

The Bankruptcy Act, 1869.**In the London Bankruptcy Court.**

In the Matter of William Regan and Ernest Melvill, of No. 1, Cripplegate-buildings, Fore-street, in the city of London, trading as Regan and Melvill, Ostrich Feather Merchants and Copartners, Bankrupts.

Before Mr. Registrar Hazlitt, sitting as Chief Judge.

UPON reading a report of the Trustees of the property of the bankrupt, dated the 16th day of October, 1882, reporting that the whole of the property of the bankrupts had been realized for the benefit of their creditors, but that no dividend had been declared in consequence of the assets realizing sums insufficient to pay the costs of and incidental to the bankruptcy proceedings, and upon reading a report of the Official Assignee, dated the 16th day of November, 1882, and upon the application of Mr. W. H. Pannell, one of the Trustees in person, and no creditor appearing to oppose, the Court being satisfied that the whole of the property of the bankrupts has been realized for the benefit of their creditors, but that no dividend has been paid in consequence of the assets realizing sums insufficient to pay the costs of and incidental to the bankruptcy proceedings, doth order and declare that the bankruptcy of the said William Regan and Ernest Melvill has closed.—Given under the Seal of the Court this 1st day of December, 1882.

In the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Bangor. In the Matter of John Davies, of 15, Gloddaeth-crescent, Llandudno, in the county of Carnarvon, Lodging-house Keeper and Builder, a Bankrupt.

UPON reading a report of the Trustees of the property of the bankrupt, dated the 29th day of May, 1882, reporting that so much of the property of the bankrupt as could, according to the joint opinion of themselves and the Committee of Inspection thereunto annexed in writing under their hands, be realized without needlessly protracting the bankruptcy has been realized as shown by the statement thereunto annexed, and upon hearing the said Trustees and John Thomas, a creditor, the Court being satisfied of the truth of such report, doth order and declare that the bankruptcy of the said John Davies has closed.—Given under the Seal of the Court this 7th day of December, 1882.
