(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

At the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 16th day of December, 1882.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—at Aspall, in the county of Suffolk, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the fence from Aspall Hall Wood in a northerly direction towards Bucks Hall farm on the east, a small rivulet running to the river Deben on the north, Aspall Green and the road leading to Aspall Hall on the west, and Aspall Hall and grounds eastwardly to Aspall Wood on the south,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eighteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

SCHEDULE.

An Area comprising so much of the parish of Goldington, in the county of Bedford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Bedford and St. Neots-road on the north-east commencing at the Swan Public-house, thence to the mansion and grounds of Goldington Grange, and by the river Ouse on the south and south-west to Newnham Old Mill.
