

(9.) So much of the parish of Bromsgrove, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the main-road from Bromsgrove to Birmingham from opposite the Spring Pools Chadwich to the Plough Inn, Whetty, from thence along Callow Brook-lane to the Gannow Green, from thence by Chapmans Hill-lane into the Bromsgrove and Halesowen-road, from thence by the Malt House-lane to Chadwich, and from thence by a water-course through Spring Pools to the Birmingham-road at the point first-mentioned.

(10.) So much of the parish of Tutnal and Copley, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Redditch and Evesham railway from the bridge near Wright's farm to the bridge near The Grange farm, from thence by the road leading to Copley Hill as far as the canal bridge, and thence by the Birmingham and Worcester canal to the old wharf Tardebigg, from thence by Brockhill-lane and Windsor-road into the Redditch and Alvechurch turnpike-road, and from thence by the road leading to Wright's farm to the railway bridge first-mentioned.

(11.) So much of the parish of Abbots Morton, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Shire-road, the Rouse Lench and Evesham-road, and the Worcester and Alcester-road.

Yorkshire (East Riding).—(1.) So much of the parish of Grindall, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from North Burton to Boynton on the east and south, and a quickwood fence dividing a grass field and tillage fields on the north and west sides in the same occupation and known by the name of the Back Garth.

(2.) So much of the parish of Hunmanby, in the Dickering petty sessional division, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Hunmanby to Rudston on the east, certain quickwood fences dividing tillage fields from the grass field known as Cowpasture, in the occupation of Hannah Lowish, on the north, south, and west.

Yorkshire (North Riding).—(1.) So much of the township of Marishes, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east the North-Eastern railway, on the south Marishes Cow-lane from the railway gates to the Pickering and Malton-road, on the west the Pickering and Malton-road, and on the north Thornton-lane from the Pickering and Malton-road to the Marishes railway-station, and seven fields on the north side of Thornton-lane known as the Crabtree Field, Over Lane Field, Chapel Field, Willow Field, Nigh Willow Field, Eight Acres Field, and Little Field all in the occupation of Francis Bower, and Jeffrey Nicholson.

(2.) So much of the parish of Dalby-cum-Skewsby, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Garforths plantation on the north, part of the Scackleton and Dalby-road and the Bushfield in the occupation of Christopher Gibson of Scackleton on the east, four grassfields known as Hagwoom Hill in the occupation of John Rook Farlington on the south, and the Hag Wood and Guide Postfield in the occupation of Robert Dobson on the west.

(3.) So much of the townships of Henderskelfe, and Welburn, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the outward boundary of the said township of Henderskelfe on the east, north, and west, and on the south by nine fields known as the Lords Moor, Moorhouse-Cottage-Pasture, Woodward's Moor, and Craven's Moor, all in the occupation of Richard Waller, Edith Woodward, Jabez Craven, and the Trustees of the Earl of Carlisle. All lying between Moorhouses and the Welburn Old Coach-road, from Moorgate to Cow-Mire-Gate, in the township of Welburn, in the North Riding of the county of York.

(4.) So much of the townships of Dishforth, and Asenby, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Dishforth and Cundall-road on the east, Lingham-lane on the south, seven fields known as Far Leylands, Forest-field, Craythorne, The Stripe, Far Sandbrough, Low Craythorne, and Sandbrough Bottom, in the occupation of Charles Mason, and William Lupton, Dishforth, on the west, and four fields known as the Boggs and Sixteen Acre field in the township of Asenby, in the occupation of John Thomas Shipley, Asenby, and Edward Wilkinson, Leckby Grange, on the north.

(5.) So much of the townships of Hovingham, and Scackleton, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following

boundaries, that is to say, on the north Banks Wood and Hovingham-road from Hovingham Mill Wood to Wigganthorpe Lodge in the township of Hovingham, on the east the Hovingham and Scackleton-road from Wigganthorpe Lodge to Scackleton Moor Plantation, on the south Scackleton Moor Plantation and five fields known as High field in the occupation of William Mattison, Cow-house field and Melbourns in the occupation of William Foxton, Pasture field in the occupation of John Sootheran, and the Cooms in the occupation of George Ward, and Mill Beck to Colton Mill, and on the west by a stream known as Mill Beck from Colton Mill to Hovingham Mill Wood, in the township of Scackleton.

(6.) So much of the township of Welburn, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Welburn Church to Pretty Wood on the west, Pretty Wood, Mill Wood, and Crambe Wood on the north, the Malton and York highway from Crambe Wood to the Stone Pillars on the east, and the highway from the Stone Pillars to Welburn Church on the south, and also comprising that portion of a field known as Woodcock Bank Pasture on the west of the said highway in the occupation of William Heckley.

Yorkshire (West Riding).—(1.) So much of the borough of Sheffield as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Brightside Bridge over the river Don, thence following Brightside-lane or Bent-lane in a south-westwardly direction to Saville-street, thence along a line to Washford Bridge, thence along Bacon-lane to the Sheffield and Tinsley Canal, thence along the said Canal to the borough boundary at Tinsley, and thence following the said boundary to Brightside Bridge aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the townships of Newton, Slaidburn, and Easington, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east side commencing at Slaidburn Bridge, then along the Slaidburn and Settle highway to Whiteholme Gate, then by boundary fence on bottom of Poor Part to Whiteholme Barn, in the township of Slaidburn, then by fence on the east side of Rough pasture to Easington-road, then on the south side along the said road to township boundary in the township of Easington, then continuing by the said road to Newton Bridge, then along the Clitheroe and Slaidburn-road to Newton brook, then along the said brook to West Meadow (on the west side), then on the north-west and north side by the outside boundary fence of Bluebutts farm to Threap Hill plantation, then by boundary fence on top of Hull Meadow, then by fence on top of Simpson's field to the Slaidburn and Hornby-road, then by Shay plantation to the river Croasdale, then by the said river Croasdale to the river Hodder at Slaidburn Bridge aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the township of Whitley Upper, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the west by Lepton Edge on the Wakefield and Austerlands turnpike-road, thence by Paull-lane to Jagger coal-pit, and on the south in a line from Jagger-pit by Water-pit, Dyson's farm, and Tordoff's farm to Grange Ash, situate on the Wakefield and Austerlands-road on the east, thence on Booth-lane to Clough Gate on the north, thence on

Lyley-lane and by Height's farm to Lepton Edge aforesaid.

(4.) So much of the townships of Hallon Gill, Malham Moor, and Stainforth, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at a point on the north side called Bracken Bottom Allotment, thence along the boundary fence to the top of Pennyghent Hill at the east end, thence on the east side by the fence adjoining School Allotment to Blishmer Barn, thence by West Close fence to the top of Fountains Fell, thence on the south side by a fence between Rainscar Pasture and New Pasture to Neals Ing Limekiln Pasture, thence by the south-west and west along Limekiln Pasture fence to the Settle and Halton Gill-highway, thence by the fence to Overdale and Dry Beck Allotment to commencing point at Bracken Bottom Allotment.

(5.) So much of the township of Longwood, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from Green House farm along a footpath to the Slack, thence by the west in a line to Bilberry Hall, and Scape Goat Hill Ridge on the south to Petty Royd's farm, thence by the east across Shaw Wood Beck to Green House farm aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the townships of Gisburn Forest, and Tosside, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing on the north side at Tosside Chapel Smithy, then along the Settle and Slaidburn-road to Pyethorns, then on the east side by Mere Syke (Beck) to William Nelson's barn, then on the south side by White Moss Carn (fence) to Burn Ridge Chapel, then on the west side by the Bolton and Tosside-road to the starting point at Tosside Chapel Smithy aforesaid.

(7.) At Fishlake, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Fishlake to Sykelhouse, on the north by meadow in the occupation of William Barker and William Walker, and on the other side by a grass field in the occupation of John Dale.

(8.) So much of the township of Snaith and Cowick, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Bawtry and Selby highway on the north, Perry-lane from Bawtry-road to Carlton Bridge on the west, the river Aire from Carlton Bridge to the end of Cowick Drain on the north, and Cowick Drain and Ings-lane up to the Bawtry and Selby highway on the east.

(9.) So much of the townships of Newsholme, and Horton-in-Gisburn, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north commencing at the river Ribble, thence by Boundary Syke by Slacks farm in the townships of Newsholme and Napper to the township boundary of Horton-in-Gisburn, thence on the east side by Boundary Syke to the Newsholme and Horton-road, thence along such road to Height Brow Bottom, thence on the south by Painley-road to the fence between Horton Green and Painley farms to Back Pasture fence, thence by the fence adjoining Stricklands farm to the Gisburn and Settle-road, thence along such road to Paythorne-lane top, thence along Paythorne-lane to the river Ribble Bridge, thence on the west side to the starting point.

(10.) So much of the township of Stansfield, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, East Lee-road on the south and east, Great House-road on the north, and East Lee Clough or Beck on the west until it joins East Lee-road aforesaid.

(11.) The whole of the township of Healaugh, in the West Riding of the county of York.

(12.) At Guiseley, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south and west by the Leeds and Otley highway, on the north by Buckle-lane, and on the east by Moor-lane.

(13.) So much of the township of Rathmell, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north commencing at Rathmell Mill, thence by School-lane to Rathmell Village, thence by Settle-road to Liniams Syke at the bottom of Rathmell Brow, thence by the said Syke to the river Ribble; on the east by the river Ribble to Rathmell Beck; on the south by Rathmell Beck to junction of Hollow Gill Beck, thence by the said Beck to a point where it joins Knowles Reaker Pasture; and on the west by the east fences of fields known as Knowles Reaker and High Meadow, thence by the north fence of a field known as Barn Shaw, and thence by the west fence of Low Gill Pasture and Wood to the starting point.

(14.)
