

the wall alongside the Leeds and York-road commencing at the Sissing field and ending at Killingbeck Lodge gate on the south, thence by way of the private carriage drive through Killingbeck Park to Foundry Bridge and the Beck bounding the borough of Leeds to Bleach-grounds on the west, thence by the footpath to Seacroft and Iron Hills top and the fence at the bottom of Chapel field on the north, and thence by the fence at the bottom of Seacroft Park and by way of Long Walk to Sissing field on the east.

(11.) At Selby, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Olive Bush farm, Hill fields, Holme Dyke, and the river Ouse to Selby Lock on the north, the Canal to Stone Bridge on the east, from Stone Bridge in a line to Longmans Hills and Green-lane on the south, and from Green-lane to Scaber Houses, and Cross Hills to Olive Bush farm aforesaid on the west.

(12.) So much of the parish of Thorne, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway on the north, the Doncaster and Thorne highway on the east, Tudworth and Gibbon-lane and the Bank connecting that lane and Bailey-lane on the south, and Bailey-lane on the west.

(13.) So much of the township of Marsden-in-Almondbury, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Car Clough on the south, thence by Pule Hill on the west, to High Gate with Netherley and Side Ing on the east, to High Gate Clough on the north, and thence to Car Clough aforesaid.
