(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 4th day of October, 1882.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area (namely),—so much of the parish of Wilford, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a certain road known as Wilford-lane leading from the Old Toll Bar to Wilford blacksmith's shop on the north-west, Ruddington-road to Landmear-lane on the south, Landmear-lane to Loughborough-road on the east, and Lough-borough-road to the Old Wilford Toll Bar on the north,-which was declared by Order of Council dated the fifth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease. 2. This Order shall take effect from and imme-

diately after the fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do

order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows: 1. The following Area (namely),—the whole of the buildings and land in the occupation of Thomas Coares at Southcoates, in the borough of Kingston-upon-Hull, bounded on the north by the Holderness-road, on the south by land in the occupation of George Foster, on the east by land in the occupation of David Smith, and on Mary Catharine, his wife, only child (who left

the west by land in the occupation of William Rogerson, - which was declared by Order of Council dated the eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.
