THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling_them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-second day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The following area (namely), -within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent on the south from Barton Boat in the county of Nottingham to and including a field known as Curzens Meadow at Long Eaton in the county of Derby in the occupation of John Shepperd, by a fence to Long Meadow-lane crossing the Midland railway to Clays Works, and on the east side of the Erewash railway, on the west to a point where the railway crosses the river Erewash into the county of Nottingham, on an occupation-road by John Hallan's farm in the parish of Toton, on the north to the Stapleford and Toton-road by a stream of water to the Nottingham-road by Moor Wood, by a fence in Harlys Field, on the east to a road leading to Attenborough by a fence dividing Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Handburry's land and Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Morriss's by a wire fence down to Barton Boat,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty eighth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an area infected with foot-ind-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.
