And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The following area (namely),—at Laverstock and Ford, in the county of Wilts, bounded on the north by a row of elm-trees extending from a pond called Read's pond on the eastern side of the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Amesbury to a field called Buckle Corner, on the east by a row of elm-trees extending from Buckle Corner to a field called The Sling, on the south by a bank and fence extending from The Sling to a plantation called Rockshill plantation, and thence by the northern boundary of such plantation to the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Amesbury, and on the west by the eastern boundary of the said turnpike-road,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The declaration described in the Schedule to this Order, made by the Executive Committee of the Local Authority for the county of Salop, declaring the existence of foot-and-mouth disease at the place therein mentioned, is hereby cancelled, and the infected place thereby declared shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. The following area (namely),—so much of the parishes of Stoke-upon-Tern, and Hodnet, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Ollerton village to a stream crossing the road between Eaton village and Great Bolas, thence the stream to the river Teen, thence the river Teen to Little Bolas Bridge, thence the highway to Peplow Church, and thence the foot-path to Ollerton village aforesaid,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eighteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.
