Falmouth, April 8.

Yeste day arrived here the Hannah of Tarmouth from bourdcaux, her laoing Wine, Vinegar, and Prunes, intending for *Briffol*; telling us that on Friday laft they faw the French Fleet confifting of 15 m n of War, and as they judged about 2 Firefhipsonly ftanding towards Breft.

Plymouth, April 10. Yesterday put into this Port two Dutch men of War of about 40 Guns api ce, intending for the Westwards.

Memcastle, April 10. On Tuesday 1sft failed from this Port a Fleet of 70 laden Colliers, and the last night arrived 10 fail of light flips, most of them great ships.

. Lime April 11. On Wednefilay laft arrived here the John of this place from Croyfick, informing us, that Monlieur de Bea. fort with his Squadron is again put into Harbor, intencing in little time to put to fea with a much g eater Fleet.

Portsmouth, April 12. Here is lately arrived Sir Edward Sprage in the Revenge, which having fprang a leak, was forced to quit the rest of the Squadron, and will be fuldenly put upon the Dock to repair.

Genoue April 4. On Munday the 2 inftant, the Duk: of sthis place was with the usual Solemnity and Ceremony, Crowned for the Kingsom of Corfica, and yesterday entertained his Relations at an extraordinary Feaft

From Milan we are informed, that on Thursday laft Don Lovis Pons de Leon having some few dayes been ill of an Apoplexy, departed this life in the 63 year of his Age and the fixeh of his Government in that State. His Body eloathed in his habit of General, with a Commanders Staffe in his han 1, was on the Saturday morning tollowing expofed to publick View in the great Hall of his Pallace, under a rich Canopy of State fee round with a great Number of Torches, whither all the Religious Orders repaired, to perform the Devotions ulually plastifed on fuch Occasions. That Night the Body was by the principal Officers with much flate carried from thence into the Collegiate Church of Santa Maria della Scala, where the ulual Offices were performed in presence of the Marquils de los Balbafes, of the House of Spinola; who was in prefence of the Privy Council afterwards affembled in the Ducal Palace, declared prefent Governour by the great Chancellour Don Diego Zapara, and has fince received the Complements of the Council and all the great perfons about the Town.

The Prince de Monaco having been much fatisfied with the Civilities which he received during his abode here the last week, departed hence towards his own P in ipality in a Galley b. longing to this Republick, which was ordered to attend lim.

From Turin we are told timt the Duke of Savoy is very intent upon the Refu't of the Affembly of the Cantons of Swizzerland., The Deputies of Geneva are fuddenly againexpected at that Court, to perfect the Tre ty with equal latisfadion to both part es

Venice, April 7. The time of the year drawing on for Action, and the news of the Turks preparation for a more wigorous profecution of the war in Candia, then has been hitherto made \$ the Senate is more then ulually conce ned to haften forwards a proportionable liccor for the definee of it; to which end, leveral Companies are drawing out from Form Eerms, and are with some others deligned for the fame employment, to be speedily multered and prid, and then to embarke at Malanocompon Home Ships which there

attend them, and may the next week put to fea (if the wind favour them) with whom are to be allo fent a con-fiderable number of Gunners, Lab uters, Pioneers, with all forts of Provision and Ammunition, necessary for the supply of the place, from whom our latest .Letters inform us, that the Turks, notwithftanding all the difcourage-ments and confiderable flaughters made amongst them by the valour of the Defendants in their Sallies, Itill continue the Siege with as much obftinacy as ever, and by their Mines are endeavouring to make themfelves a way through the Graft, with the more cafe to aflault the Town's but by the great vigilancy of the Defendants, are always prevented of their defignes, and that particularly, two of the Galleries which were made near one of the principal Bulwarks, were by our Counte mines blown up, and many of the Turks buried in their ruines.

The Christian Privateers besin to grow numerous in those feas, cruising about the Archipelago, and especially upon the C afts of Natolia, where several Saichs and other fhips of good value have ately fallen into their hands, one whereof a ftout ship with many Guns being taken near Scios was lately fent into Candia.

From Dalmatia we have in elligence of the arrival of feveral Turkish Merchanis from Constantinople at Raguze, by the way of Albania, who inform that in all-places through which they puffed, the Turks were making great preparati-ons for war \$ but that the Spaks and Hanifaries had fo ill-an opinion of the fervice in Candia, that they were ready to fal into mutiny upon the leaft propolal thereof \$ they ip ak allo of one of the Baffar in Afia who has lately re-belled, but that the Grand Seignior having notice thereof, intended to fen 1 his Fanifartes thither to reduce him to obedience, and by that means to prevent all inconveniences which might happen by their mutinous practices ; but being wholly intent upon the conqueft of *Candia*, great numbers of men were in leveral p aces drawn regether, he intending to employ in that fervice O. hundred thouland men, with an hundred Galli s, and 50 of , r thips of force, with an extraordinary lupply of all things necessary for that work.

A Gally lately arriving from Dalmatia for Moneys for the payment of our Souldiers in those parts, i forms us, that al things there have been for some time in a quiet posture, the Turks keeping quiedy in their Quarters, and the Mor-laichs, by sealon of the late indisposition of their Captain, having not adventured out upon any delign of importance.

Other Le ters from Gandia inform us that the Turks continue from their Baj ery to play upon the Fort, to the great projudice thereof \$ but that the Gen tal was taking care to sem-dy that inconve ience, and lo to order the matter, that hips might have a fice pana, e in and out, and that the Jurks were invited to gai e this Battery by one Andrea Barecci, formerly a Caprain in Dalmatia, but fince a Soldier under the command of the Marquis Ville, who flying out of the Town for fear of punifhment for fome Crime com-mitted, had discovered the weakness of that lide to the Enemy,
