**T**HE Chevalier *Pietro Morosini* returned hither the 13th Instant from the visit he had been to make the Doge, who continues still at *Spalatro*. He brought the following account of the late Expedition of the Proveditor General *Molino* into the Province of *Trebigny*. General *Molino*, after having caused some Troops to advance towards *Gasco* in *Dalmatia* to amuse the Basha of *Arcegovina*, marched on the 18th past with 1200 Foot and 800 Horse towards *Tribignie*. The Turks to the number of 6 or 700 had intrenched themselves near the River *Tribiuscha* to oppose his passage; but upon the approach of our Troops they quitted their Post, and retired into several Forts, which they had built for the security of that Frontier. General *Cornaro* advanced, and attack'd the strongest of these Forts, which after a resistance of some days, was surrendered upon Articles; this Example was followed by the Turks lodged in the other Works; and General *Molino* having caused them all to be demolished, except two, into which he put 600 Men, returned towards *Castlenovo*. By the taking of these Forts greatest part of the Province of *Trebignie* is brought under the Obedience of the Republick, and a passage is opened to the Towns of *Monfar*, and *Gabella*, which will be now obliged to pay us Contributions. By a Vessel come from the *Levant*, we are informed, that Signior *Rizani* continues to cruise with several light Frigats on the Coast of *Napoli di Makvasia*, to hinder the Turks from sending any Succors thither; and that he had taken some Vessels designed thither with Men and Provisions; as also several persons that came out of the place, who reported, that the Garison was in so great want of Provisions, that they would be forced to surrender, unless they were speedily relieved. The Proveditor *Cornaro* cruises in the *Archiepelago* with the Gal-

leys and Galeasses of this State, where he took lately a Galliot with 80 Turks.

*Lemberg, Novemb. 9.* All our Advices from *Moldavia* assure us, that the *Tartars* which were sent towards *Hungary*, are, upon the news of the defeat of the *Turkish* Army, returned to *Budziacke*. The King of *Poland* is now at *Zolkiw*, and will continue there till the end of the next month, when he intends to return to *Warsaw*, to be present at the opening of the General Dyet of this Kingdom, which is to meet there the 15th of *January*. There has been great rejoycing at this Court on occasion of the Election of the new Pope.

*Vienna, Novemb. 27.* We have advice, that the Garison of *Canisa* is reduced to the last necessity; and that the Count *de Budiani* has built several Forts round the place, which is thereby so closely shut up, that the Enemy can not receive any Relief from the Neighbouring Country. The Count *de Corbelli* continues likewise to streighten extremly the City of *Great Waradin*, and it's not doubted but that both these important places will in a short time be delivered up to the Imperialists. We hear also, that several Troops are appointed to block up *Terniswaer* during the Winter, which is already deprived of all hopes of Relief, by our being possessed of *Orsova*, *Fictistan*, and *Widin* on the *Danube*, and other places in those parts. The last Letters from *Widin* told us, that the Imperial Forces on that side were gone into their Winter-Quarters, and that Prince *Louis of Baden* was on his return hither.

*Cologne, Decemb. 6.* The Count *de Serini*, General of the *Bavarian* Forces is marching this way with two Regiments of Foot, one of Horse, and one of Dragoons, which are to be put into Garison at *Bonn*. The *Brandenburg* Generals who came lately hither to confer with the Deputies of the States of this Diocess about the Winter-Quarters, are returned to *Nuis*, where the Troops of his Electoral Highness have their Head-Quarter. affembled at *Rarabanne* continue their Deliberations for the adjusting the Affair about the Succession of *Saxe-Lauenburg*.

*Here, Decemb. 6.* On the 2d Instant a French Party of about 100 Men came to *Courtray*, a large Village on the *Muse*, with an intention to have plundered and burnt it, but some of our Troops having had notice of their march, prevented their design, killing 7 or 8 of them, and putting the rest to flight. The Regiment of the Count *Serclaes de Till*, General of our Forces, is marched to *Huy*; the Fortifications whereof are now repairing, and will in a short time be put into a better condition than they were in when the French lately abandoned that place. Our Prince has at present 6000 Men of regulated Troops in his Service, besides the Dutch Regiments that have their Quarters and Subsistence in this Country.

*Courtray, Decemb. 7.* A Party of 70 Men of the Garrison of *Newport* having the last week met 100 French belonging to *Ipres*, between the Villages of *Ebene* and *Coeckbaer*, they attack'd them with that vigor that they killed 11, and took five Prisoners. The French have repaired their Intrenchments between the *Lis* and the *Schelde*, and the Troops that are posted there, are commanded by *Montieur Calvo*.

*Edinburg, Decemb. 5.* This day a Proclamation was published here for Adjourning the Parliament to the First of *March* next. There has been likewise published a Proclamation for preventing of false Musters. We have an account from the North, of the arrival of a Danish Ship with 150 Men at *Peterhead* in *Buchan*.

*Chester, Decemb. 7.* The Wind continuing Easterly, we have no news from *Ireland*.

*Falmouth, Decemb. 5.* This day arrived here the *Anne* of *London*, the *Hopewell* of this place, and the *France* of *London*, all bound for the *Canaries*. 'Tis said a Dutch Privateer is cast away near the *Lands end*.

*Plymouth, Decemb. 8.* Yesterday the Lord *Berkeley* sailed out of this Port with the Squadron under his command, to the Westward. And this day arrived here their Majesties Ship the *Scepter*, with several Merchant Ships under her Convoy, from the Eastward.

*Portsmouth, Decemb. 10.* Their Majesties Ships the *Fersey*, and the *Oxford*, being refitted, sailed out of this Harbour the beginning of this week to *Spithead*; as the *Eagle* did this day: The *English Tyger* is arrived there from the *Downes*. The Men of War that are now at *Spithead* will,

it's believed, sail this day or to morrow to the Westward.

*Whitehall, Decemb. 10.* His Majesty has been pleased to Appoint *John Paul* Esq; his Consul for the Islands of *Zant*, *Corfu*, *Cassanidia*, and *Theaca*, with the other adjacent Islands appertaining to the Venetian Territories, and the Province of *Meren*, with the Islands, Ports, and Districts of and belonging to the same.
