(2.) So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Cotonin-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Walton-upon-Trent, Drakelow, and Croxall, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge, turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent to Stanton-road, thence to the right along Stanton-road through Stanton village by the Gate Inn to Cadley Hill four cross roads, thence to the right along the road by Cadley Hill farm in the occupation of Robert William Beard to Cauldwell village, turning to the left along the road by Cauldwell Hall to the First Three-lane Ends, thence again to the left up the lane for Linton by the Square-and-Compass Inn to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, thence to the right up the road through the village of Linton by the Red Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence to where it intersects the road from Grange Wood to Lullington near the residence of Dr. Barstable, thence to the right along the road by Wood Fields farm to Lullington village, by the Gas Works, to the left by Lullington Church, to the right down the lane for Edingale by Westbrook farm Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale School, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

- Essex.—So much of the parishes of Aveley, Wennington, and Rainham, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Thames on the south, the London, Tilbury, and Southend Railway on the north, the road leading from Purfleet to Aveley on the east, and Rainham Creek on the west.
- Flintshire.--(1.) The whole of the farm known as The Dee Side House farm, situate in the township of Sealand, in the parish of Hawarden, in the petty sessional division of Hawarden, in the county of Flint, bounded on the south-west by the river Dee, on the north-west and northeast by an embankment known as The Old Bank with a water-course running parallel thereto, and on the south-east by a farm known as Wood farm.

(2.) So much of the parish of Worthenbury, in the county of Flint, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Whitchurch and Wrexham-road to Green-lane on the north, the Bangor and Worthenbury-road to Worthenbury on the north-east, Green-lane to the outer boundary of Emral Park to Pandy Bridge and Halghton Mill on the south-west.

Lancashire.-(1.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Rochdale and Edenfield turnpike-road on the south, Woodhouse-lane and Rooley Moorroad on the west, Catlow-lane Head and the Rochdale borough boundary on the north, and the Rochdale borough boundary to Cut Gate on the east.

(2.) So much of the township of Castleton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Chadwick and Lower-lane on the north, Dean brook, Ginnel farm, and Lords Tenement farm on the south, Dean Houses and Dean farm on the west, and Langfield farm on the east.

(3.) So much of the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bunker's Hill-lane on the north, Green Side-lane on the south, Lumb-lane on the east, and Failsworth brook on the west.

(4.) So much of the township of Birtle-cum-Bamford, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the borough of Rochdale on the east, the river Roach on the south, Birtle Chapel on the west, and Dixon Fold on the north.

(5.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary line of Reaps Moss Spotland from Todmorden and Walsden on the north, Old Road farm Troughgate Bacup on the south, Old Home farm and New Hill farm near Under Shore Shawforth on the east, and Dry Corner farm and Hey Head farm Bacup on the west.

(6.) So much of the township of Crompton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the townships of Crompton and Butterworth from Whitfield Bottoms to Jep Wood on the north, the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway from Jubilee to Smallbrook on the east, the footpath to Lower and Higher Rusheroft on the south, and the footpath by Mossgate and Whitfield Hey to Whitfield Bottoms aforesaid on the west. (7.) So much of the parish of Butterworth,

So much of the parish of Butterworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Cleggswood-laue and New Barns farm on the north, Hollingworth Lake Bank by Beach Hotel and Cleggswood Hey farm on the south, Fisherman's Hotel and Cleggswood on the east, and Three-lane Ends and Royal Oak Beerhouse on the west.

Leicestershire.—(1.) The whole of the parish of Welham, in the county of Leicester.

(2.) The whole of the parish of Slawston, in the county of Leicester.

(3.) So much of the parish of Humberstone, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Belgrave to Humberstone on the north, the turnpike-road from Leicester to Uppingham on the south, the road from the said turnpike-road to Humberstone on the east, and the road from the said turnpike-road past the borough Asylum to the said road from Belgrave to Humberstone on the west.

(4.) The whole of the parish of Gumley, in the county of Leicester.

(5.) So much of the parish of Beeby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Beeby to South Croxton on the north, the road leading from Beeby to Hungarton on the south, a footpath leading from Keyham to South Croxton on the east, and the village of Beeby on the west.

(6.) So much of the parish of Gaddesby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within
