THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Disenses (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Each of the Areas described in the First Schedule to this Order which has been declared

by Order of Council to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease is (except as to such part or parts of each Area as is or are mentioned in Article 2 of this Order) hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and such Area (except as aforesaid) shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. Each of the following Areas, that is to say, —an Area around each of the Places declared by the Local Authority of the county of Norfolk to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease and described in the Second Schedule to this Order, such Area comprising all the lands and premises in the same occupation as the Infected Place which abut upon or immediately adjoin the limits of such Infected Place together with all sheds or premises on those lands shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be an Area infected with footand-mouth disease.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fourteenth day of December, one thousand oight hundred and eighty-two.
