The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Supreme Court of Judicature Act, 1873," it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to direct that there shall be District Registrars in such places as shall be in such Order mentioned for districts to be thereby defined, from which writs of summons for the commencement of actions in the High Court of Justice may be issued, and in which such proceedings may be taken and recorded as are herein-after mentioned; and Her Majesty may thereby appoint that any Registrar of any County Court, or any Registrar or Prothonotary or District Prothonotary of any local Court whose jurisdiction is hereby transferred to the said High Court of Justice, or from which an appeal is hereby given to the said Court of Appeal, or any person who, having been a District Registrar of the Court of Probate, or of the Admiralty Court, shall under this Act become and be a District Registrar of the said High Court of Justice, or who shall hereafter be appointed such District Registrar, shall and may be a District Registrar of the said High Court for the purpose of issuing such writs as aforesaid, and having such proceedings taken before him as are hereinafter mentioned:"

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did, on the 12th day of August, 1875, order that there should be District Registrars in certain places in England:

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that there should be a District Registrar at Bath:

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

That from and after the first day of April, 1883, there shall be a District Registrar at Bath, and that the Registrar of the County Court held at Bath is hereby appointed the District Registrar at Bath, and that the district shall be the district for the time being of the County Court holden at Bath.

WHEREAS by the 4th section of "The Medical Act" one of the persons to constitute "The General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom," to be established under or by virtue of the provisions of that Act, was to be a person chosen from time to time by the University of Glasgow and the University of St. Andrew's collectively: and by the 5th section of the said Act it was provided that if the said Universities of Glasgow and St. Andrew's should not be able to agree upon some one person to represent them in the Council, it should be lawful for each one of the said Universities to select one person, and thereupon it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to appoint one of the persons so selected to be a member of the said Council for the said Universities:

And whereas in the year 1877 the said University of Glasgow and the said University of St. Andrew's collectively chose James Bell Pettigrew, Esquire, Doctor of Medicine, to be their representative in the said General Council for the term of five years:

And whereas under and by virtue of the provisions of the said Act, the said James Bell Pettigrew has ceased by lapse of time to be a member of the said General Council:

And whereas the said Universities of Glasgow and St. Andrew's have not been able to agree upon some one person to represent them in the said General Council, and, in pursuance of the said 5th section of the said Act, the said University of Glasgow hath selected William Tennant Gairdner, Esquire, Doctor of Medicine, and the said University of St. Andrew's hath selected the said James Bell Pettigrew, and have submitted the names of the said two persons to Her Majesty in Council:

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth, under and by virtue of the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Medical Act, appoint the said James Bell Pettigrew to be a member of the said General Council for the said Universities of Glasgow and St. Andrew's for the term of five years from the date hereof.

**W**HEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the rules concerning the measurement of tonnage of merchant ships for the time being in force under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," therein called the Principal Act, have been adopted by the Government of any foreign country, and are in force in that country, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to direct that the ships of such foreign country shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers, and thereupon it shall no longer be necessary for such ships to be remeasured in any port or place in Her Majesty's dominions, but such ships shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes, in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificates of registry of British ships is to be deemed the tonnage of such ships :

And whereas Her Majesty, by Order in Council dated the 30th day of September, 1873, was pleased to direct that merchant sailing and steam ships belonging to the Kingdom of Italy, the measurement whereof had after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such ships testified by the dates thereof should be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their registers or other national papers in the same manner and to the same extent and for the same purposes in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificates of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships ; provided, nevertheless, that if the owner or master of any Italian steam ship should desire the deduction for engine-room in such ship to be estimated under the rules for engine-room measurement, and deduction applicable to British ships instead of under the Italian rule, the engine-room should be measured and the deduction calculated according to the British rules :

And whereas the Government of His Majesty the King of Italy have, by Royal Decree, dated the 30th day of July, 1882, modified the rules for engine-room measurement and deduction applicable to Italian steam ships, and the said modified rules are now the same as those in force under the said principal Act, and came into operation in the said Kingdom of Italy on the 21st day of September, 1882 :

Her Majesty is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the steam ships of Italy, the certificates of Italian nationality and registry of which are dated on or after the 21st day of September, 1882, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in the said certificates of Italian nationality and registry.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-

four ; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine ; of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, in the words following, that is to say :—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four ; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine ; of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven ; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Thomas situate at Pear Tree, within the limits of the particular district of Saint James the Greater, Derby, sometime part of the parish of Saint Peter, Derby, in the county of Derby, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas, situate at Pear Tree as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William Dalrymple, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said particular district of Saint James the Greater, Derby, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Thomas situate at Pear Tree as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Derby.'

"And with the like consent of the said William Dalrymple, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials, should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Thomas situate at Pear Tree as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being : Provided always, that the said fees which may arise from such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said church of Saint Thomas shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the Reverend Charles Hurlock Molineux, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint James the Greater, Derby, for the term of his incumbency of the same perpetual curacy and shall in like manner be paid over to the successor or successors of the said Charles Hurlock Molineux in the incumbency of the same perpetual curacy if and so long as (but no longer than) the said successor or successors in such incumbency shall be under legal obligation to pay over to the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of

Saint Peter, Derby, any portion of the fees which may be received in respect of the publication of banns of matrimony and the solemnization or performance of marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials at the church of the said particular district of Saint James the Greater, Derby: And provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Derby, being:—

"All that part of the particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby in the county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield which is bounded on the north-east and on the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the consolidated chapelry of Saint Chad Mill Hill Derby in the county and diocese aforesaid from the particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby aforesaid at the point where Normanton-road is joined by Rose Hill-street and extending thence that is from the said boundary south-eastward along the middle of the said street for a distance of fifteen and a quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with Fleet-street and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of ten and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cambridge-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to its present south-eastern end and continuing thence still south-eastward and in a straight line for a distance of sixteen and a half chains or thereabouts to a point at the middle of the present southern end of Shaftesbury-street and continuing thence still in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a further distance of twelve and a half chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the line of the London and North-Western Railway and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of thirty-seven chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby from the parish of Normanton in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the north-east and south-east as aforesaid that is to say upon the south and upon the west as follows upon the south and upon part of the west by the parish of Normanton aforesaid and upon the remaining part of the west by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Chad Mill Hill Derby aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London-Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and

Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Town Council of any borough stating that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial-grounds of one or more parishes, being wholly or partly within such borough, that there is difficulty or inconvenience in providing, under the powers of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis," and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of such parish or parishes, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that powers shall be vested in the Council of such borough for providing such places of burial under the provisions of the said Act: Provided always, that notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in such borough, one month at least before such petition is so considered:

And whereas the Town Council of the borough of Stoke-upon-Trent, in the county of Stafford, have presented a Petition to Her Majesty in Council stating that Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards of St. Peter's-at-Stoke, St. Thomas Penkhull, and Holy Trinity, Hartshill situate within the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent and representing that there is difficulty and inconvenience in providing requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent under the powers of the Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," and praying that powers may be vested in the Town Council of the said borough of Stoke-upon-Trent for providing requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent under the provisions of the said Act made and passed in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty's reign:

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council has been duly published as required by the said first recited Act

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order,

as it is hereby ordered, that powers be vested in the Town Council of the said borough of Stoke-upon-Trent for providing requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent under the provisions of the said first recited Act, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis."

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parish without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the thirtieth day of November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of

Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parish without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued, as follows, viz. :—

**ELSTREE.**—Forthwith and entirely in the church of Elstree, in the county of Herts; and also in the old portion of the churchyard, except as follows,—

In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing therein burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented. *C. L. Peel.*

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled

"An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-sixth of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, to direct the discontinuance of burials in the parish of Hornsea, in the county of York, in the words following:—

**HORNSEA IN HOLDERNESS.**—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Hornsea in Holderness, and in the churchyard except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and except also in earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of any human remains except decayed bones.

And whereas Her Majesty was also pleased by Her Order in Council of the thirtieth September, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, to direct the discontinuance of burials in the parish of Malpas, in the words following:—

**MALPAS, CHESHIRE.**—Forthwith wholly in the parish church of Malpas, in the county of Chester; and in the churchyard after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, except in now completed vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and except in other graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins or disturbance of remains, for the burial of the widowers or widows of those already buried therein.

And whereas Her Majesty was also pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, to direct the discontinuance of burials in the parish of Llanbedr, Denbighshire, in the words following:

**LLANBEDR, DENBIGHSHIRE.**—In Llanbedr churchyard, except in graves which can be opened without the exposure of remains; and it is also ordered that no body be buried within four feet of the surface of the ground, except in walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an airtight manner.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and Churchwardens of the above-named parishes ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that for the protection of the public health the said Orders of Her Majesty in Council should be varied in the manner hereinafter specified:—

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Order in Council of the thirtieth day of November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her

Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette and copies thereof have been affixed as required by the said first recited Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Orders in Council dated respectively the twenty-sixth day of October one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, the thirtieth day of September one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and the twelfth day of April one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine be varied as follows, viz.:—

**HORNSEA.**—By the omission in the Order in Council of the twenty-sixth October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, of the words after "churchyard" and by the substitution of the following:—

"After the first September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, except as follows: (a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

"(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein, as can be buried at or below that depth.

"(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth."

**MALPAS.**—By the omission in the Order in Council of the thirtieth September, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, of the words after "Chester," and by the substitution of the following:—

"And in the old part of the churchyard, except as follows: (a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing, burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

"(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

"And also in the new part of the churchyard except as follows: (a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

"(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already

"interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth :

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES  
(ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

THE following Areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those Areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those Areas, without untrucking):—

*Buckinghamshire*.—(1.) So much of the parish of Langley Marish, in the county of Buckingham, as lies between the Great Western Railway and the main-road called the Bath-road (except the hamlet or chapelry of Colnbrook).

(2.) The whole of the hamlet of Ditton, in the parish of Stoke Poges, in the county of Buckingham.

(3.) The whole of the parish of Stewkley, including all hamlets therein, in the county of Buckingham.

(4.) So much of the parish of Soulbury, including the hamlet of Hollingdon, as lies to the northward or north-westward of the road leading from Stewkley through Soulbury to Stoke Hammond, in the county of Buckingham.

(5.) So much of the parish of Penn, in the county of Buckingham, as is situate on the south side of the village of Penn and south of the road leading from Penn village to Hertfordshire farm, and so much of the parish of Woburn as is situate on the north side of the main-road (late turnpike) leading from Cheppington Wycombe to Beaconsfield.

*Liberty of the Isle of Ely*.—(1.) So much of the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland Railway on the north from Gold Dike to Murrow Station, the Murrow Bank on the east from Murrow Station to the North Bank of the river Nene or Smith's Leam at Guyhirn Corner, the said North Bank on the south from Guyhirn Corner to The Cross Guns, and Gold Dike on the west from The Cross Guns to the Midland Railway.

(2.) So much of the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary drain from Murrow Chapel to Kilburn's-lane on the north, Murrow-lane from Kilburn's-lane to Tholomas Drove on the east, the lane from Tholomas Drove to Murrow Bank on the south, and Murrow Bank to the Chapel aforesaid on the west.

(3.) Such part of the parish of Whittlesey, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as is comprised within an imaginary boundary line commencing at a point at or near the junction of the Town-road and the Twenty-fifth Private or New-road, thence in a northwardly direction following the course of the Town-road to its junction with the Twenty-first Private-road, thence along such last-mentioned road in an eastwardly and north-eastwardly direction to the Nineteenth Private-road, thence following the course of such last-mentioned road to its junction with the Forty-first Private-road, thence along such last-mentioned road to the gate of Decoy farm, thence in a southwardly direction along the Twenty-third Private-road to Fell Dell drain, thence along such drain in an eastwardly direction to (but excluding) certain premises in the occupation of Stephen Gregory in or near the Drift Way known as Cow Way or Twenty-ninth Private-road, thence along Cow Way in a southwardly direction to and including the premises of Charles Gill, thence in a straight line across the Whittlesey

and March-road to Half Acre Drove, thence along such Drove and the Forty Acre Drove in a southwardly direction to the Fortieth Private-road, thence in a westwardly direction along such last-mentioned road and the Twenty-fifth Private or New-road to the Town-road aforesaid, being the first named point; the Town-road, the Twenty-first, Nineteenth, Forty-first, Twenty-ninth, Fortieth, and Twenty-fifth Private-roads and Half Acre and Forty Acre Drovers not being included in the Area.

*Cheshire*.—(1.) So much of the borough of Hyde, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road commencing at the Hare and Hounds Public-house running in a southerly direction along the top of the Low to New Houses, thence along the fence to Salters-lane, thence along such lane to the same road in a northerly direction to the point where such road joins the footpath leading to the Grapes Inn, Gee Cross, and thence along Joel-lane in an easterly direction to the Hare and Hounds Public-house aforesaid.

*Cornwall*.—So much of the borough of Truro, in the county of Cornwall, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the main-road leading from Truro to Chacewater, the main-road leading from Truro to Perranporth, and a lane called Chiddaw-lane leading from the Perranporth-road to the Chacewater-road.

*Derbyshire*.—(1.) So much of the parish of Dale Abbey, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, starting from a point on the Ilkeston and Derby-road (the Sandpits), by the right to the Flourish Inn, by the right along the footpath to Stanley brook, thence along the brook course to Baldock Mill, by the right up Cat and Fiddle-lane to the Ilkeston and Derby-road, and by the right

along the Ilkeston and Derby-road to the Sandpits aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes and townships of Willsthorpe, Sandiacre, Risley, Draycott and Church Wilne, Breaston, Sawley, and Long Eaton, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the river Trent Bridge at Sawley along that river passing Trent Lock to the junction of the river Erewash, along the Erewash to Sandiacre Bridge, by the left through Sandiacre village, along the Nottingham and Derby-road through Risley passing Hopwell Park Lodge, by the left along Gipsy-lane, along the Draycott-road, over the Canal Bridge, by the right down the occupation-lane at Noonning Ford, by the left along the river Derwent passing Wilne Mill to Derwent mouth, and thence along the river Trent to Trent Bridge at Sawley aforesaid.

(3.) At Medomsley, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway known as Cut Throat-lane leading to Allendale Cottages on the north, the cart-road leading from South Field to Cut Throat-lane Ends on the east, the bridle-road leading from Bradley-lane Ends to South Field on the south, and West-lane leading from Allendale Cottages to Bradley-lane Ends on the west.

(6.) At Brandon, in the county of Durham,

comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the foot-road leading from Brandon village to Langley Hall on the north-west, the highway leading from Langley Hall to Langley Moor on the north, the highway leading from Langley Moor to Brandon-lane Ends on the south-east, and the highway leading from Brandon-lane Ends to Brandon village on the south-west.

(7.) So much of the borough of Darlington, in the county of Durham, as is bounded on the north by the Cross Back-street leading from Back-street behind Hargreave-terrace to Park-place, on the east by the said Back-street behind Hargreave-terrace, on the south by the south side of Swan-street, and on the west by the west side of Park-place.

The whole of the farm known as the Home farm, situate near Wyvenhoe Park, in the parish of Greenstead, in the borough of Colchester, in the county of Essex, and all such part of the said Wyvenhoe Park as lies within the boundary of the said borough, the said boundary being shewn and the said part of the said Park being divided off from the remainder thereof by a fence, dyke, watercourse, and pond; and which farm and Park are respectively in the occupation of H. J. Gurdon-Rebow.

(5.) All such part of the farm known as Friday Wood farm, in the parish of Berechurch, in the borough of Colchester, in the county of Essex, in the occupation of Samuel Blomfield, as lies on the west side of the highway (called

Friday Wood-road) leading from Colchester aforesaid to Layer-de-la-Haye and within the boundary of the said borough of Colchester.

**Hampshire.**—(1.) At Dibden, in the county of Southampton, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Hythe to Marchwood as far as Dibden Church on the north, the village of Hythe on the south, Southampton Water on the east, and Claypitts-lane and farm as far as the Forest Gate at the end of Claypitts-lane on the west.

(2.) In the petty sessional division of Fareham, in the county of Southampton, comprised within the following boundaries, that is say, from the gate in Rowner-road leading into Grange-lane, along Rowner-road to the Railway Arch of the London and South-Western Railway, along the said Railway to the Railway Arch in Anns Hill-lane, along Anns Hill-lane in a southerly direction to Bury Cross, thence along Privett-road to certain land now or late of Larcom occupied by C. W. House, across such and adjoining land by an imaginary straight line to the Beerhouse known as the Fort Gomer, across Gomer-lane, thence by an imaginary line to Apple Dumpling Bridge, thence up the stream to the junction of Fitchfield and Rowner parishes, thence around Grange farm-house and farm to the north of the Long Pond into Grange-lane aforesaid, and up that lane to the entrance gate aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parishes of Milford, and Hordle, in the county of Southampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Mill stream at Efford and from thence by the road leading to Everton through the grounds of Arnewood House and Batchley farm to the Cross-roads on the west of Gordleton Mill, and from the said Cross-roads to Woodcock Corner, then to and including Downton Lodge by Hordle Church on the east to the Royal Oak at Downton, and from thence by the road leading to Hordle farm following the said road down to Westover Gate, then following the seashore to Hurst, from there up the Keyhaven river to the Keyhaven Bridge, and from thence (including Vidle Van farm) up the Mill stream to Efford Mill aforesaid.

**Hertfordshire.**—At Preston, in the county of Hertford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, King's Hill on the north, Old St. Albans highway on the east, Kiln Wood on the south, and Dead Woman's-lane on the west.

**Huntingdonshire.**—At Yaxley, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Norman Cross to Yaxley and Yaxley village-street as far as Dobbs-lane on the south, thence east by Dobbs-lane and Robert Loweth's property as far as Robert Warwick's farm premises, north Poors Allotment field to Harry Burnham's arable land on the north-west, and west occupation-road leading from William Whitehead's farm to the road from Norman Cross to Yaxley aforesaid.

**Kent.**—(1.) At Tunstall, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Siller Field on the north and west, and Ruins-road leading from Sittingbourne to Bexon on the east and south.

(2.) At Herne, near Herne Bay, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Mickleburgh Hill House along the King's road to the Railway-road on the north, thence along the Railway-road to Edington Bridge, Edington-lane, on the west, thence along

Edington-lane and Pigeon-lane to Pigeon Corner on the south, and thence along the occupation-road to Mickleburgh Hill House aforesaid on the east.

(3.) At Wrotham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London, Chatham, and Dover Railway from Ightham Court Bridge to St. Clere Bridge, the footpath from St. Clere Bridge to Lower St. Clere, the Coach-road from Lower St. Clere to the North Lodge St. Clere Park, and the Pilgrim-road at North Lodge St. Clere Park to Huxdown.

(4.) At Barfreestone, near Sandwich, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Barfreestone Court farm to Long-lane Cross-roads on the south, the road from Long-lane Cross-roads to Frogham Cross-roads on the west, the road from Frogham Cross-roads to Kittington Cross-roads on the north, and the road from Kittington Cross-roads to Round Tree Cross-roads, and thence the road to Barfreestone Court farm aforesaid on the east.

(5.) At Chatham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Clover-street leading from High-street to New-road on the north, Rhode-street leading from High-street to Richard-street on the south, High-street on the east, and Richard-street leading from Rhode-street to Clover-street on the west.

(6.) At Chatham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Luton-street on the north, certain farm buildings in the occupation of George Selves on the south, certain pasture land in the occupation of George Maycock on the east, and the road leading from Luton-street to Luton Vicarage on the west.

**Lancashire.**—(1.) So much of the township of Todmorden and Walsden, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Ramsden-road on the west, Moorland and Deanroyd Mill on the south, Deanroyd-lane, to Deanroyd farm on the south-east, Moorland on the east, and Skew Bridge (Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway) and Cricket Ground Walsden on the north.

(2.) At Chorlton-cum-Hardy, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Lovers Walk on the north, Manchester-road on the south, Wilbraham-road on the east, and Upper Chorlton-road on the west.

(3.) At Stretford, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries that is to say, Pool-lane on the east, Chapel-lane on the west, Burton-road on the north, and Chester-road on the south.

(4.) At Cliviger, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Calder on the south commencing at its source, thence along the river side to the foot of the Scout Rocks, thence in a westerly direction along the side of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway to Honey Holme-lane, along Honey Holme-lane to the Todmorden and Burnley highway at Bull's Head, thence to the north by the Higher Bank wall fence, and to the east by the Higher Helliplatt wall fence to the river Calder, and thence to the south along its side to its source.

(5.) In the counties of Lancaster and Chester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, in the township of Tintwhistle, in the county of Chester, commencing at a point at

the junction of the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road and Henshull-lane, by Henshull-lane to the Manchester and Huddersfield high-road; in the township of Mossley, in the county of Lancaster, along the Manchester and Huddersfield high-road to Dark-lane, along Dark-lane back to the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road, and thence along the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road to the starting point.

(6.) At Pennington, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bedford brook from Mill-lane to Orchard-lane on the north, Orchard-lane, Bolton-road, Kirkhall-lane, and the London and North-Western Railway on the west, Pennington brook to Pennington Mill bridge, the occupation-road through Green Fold farm to Dick Mather Bridge, and the Canal to Boardman-street End on the south, and Boardman-street, Chapel-street, and Mill-lane on the east.

(7.) So much of the township of Blatchinworth and Calderbrook, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Barn Meadows, Handle Hall, and Newgate on the north, Higher Clough, Heights farm, and Shore on the west, Shore Gardens to Featherstall on the south, and Todmorden-road and Gale on the east.

(8.) At Quarlton, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the brook running between Mr. Walker's Factory and Tottington on the north, the brook running between Edgeworth and the Red Lion Public-house Quarlton on the east, the public highway from the Red Lion Public-house Quarlton to Quarlton Vale on the south, and the brook running from Quarlton Vale to Mr. Walker's Factory on the west.

(9.) At Mossley, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Egmont-street on the north-east, Manchester-road on the south, Stanhope-street on the north, the river Tame on the east, and Scout-road on the west.

(10.) So much of the townships of Blatchinworth and Calderbrook, and Butterworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Light Howlers-road and Pyke House on the east, Featherstall, Whitelees-road, and Caldermoor on the south-west, Newbarn in Butterworth on the south, and Gale on the north.

(11.) At Euxton, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Wigan and Preston highway from Pack Saddle Bridge to Chapel brook on the east, Culbeck brook through Euxton Hall Park to Culbeck-lane and then Culbeck-lane and the highway to Flag-lane on the south, and the boundaries of the township of Euxton on the north and west.

(12.) At Aspull, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from the Finger Post to Moorgate on the north, from Moorgate along the Railway to Marsh farm on the east, from Marsh farm to Higher Gullett on the south, and along Higher Gullett to the Finger Post aforesaid on the west.

(13.) At Little Hulton, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the public highway between Cleggs-lane End and Kennion Arms on the south, the road leading from Kennion Arms to Old-lane on the west, Old-lane on the north, and Cleggs-lane on the east.

(14.) So much of the borough of Blackburn, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road known as Shear Brow, the road leading from Four-lane Ends northward through Pleckgate, the boundary of the borough between the last-mentioned road and the road known as Whalley New-road, the roads known as Whalley Range, Earle-street, and Wemberley-street.

(15.) So much of the borough of Blackburn, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Preston New-road, Revidge-lane, the road from Four-lane Ends through Pleckgate to the borough boundary, and the northerly boundary of the borough.

(16.) The township of Little Harwood, in the borough of Blackburn, in the county of Lancaster.

*Leicestershire.*—(1.) So much of the parish of Harby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Harby to Stathern on the north, the road leading from Stathern to Eastwell on the east, the road leading from Eastwell to Goathy turn on the south, and the road leading from Goathy turn to Harby on the west.

(2.) At Saxby, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Cottage Pasture (now unoccupied) on the north, the boundary fence separating Saxby from Garthorpe and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Miller and Mr. Pacey on the east, the road leading from Saxby to Garthorpe on the south, and the road leading from Saxby to Waltham on the west.

(3.) At Garthorpe, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary fence between Garthorpe and Waltham on the north, the road leading from Waltham to Garthorpe on the east, certain arable land in the occupation of Mr. Pacey on the south, and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Roe, Saxby, and the boundary fence between Garthorpe and Saxby on the west.

(4.) At Long Clawson, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the upper part of the Waltham-road and the bridle-road to Ab-Kettleby on the south, the Melton and Hickling lanes and the street in the village of Long Clawson on the west, the bridle-road between Hose and Hickling on the north, and the parish of Hose on the east.

*Lincolnshire (Holland).*—(1.) So much of the parish of Crowland, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Spalding and Crowland highway from Brother-House-Toll-Bar to the sewer one field to the south of Henry Cook's farmhouse on the east, thence the said sewer, to Cowbit Wash on the south, and thence Cowbit Wash to Brother-House-Toll-Bar aforesaid on the west and north; exclusive of the said Spalding and Crowland highway but inclusive of all intersecting roads.

(2.) In Whaplode Marsh, in the parish of Whaplode, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from the Guide Post against Robert Coupland's Cottages to Whaplode river and by a continuous and direct line over the said river and across Robert Coupland's Twenty Acre field to Godham's-lane on the west, then e Godham's-lane



to William Taylor's farm-house on the north, thence the public footpath to John Sharman's farm-house on the east, and thence the highway to the Guide Post against Robert Coupland's Cottages aforesaid on the south; exclusive of all boundary-roads but inclusive of all intersecting-roads.

*Lincolnshire (Kesteven).*—(1.) So much of the parish of Deeping St. Nicholas, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the south the Great Northern Railway from a certain arable field in the occupation of Thomas Holland to the South Drain Drove, on or towards the west from the Great Northern Railway by the South Drain Drove to Kemp's House and thence to W. Harrison's farmhouse to the Spalding and Deeping highway, on or towards the north from W. Harrison's house by the Spalding and Deeping highway to the farmstead of Thomas Holland, and on or towards the east from Thomas Holland's farmstead by certain arable fields in the occupation of G. Holland to the Great Northern Railway.

(2.) So much of the parish of Brant Broughton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Leadenham to Newark from the river Brant to the seventh mile stone from Newark on the south, thence in a direct line by the Poor Close, F. Shaw's, Southern's, and W. Sneath's arable and two grass fields, across Mill-lane, C. Williams's two grass fields, W. Ashton's grass field, and Mr. W. Everitt's western boundary to the parish boundary of Carlton-le-Moorland on the west, thence by the parish boundary of Carlton-le-Moorland and Brant Broughton to the river Brant on the north, and thence by the river Brant to the highway leading from Leadenham to Newark aforesaid on the east.

(3.) So much of the parishes of Barholm, and Langtoft, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Langtoft Fen-road from Edward Stafford's farmstead to the Cross-road on or towards the south, thence the Cross-road to William Charity's farmstead on or towards the west, thence the drain dividing the parishes of Barholm and Langtoft and Baston to the Cross drain on or towards the north, and thence the Cross drain to Edward Stafford's farmstead aforesaid on or towards the east.

(4.) So much of the parish of Brant Broughton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Broughton Mill-lane on the south, thence the Top-road leading from Beckingham to Carlton-le-Moorland on the west, thence the dividing hedge of the parishes of Brant Broughton and Carlton-le-Moorland on the north, and thence the bridle-road leading from Carlton-le-Moorland to Broughton to Broughton Mill-lane aforesaid on the east.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Heckington, and Great Hale, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north the Sleaford and Boston highway from Burton-lane End to Heckington Cemetery, thence on the east a direct line across certain fields in the occupation of Charles Little, Mrs. Mason, and Edward Rowe to the said Edward Rowe's farmhouse in Great Hale, thence to the Old Vicarage House in Great Hale aforesaid on the south, thence the road running in a southerly direction

to Woods Orchard, thence to the south-west corner of the said Edward Rowe's grass field known as Weavers field, and thence on the west a direct line across several fields of Charles Sharpe to the said Burton-lane End.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Heckington, and Great Hale, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south from Henry Thompson's farm buildings Great Hale Fen by the Beckson Bridge drain to Beckson Bridge, thence on the west by the highway leading from Little Hale to Heckington to the Great Northern Railway Station Heckington, thence on the north by the Great Northern Railway to opposite George Wood's Cottage Great Hale Fen, thence on the east by a direct line across certain fields in the occupation of F. G. Mastin and Henry Thompson to Henry Thompson's farm buildings aforesaid.

*Lincolnshire (Lindsey).*—(1.) At Gayton-le-Wold, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Lincoln turnpike-road on the north, the boundary fence between the farms in the respective occupations of R. Martin and Jabez Rigall on the south, the Heath-road on the east, and the road leading from the Lincoln turnpike-road to Gayton on the west.

(2.) At Santon, Appleby, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway running from Appleby to Frodingham on the north, a water-course on the side of Scunthorpe Common on the west, and a certain plantation on the south and east.

(3.) At Wainfleet All Saints, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary Bridge between Wainfleet All Saints and Wainfleet St. Marys highway leading to Boston on the south, the highway to Wainfleet Bank on the west, the highway leading to Firsby on the north, and the highway leading from Wainfleet to Skyness on the east.

(4.) In the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprising the whole of the land in the parish of Saxelby on the south side of the Fosdyke, and the land in the same parish on the north side of the Fosdyke bounded on the west by the road from Saxelby to Ingleby as far as Mill-lane, on the north by Mill-lane leading from Ingleby-lane to the river Till in part and the boundary line of the parish of Broxholme in other part, on the east by the parish of South Carlton, and on the south by the boundary fence on the north side of Mr. Barker's farm in the parish of Burton.

(5.) In the parish of Toynton St. Peters, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east and south by the road leading from Halton Fen Side to Toynton St. Peters, on the west by lands in the occupation of John Henry Vessey, Salisbury Bond, William Rushby, and Dan Gooby, and on the north by the south fence of the Spilsby and Firsby Railway.

*Middlesex.*—(1.) So much of the parish of Hillingdon, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the north-west Long-lane leading from the Uxbridge and London main-road to Ickenham and thence the road to Ruislip as far as the West End-road leading to Yeading and Greenford, on or towards the north-east and

south-east the West End-road leading to Yeading and Greenford to the Uxbridge and London main-road, and thence on or towards the south-west the Uxbridge and London main-road to Long-lane aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Twickenham, and Teddington, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Thames Valley line of the London and South-Western Railway from the point where the Hampton-road crosses it near Fulwell Station to its junction with the Kingston line of the London and South-Western Railway on the north, the Kingston line of Railway from its junction with the Thames Valley line to the point where the road from Teddington to New Hampton crosses the line on the east, the road leading from Teddington to New Hampton from the point where it crosses the Kingston line to its junction with the road leading from New Hampton to Twickenham on the south, and the road from New Hampton to Twickenham from its junction with the road leading from Teddington to the point where it crosses the Thames Valley line on the west.

(3.) So much of the parishes of Isleworth, and Twickenham, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Staines-road on the north, the Hanworth-road on the south, Cromwell-lane on the east, and the eastern boundary hedge of Hounslow Heath on the west.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Finchley, Hornsey, and Friern Barnet, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Summers-lane and the road leading from that lane into Colney Hatch at the point where it joins Colney Hatch-lane on the north, an imaginary line drawn from the High-road Finchley by Melrose Cottage along the southern boundary of the Islington and

St. Pancras Cemeteries, then along the northern boundary of Coldfall Wood, and then from the north-east corner of that Wood along the hedge into Tatterdown-lane at a point just north of Coppett farm on the south, Tatterdown-lane from the point just above Coppett farm to the junction of that lane with Colney Hatch-lane, and then Colney Hatch-lane to the point where it joins the road leading to Summers-lane on the east, and the High-road Finchley from Summers-lane to Melrose Cottage on the west.

(5.) So much of the parish of Teddington, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, High-street Teddington from the Railway Bridge to the point where it joins the Kingston-road near St. Mary's Church on the north, the Kingston-road from High-street Teddington to Bushey Park-road on the east or north-east, Bushey Park-road from the point where it joins the Kingston-road to the Kingston line of the London and South-Western Railway on the south or south-east, and the Kingston line of Railway on the west or south-west.

*Norfolk.*—An Area comprising so much of the parish of Stoke Holy Cross, in the county of Norfolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Shottesham-road (by fields) on the east, Stoke Park and the boundary fence separating Mr. Whittaker's and Mr. Pitt's farms on the west, Stoke-lane on the north, and the road running through Mr. Seago's occupation and Stoke Park on the south.

(4.) In the county of Oxford, comprising the parish of Rotherfield Peppard, and also the

parish of Rotherfield Grays except so much as lies to the east of the main-road leading from Henley to Reading; the said main-road not being included in the Area.

*Staffordshire.*—(1.) The township of Fazeley, in the county of Stafford, except the liberties of Dunstall and Bangley.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Wombourne, Enville, and Bobbington, in the county of Stafford, as lies between the main-road from Dudley to Bridgnorth and the highway from Green's Forge direct to Halfpenny Green.

(3.) So much of the parish of Wombourne, and of the township of Lower Penn, in the county of Stafford, as is bounded by the highway from The Bratch to the Woodhouse, the main-road from Wombourne to Wolverhampton, the highway from Upper Penn through the village of Lower Penn to Dimingsdale, and the Staffordshire and Worcestershire Canal.

(4.) So much of the parish of Coisall, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the western side of the highway direct from the northern corner of Wrottesley Park to the cross-roads at Gunston.

*Suffolk.*—(1.) At Badingham, in the county of Suffolk, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain roads leading from Cransford Church eastward to Colston Hall, northward to the White House, and westward to Mrs. Stanford's crossways on the Framlingham-road, and thence by the road leading to Cransford Church aforesaid.

(2.) At Tannington, in the county of Suffolk, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Bedfield Dog-lane to Tannington Lodge on the east, thence northward to Tannington Horse Shoes Inn and the Wash-road and Tannington Church, thence westward by Bedfield-lane to Stearn's Buildings, thence by the foot-path direct to Bedfield Dog-lane aforesaid on the south.

(3.) At Ashfield-with-Thorpe, in the county of Suffolk, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the lane in the parish of Ashfield known as Waddle Goose-lane leading from Ashfield village to Debenham on the west, a certain lane and occupation-road leading from Waddle Goose-lane to Kenton Lodge on the north, the road from Kenton Lodge in the parish of Mouk Soham to Clow's Corner on the north and east, and thence the road leading direct to Ashfield village aforesaid on the east and south.

(4.) At Groton, in the county of Suffolk, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Lindsey to Kersey on the north, the road from Kersey to Hadleigh hamlet on the east, the road from Hadleigh

hamlet to Groton on the south, and the road from Groton to Lindsey on the west.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Benacre, and Wrentham, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the high-road leading from Wrentham to Kessingland on the north, the high-road from Wrentham to the sea shore on the west, and the high-road running from Kessingland-road south-west to the sea shore.

(6.) So much of the parish of Mettingham, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the high-road from Bungay to Beccles on the north, the high-road from Cross-Ways Bungay-road to Mettingham Castle on the west, Beach-lane from Bungay-road to Ilkeshall St. Johns on the east, and the high-road from Mettingham Castle to Ilkeshall St. Johns on the south.

(7.) So much of the parish of Spexhall, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the high-road from Spexhall to Rumburgh on the west, the high-road from Rumburgh to Saint Lawrence on the north, the high-road from Spexhall Church to the old turnpike-road from Halesworth to Bungay on the south, and certain arable and pasture land running up to the turnpike-road from Halesworth to Saint Lawrence and Bungay on the east.

*Surrey.*—(1.) So much of the petty sessional division of Croydon, in the county of Surrey, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London-road commencing at Norbury Station as far as New-road leading to Mitcham Common on the east, New-road leading to Mitcham Common on the south, Mitcham Common on the west, and an imaginary line across certain fields in various occupations from the northern corner of Mitcham Common to Norbury Station aforesaid on the north.

(2.) At Croydon, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Mr. King's premises on the north, Mr. Watney's premises on the south, Bramley Hill-road on the east, and Mr. Rowland's fields and Violet-lane on the west.

At Windlesham, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Ascot and Woking branch of the London and South-Western Railway on the west, the Guildford-road on the north and east, and the Common boundary from Hammonds Plantation to the Ascot and Woking branch of the London and South-Western Railway on the south.

At Dorking, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bradley-lane leading from Bradley farm to the river Mole on the north, the river Mole to Castle Mill on the east, the Reigate-road from Castle Mill to Cotmandene on the south, and an imaginary line across the Lordships and certain other fields in various occupations from Cotmandene to Bradley farm on the west.

(5.) At Horley, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Kennersley Lodge on the Reigate and Crawley-road, thence the public footpath to Woolvers farm on the Reigate and Charlwood-road, thence the Reigate and Charlwood-road by Horse Hill to Hookwood Common cross-roads, and thence the Reigate and Crawley-road to Kennersley Lodge aforesaid.

(6.) At Betchworth, in the county of Surrey,

comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Reigate to Dorking on the east, an occupation-road belonging to the Brockham Brick and Tile Company from the Reigate and Dorking-road to the South-Eastern Railway on the south, the South-Eastern Railway to Buckland Crossing on the west, and from Buckland Crossing to Buckland Church on the Reigate and Dorking-road on the north.

*Sussex.*—(1.) At Trotton, in the county of Sussex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Iping Crossways to Fitzball and Bridgeland, thence along a footpath to a cottage near in the occupation of Owen Stephens, gamekeeper, into a lane leading towards Goldring's farm, down the said lane to a footpath leading into the public-road near Dumpford farm, thence along the said road into Dumpford-lane, along the said lane into a lane leading to Terwick Mill, thence across the river Rother by a bridge and public footpath and lane into the Midhurst and Petersfield dis-turpiked-road near the foot of Croczer Hill, thence along the said road into Gatehouse-lane, and along the said lane into a lane leading to Hammer Pond, along the said lane to a point near Hammer Pond, thence along a public footpath over the head of Hammer Pond into Iping-lane, and thence along the said lane past Iping Church and Iping Paper Mills to Iping Crossways aforesaid.

At Polegate, in the county of Sussex, comprising all the lands and roadways lying within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the east side of the high-road leading from the Old Toll Gate in Polegate to Tutt's Green in the parish of Willingdon, thence by the north side of the East Wish-lane to the Westham-road at Pollyarch, thence by the north side of the Westham-road to Shepham-lane in the parish of Westham, thence by the west side of the said Shepham-lane to the boundary of Otham farm in the said parish of Westham, and thence by the boundary of the said farm to Otham-lane in the said parish, thence by the south side of Otham-lane to the cottages at Sayerland farm in the parish of Hailsham, thence to the Hailsham and Polegate-road at Cophall in the parish of Hailsham, thence by the east side of the Hailsham and Polegate-road to Swine's Hill, and all the lands lying on the west side of the highway leading from Swine's Hill to the boundary post of the parishes of Hailsham and Folkington on the Lewes and Eastbourne-road.

(3.) In the parish of Westham, in the county of Sussex, comprising all the lands and highways lying within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the south-west side of Mullens Pound Bridge on the high-road leading from Glenleigh to Handcombe-street, thence by the sewer leading to Rickney Bridge, thence on the west side of the Haven to Shooters Bridge, from thence on the north side of the marsh in a direct line to the Twenty Acre field in the occupation of Luther Martin, thence in a direct line to Handcomb Hall, thence on the east side of the highway leading from Handcomb Hall to Willoughby's-lane, thence by the north side of the said Willoughby's-lane to the sewer on Priesthawes farm, and all the lands lying on the east side of the said sewer leading back to Mullens Pound Bridge.

(4.) All those parts of the parishes of Rumboldswyke, and Northmundham, in the county of Sussex, lying between the London, Brighton, and South Coast Railway from the



Level Crossing at Wickham to the Bognor Railway Bridge, thence along the south side of the Upper-road leading from Chichester to Bognor as far as the turning to Merston village on the north and north-east, the road leading from such last-mentioned road through Merston as far as the Chichester and Portsmouth Canal (disused) on the west, and from the Merston-road along the line of such Canal as far as the road leading from Mundham through Rumboldswyke to Chichester on the south, and such last-mentioned road from the Canal to the Level Crossing aforesaid on the west; that portion of the road leading from the Walnut Tree Inn to North Mundham which is situate north of the Canal not being included in the Area.

(5.) All those parts of the parishes of West-hampnett, Boxgrove, Tangmere, and Oving, in the county of Sussex, lying between the road leading from Woodcote in a direct line to the Halnaker-road and thence by a Green-lane to Boxgrove-village on the north, from Boxgrove village south through Tangmere to the Aldingbourne-road on the east, the Aldingbourne-road from the Tangmere turning to Shopwyke on the south, and the road leading from Shopwyke to Woodcote aforesaid on the west.

*Warwickshire.*—(1.) At Fletchampstead, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Tile Hill-lane on the north, certain land of James Harris on the east, Tenshilling and Park Woods and certain land in the occupation of William Campbell and Robert Cartwright on the south, and Tile Hill-road and Railway Station on the west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Curdworth, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Tamworth and Birmingham turnpike-road on the north, the lane known as Farthing-lane leading into the village of Curdworth on the east, the foot-road leading from Curdworth to Water Orton on the south, and a straight line from the said foot-road to Curdworth Parish New School on the west; so much of the Tamworth and Birmingham turnpike-road as forms the boundary of the Area being included in the Area.

(3.) At Grendon, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Watling Street-road from the corner of Upper Whittington-lane to the corner of Lower Whittington-lane, Lower Whittington-lane to the Merevale Crossing on the London and North-Western Railway, the London and North-Western Railway to the Baddesley Crossing, and thence Upper Whittington-lane to the Watling Street-road.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Middleton, Kingsbury, Lea Marston, and Moxhall, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from Hunt Green by the Park-lane, the boundary of Middleton Park, to the Bottom (Canal) Lock, and thence by Broomy Crofts farm to the river Tame, on the east by the river Tame to Lea Marston, on the south by Dark-lane to the Birmingham-road, and thence by the Lichfield-road to Red Cap farm, and on the west by Hell End-lane to Hunt Green.

(5.) At Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Barley Mow Inn by the road leading past Mere Pool Church to Shepherds Pool on the north, Whitehouse-lane to Whitehouse Bar on the east, Tamworth-lane to the Birmingham-road on the south, and

the Birmingham and Lichfield turnpike-road to the Barley Mow Inn aforesaid on the west.

(6.) At Brandon, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Brandon to Bretford from Side-Hill Spinny to Bretford village, thence the road leading from Bretford to Wolston to where it is crossed by the London and North-Western Railway, thence the London and North-Western Railway to where it adjoins the river Avon, and thence the river Avon to Side-Hill Spinny aforesaid.

(7.) At Allesley, near Coventry, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry and Birmingham-road from the corner of Mellicent Wood to Peckford-lane, thence by Peckford-lane to the wheelwright's shop at Eastern Green, thence by the occupation-lane leading to Shirley Wood, and thence by Shirley Wood and Mellicent Wood to the corner of Mellicent Wood aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the borough of Coventry, and of the parish of Stoke, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry Canal from Stoney Stanton-road to the Bridge at Stoke Heath, thence by the boundary fence of Stoke Heath to the lane leading from Barras Green to Upper Stoke, thence by the lane last-mentioned to Bray's-lane, thence by Bray's-lane to its junction with the Lutterworth-road, thence by the Lutterworth-road to Far Gosford-street, thence by Far Gosford-street to Lower Ford-street, thence by Lower Ford-street to Cox-street, thence by Cox-street and Swanswell-street to Stoney Stanton-road, and thence by Stoney Stanton-road to the Coventry Canal aforesaid.

*Worcestershire.*—(1.) At Northfield, in the county of Worcester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Bristol-road from the blacksmith's shop Cock-lane to Tessel-lane on the east, thence up Tessel-lane to Cock-lane on the south, thence across Cock-lane up Frog Mill-lane to Frog Mill in the parish of Frankley on the west, thence from Frog Mill in a direct line to (and including) Gin-House farm in the parish of Northfield on the north, and thence from Gin-House farm in a direct line by the back of the Bell Inn Northfield to the blacksmith's shop end of Cock-lane.

(2.) So much of the parish of Northfield, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland Railway on the east from the end of South-road, Bristol-road, to Tessel-lane, from the Midland Railway to (and including) Bumbery farm, thence Old Middleton Hall-road to Belmont House, Bristol-road, and thence by Ivy Cottage, Upper Shendley fields, to Gin House farm.

(3.) So much of the parish of Tardebigg, in the county of Worcester, as is comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, from Hill Top farm to the Bromsgrove and Alcester-road, thence along the said road to the Fox and Goose Inn, thence to the top of Workhouse-lane, thence to the Watercourse leading to Norgrove, and thence along Creese Field-lane to Hill Top.

*Yorkshire (East Riding).*—(1.) At Eastington, in the East Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hull and Selby-road from Newport Bridge to Wallingfen

Mill on the south, Mill-lane from Wallingfen Mill to Henry Brabbs's farmstead on the west, Sandholme-lane from Henry Brabbs's farmstead to Sandholme Landing on the north, and the Market Weighton Canal from Sandholme Landing to Newport Bridge on the east.

(2.) At Great Driffeld, in the East Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, North-street on the north, Bridge-street and Church-lane on the south, Eastgate North on the east, and part of Church-lane and Westgate on the west.

(3.) At Sherburn, in the East Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Sherburn Church to the High Mill by the East Beck stream on the east, a quickwood fence known as Greets fence on the south, the White Gate-road and a quickwood fence the boundary of Richard Duggleby's land on the west, and the East Beck stream to Sherburn Church aforesaid on the north.

(4.) So much of the parish of Escrick, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Holby Carr Wood in Lord Wenlock's Park and by a private-road leading through the Park on the west, the boundary fence of the Park to the Escrick and Skipwith highroad and thence the bridle-road known as Dog Kennel-lane leading to Cottingwith as far as Pallion drain on the north, the boundary of Pallion drain on the east, and the boundary of Pallion drain to Skipwith Bridge on the Skipwith and Escrick highroad and thence the Pallion drain to Holby Carr Wood aforesaid on the south.

(5.) At Elloughton, in the East Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Elloughton-street on the west, the Elloughton and Welton low-road to the quickwood fence between Mr. Blyth's and Mr. George Wilson's land on the south, the quickwood fence between Mr. Blyth's and Mr. George Wilson's land to the highroad leading from Elloughton to Welton on the east, and the Elloughton and Welton highroad on the north.

(6.) At Sancton, in the East Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, a certain quickwood fence on the north dividing Arras from Hesselskew and extending from Arras Scroggs to Arras Fox Cover, a certain quickwood fence on the west extending from Arras Fox Cover to Hesselskew Whin Cover dividing lands of Joseph Stephenson and Joseph Galloway of Sancton from Hesselskew, a certain quickwood fence on the south extending from Hesselskew Whin Cover up to a point where the fence divides the land of Newbald Lodge and Hesselskew, and a certain quickwood fence on the east belonging to John Lee of Gardam extending from the point where the fence divides the land of Newbald Lodge and Hesselskew to Arras Scroggs.

(7.) So much of the parish of Stillingfleet, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at John Simpson's farmstead on the Stillingfleet and Cawood highway to a certain quickwood fence through lands in the occupation of George Daniel and John Dods-worth to Winney-lane on the west, Winney-lane from George Daniel's and John Dods-

worth's land on the south from a certain quickwood fence from Winney-lane through lands in the occupation of William Aconley and across the Stillingfleet and Escrick highway to the boundary of Stillingfleet Gravel Pit to Stillingfleet Beck on the east, and Stillingfleet Beck from the Gravel Pit on the north across the Green to a certain quickwood fence to John Simpson's farmstead aforesaid.

(8.) At Skelton, in the East Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, a certain quickwood fence on the east dividing Sand Hall Low farm and Saltmarshe, extending along a certain quickwood fence dividing Sand Hall Park and Sand Hall farm from the river Ouse on the south to the said river Ouse on the north, and continued along such river to the quickwood fence on the east.

*Yorkshire (North Riding).*—(1.) At Asenby, in the North Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Swale from Robinson's Fog Ings to Gills Garth at Asenby village on the east, the Asenby and Dishforth highway from Gills Garth to Dishforth-poor-field in the occupation of Mary Shipley on the north, a quickwood fence from Dishforth-poor-field to Harom Grange and Fleetham Beck to Fleetham Wood on the west, the Dishforth and Cundall highway from Fleetham Wood to the Asenby and Cundall-road, a private-road to Lecky Palace, and a quickwood fence to the river Swale at the Fog Ings on the south.

(2.) At Snape, in the North Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Mile House to Thornton Watlass Lime Kiln in a south-westerly direction as far as the highway leading from Thornton Watlass to Snape, thence following the last-mentioned highway south-eastwards to the foot of Skell Bank, and thence northwards to Mile House aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the township of Well, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the point on the high-road leading from Well to Bedale on the north where the township boundary crosses the said road, following the said boundary line to the high-road leading from Well to Masham on the west, thence the high-road leading to West Tanfield, to Nosterfield, from Nosterfield the footpath to Well as far as the bridle-road from Well to Langwith, thence the bridle-road north-eastwards to the said township boundary, and thence following the said township boundary north-eastwards to the point aforesaid.

(4.) So much of the township of Leberston, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east Lingholme-lane commencing at Leberston-lane End to the North-Eastern Railway Gates, on the south the North-Eastern Railway to the boundary of Leberston township, on the west a certain quickwood boundary fence up a grassfield known as the Beck Style field in the occupation of John Davison to the Leberston and Cayton-road, and on the north the Leberston and Cayton-road to Leberston-lane End.

(5.) All that part of the borough of Scarborough, in the North Riding of the county of York, enclosed within a line drawn from the German Ocean along the borough boundary to Olivers Mount, thence along Olivers Mount,

Weaponness-lane, and Filey-road to Prince of Wales-terrace, and thence (eastwards) along Prince of Wales-terrace and the South Incline Tramway to the German Ocean.

(6.) So much of the township of Hawes, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies to the east and south-east of Burterset on the south side of the road leading from Bainbridge to Hawes and commencing at the township boundary on the south side of the said last-mentioned road and continuing along the south side of the said road through Hawes to the point where it branches off to Widdale and continuing along the Widdale-road to the West Cam Old-road End, from thence up the West Cam-road to the Bands-road End, from thence down the Bands-road to the village of Gayle, across the Gayle Beck, and along the footpath leading to Marcett to a point where it joins the township of Bainbridge on the south.

(7.) At High Abbotside, in the North Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at the Bridge crossing the brooklet in the village of Hardrow, continuing southward along the said brooklet to the river Yore, thence westward up the river Yore to a stone fence on the east of Collierholme farm, thence northward along the said stone fence to the Hawes and Sedbergh turnpike-road to Cotterdale-road End, thence up the Cotterdale-road to Cotter Riggs, thence along a stone fence to Cotter brooklet, from there along the boundary fence of Pry House farm to the West Pit Coal-road on the west, and continuing along the last-named road to the said Bridge in Hardrow village.

(8.) At Bainbridge, in the North Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing where the river Bain flows into the river Yore and continuing up the river Yore in a westerly direction to the township boundary dividing Bainbridge from Hawes township, thence along the township boundary in a southerly direction to where it joins the Cam-road, continuing down the Cam-road in an easterly direction to the end of the last-named road, thence following a brooklet through the Holme Pasture forming part of Gill-Edge farm in the occupation of Edward Brown to the river Bain on the south, and thence following the river Bain to the point where it flows into the river Yore.

(9.) At Marton, in the North Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south the Ormsby and Stockton-road, on the east a fence on the east side of three fields in the occupation of Eliza and Charles Robinson called Ladgate Northlands and Far Leas, on the north by a fence on the north side of three fields in the occupation of the said Eliza and Charles Robinson called Far Leas, Sand-house, and Silvex, and on the west the Slip Inn and Newham Beck.

(10.) So much of the parishes of Sheriff Hutton, and Strensall, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from Suet Carr-lane by Mr. Wainwright's cart-road and a quickwood fence on the north side of his Forty Acres Wheat field and Thirty Acres Turn'p field to Woods drain and Woods drain to Anchor Beck, on the east by Anchor Beck to William Wilson's boundary fence, on the south by William Wilson's boundary fence to Buckton's Wood, Buckton's Wood and boundary fence to Buckton's-lane, and on the west

Buckton's-lane to Sheriff Hutton and Strensall-road and Suet Carr-lane to Mr. Wainwright's cart-road.

*Yorkshire (West Riding).*—(1.) At Crofton, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Wakefield and Pontefract-road from the Cock and Crown Inn at Crofton to West-lane on the north, West-lane, Castle-fence, and Spring-lane to Santingley-lane on the east, and the highway from Spring-lane through Crofton village and Cock-lane to the junction of the roads at the Cock and Crown Inn at Crofton aforesaid on the south and west.

(2.) So much of the township of Studley Roger, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary wall of Studley Park from the Park Lodge to Minns Cave and thence an imaginary line to the river Skell on the west, the river Skell as far as the foot-bridge at Hell Wath and thence the Baron Way as far as the fence running westward to Skellbeck on the south and east, and the said fence and Skellbeck to the Park Lodge aforesaid on the north.

(3.) At Ossett-cum-Gawthorpe, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at the eastern boundary of Ossett township on the Wakefield and Halifax turnpike-road, following the said boundary in a northerly direction to New Park-lane, Low Lathes, and the footpath to Hollins Quarry, thence by a footpath to Lodge Hill and Town End to Nelly's Well, thence by a stream of water to Whitley Spring Beck and by a direct line from thence to the boundary of Ossett township on the Wakefield and Halifax turnpike-road.

(4.) In the township of Burley, in the borough of Leeds, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing in Burley-road at the point where the said road is crossed by the Burley Beck, thence proceeding along Burley-road aforesaid in an eastwardly direction to a point where the said road is crossed by the North-Eastern Railway, thence proceeding in a northwardly direction along the said Railway to a point where the said Railway is crossed by Cardigan-lane, and from thence along the east side of Burley Beck to a point where it crosses Burley-road aforesaid.

(5.) At Colton, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Mrs. Kilby's house in the village of Colton and running east to Mr. Wilstrop's house in that village, thence northward by the boundary known as the Lazenby and Kilby's fence, thence westward by the said boundary to Stokers Garth, thence southward by the fence of the said Garth to Mrs. Kilby's house aforesaid.

(6.) At Blaxton, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the River Torne on the north, the Gravel drain on the south, certain land in the occupation of George Terry on the west, and the highway leading from Finningley to Wroot on the east.

(7.) At Notton, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Barnsley and Wakefield-road on the west, across the fields from the Barnsley and Wakefield-road in a line

with the fence on the top of Tanpit Croft and Hill Side fields to George Shaw's farm on the south, Notton-road to Joseph Shillito's farm on the east, and thence a certain fence across Saw Mill-lane to Joseph Parker's farm; and thence across certain fields by Woolley Dam to the Barnsley and Wakefield-road on the north.

(8.) So much of the parish of Whitkirk, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the wall alongside the Leeds and York-road commencing at the Sissing field and ending at Killingbeck Lodge gate on the south, thence by way of the private carriage drive through Killingbeck Park to Foundry Bridge and the Beck bounding the borough of Leeds to Bleech-grounds on the west, thence by the footpath to Seacroft and Iron Hills top and the fence at the bottom of Chapel field on the north, and thence by the fence at the bottom of Seacroft Park and by way of Long Walk to Sissing field on the east.

(9.) At Selby, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Olive Bush farm, Hill fields, Holme Dyke, and the river Ouse to Selby Lock on the north, the Canal to Stone Bridge on the east, from Stone Bridge in a line to Longmans Hills and Green-lane on the south, and from Green-lane to Scaber Houses, and Cross Hills to Olive Bush farm aforesaid on the west.

(10.) So much of the parish of Thorne, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway on the north, the Doncaster and Thorne highway on the east, Tudworth and Gibbon-lane and the Bank connecting that lane and Bailey-lane on the south, and Bailey-lane on the west.

(11.) So much of the township of Marsden-in-Almondbury, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Car Clough on the south, thence by Pule Hill on the west, to High Gate with Netherley and Side Ing on the east, to High Gate Clough on the north, and thence to Car Clough aforesaid.

(12.) At Austwick, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Settle highway from Harden Bridge to Moss-lane on the north, Moss-lane, Austwick Moss, Dyke House to Eldreth School, on the east, Eldreth-road to Lane Side on the south, and Fornerber Brow, Waters Bridge, Kettlesbeck, Austwick Beck Bottom, and Austwick Beck to Harden Bridge aforesaid on the west.

(13.) At Bickerton, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Cowthorpe-lane End in the township of Bickerton and running east by the York and Wetherby-road to Bickerton Old Bar, thence northward by Rudgate to Minster Hagg, thence westward to Cowthorpe-lane and continuing to Cowthorpe-lane End aforesaid.

(14.) The whole of the township of Bickerton, in the West Riding of the county of York, except the farm buildings at Bickerton Grange and all the land lying west thereof in the occupation of Dixon Battye, and the farm buildings situate in that part of the township known as Mossy Carr, and all the land in the said township lying westward of Mossy Carr.

(15.) At Appletun Roebuck, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within

the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Philip Rudding and running thence in an easterly direction by Milners Twenty Acre fence in the township of Copmanthorpe, and crossing the main drain to Mr. Poad's fence in the township of Acaster Malvis, up to Acaster-lane, and crossing the said lane to Brockett Hagg, thence in a south-westerly direction to Brockett Wood, and crossing the main drain and running in a north-westerly direction to Woolas-lane in the township of Appletun Roebuck, and thence in a north-easterly direction by the boundary fence to Philip Rudding aforesaid.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

THE following Areas are now *Areas Infected with Swine-Fever* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those Areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of swine through those Areas, without untrucking):—

*Lanarkshire.*—In the parishes of Shettleston, and Old Monkland, in the county of Lanark, included within a line drawn from a point on the Glasgow and Shotts turnpike-road at Tollcross where it is joined by the Easterhill-road, south-westward along the last-mentioned road to the London-road (Glasgow and Shotts turnpike) near to Easterhill Lodge, thence eastward along the last-mentioned road till it is joined by the Carmyle Avenue-road, thence northward along the last-mentioned road to the turnpike-road first above-mentioned, thence westward along the last-mentioned road till it is joined by the Springfield-road, thence northward along the last-mentioned road to the Tollcross Burn at Springfield Bridge, thence westward along the said Burn till it is crossed by the Wellshot-road, thence southward along the last-mentioned road till it joins the turnpike-road first above-mentioned, and thence eastward along the said turnpike-road first above-mentioned to the point first above-mentioned.

*Warwickshire.*—(1.) In the borough of Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Vauxhall-road on the north, Northumberland-street on the east, Saint James's-place on the west, and Viaduct-street on the south.

(2.) At Tiddington, in the parish of Alveston, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, this is to say, on the north by a public highway leading from Stratford-on-Avon through the village of Tiddington to Wellesbourne, on the south by another public highway leading from Stratford-on-Avon to the village of Loxley, on the west by another public highway leading out of the said first-mentioned highway (at a point at the said village of Tiddington adjoining to the residence of Thomas Thompson Knight) into the said highway from Stratford-on-Avon to Loxley near to Alveston Hill farm in the said parish of Alveston occupied by William Gibbs, and on the eastward by another public highway leading out of the said first-mentioned highway (at a point in such said road in the said parish of Alveston near to the two mile stone) into the said highway from Stratford-on-Avon to Loxley near to a farm at Alveston Hill aforesaid occupied by Elias John Webb.

*Wiltshire.*—The petty sessional divisions of Calne, Chippenham, and Malmesbury, in the county of Wilts.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Conservators of the River Thames, having taken into consideration the objections and representations which have been made to them respecting the proposed Bye-Laws for the protection, preservation, and regulation of the Fisheries in the River Thames from Cricklade, in the county of Wilts, to Yantlet, in the county of Kent, published in the London Gazette of the 11th July, 1882, and in the Times of the 12th and the 19th July, 1882, have made alterations in and addition to the said bye-laws, and as so altered and added to the said bye-laws will now stand as follows:—

1. All or so many and such part or parts of the rules, ordinances, and bye-laws, as are, or is hereinafter mentioned, viz:—

The rules and ordinances made in pursuance of the Act of the 30th George II., by the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of London, on the 4th day of October, 1785, and duly approved and confirmed on the 22nd and 24th days of the same month, and by the Conservators of the River Thames, in pursuance of the same Act, on the

23rd day of January, 1860, and duly approved and confirmed on the 28th day of the same month.

The rules and bye-laws made by the Conservators of the River Thames on the 14th day of June, 1869, and duly allowed by Her Majesty in Council, on the 11th day of November following.

The rules and bye-laws made by the said Conservators on the 7th day of July, 1873, and duly allowed by Her Majesty in Council, on the 30th day of September following.

The rules and bye-laws made by the said Conservators, and duly allowed by Her Majesty in Council, on the 28th day of October, 1879. And all other (if any) the rules, ordinances, and bye-laws hereafter made by the Conservators of the River Thames, which are now in force for protecting, preserving, or regulating the fisheries of the River Thames, shall, after these present bye-laws shall have been allowed by Her Majesty the Queen in Council, be and the same are hereby repealed.

2. These bye-laws may be cited as the Thames Fishery Bye-Laws, 1883.

3. These bye-laws shall come into operation the day after the same are allowed by Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

4. These bye-laws extend and apply to the River Thames and Isis, hereinafter called the River Thames, from Cricklade, in the county of Wilts, to Yantlet Creek, in the county of Kent, save and except where the application thereof is hereby expressly limited to any particular part of the said river, or to any particular and specified class of fish, and to that extent only.

5. In these bye-laws, unless there is something inconsistent in the context, the words and expressions hereinafter mentioned shall have respectively the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—

“Person” shall include any body of persons, corporate or incorporate.

“Court” shall mean two or more justices assembled in petty sessions, or a stipendiary magistrate.

“Fishery” shall include oyster and shell-fisheries, and the term

“Fish” shall include oysters and shell-fish, and also the spawn, brood, or, fry of fish, oysters, and shell-fish.

“Vessel” shall mean any ship, lighter, keel, barge, boat, punt, wherry, raft, or craft, or any other kind of vessel whatever, whether navigated by steam or otherwise.

6. Subject to the reservation of rights in these bye-laws contained, every net or engine, or apparatus for taking or attempting to take fish, which is not expressly authorised by these bye-laws, shall be deemed to be a prohibited net or engine or apparatus within the same, and the following nets or engines shall be deemed to be nets or engines authorised to be used within the limits undermentioned:—

(1) For pike, jack, perch, roach, dace, chub, and barbel—A flew or stream net of a mesh not less than three inches throughout when wet, and not more than sixteen fathoms long. To be used only in the river below Richmond Bridge.

(2) For flounders and soles—A net of a mesh not less than two and a half inches throughout when wet, and not more than sixteen fathoms long. To be used only in the river below Richmond Bridge.

(3) For roach and dace—A single blay net of a mesh not less than two inches and a quarter when wet, and not more than thirteen fathoms long; to fleet with the stream with a boat and

buoy attached to it. To be used only in the river below Richmond Bridge.

(4) For eels—Grig weels, to be used for eels only in the river below the City Stone at Staines.

(5) For smelts.—A net of not less than one inch and a quarter in the mesh when wet, and not more than sixteen fathoms long, except in the middle of the net where a space of six fathoms long shall be one inch in the mesh when wet: to be worked by fleeting with the stream, with a boat and buoy attached to it. To be used only in the river below Richmond Bridge.

(6) For shrimps.—A trawl net of a mesh not less than one inch, when wet, except near the cod end, wherever that may be, but not smaller than half an inch mesh when wet, to be used only in the river between Greenhithe and Yantlet Creek; or a trim-trawl net, with a mesh of not less than half an inch when wet, and a weighted beam of 21 feet in length. To be used only in the river below Richmond Bridge.

(7) For sprats.—A stow-boat net not less than one inch in the mesh when wet. To be used only in the river below Richmond Bridge.

(8) For whitebait.—A stow-boat net not less than half an inch in the mesh when wet. To be used only in the river below Richmond Bridge.

(9) For minnows.—For general use.—A round drop minnow net not exceeding three feet in diameter which may be used in all parts of the river.

(10) A small landing net for securing fish taken in angling, which may be used in all parts of the river.

(11) A hand or well net, to be used for removing fish from the well of a boat, or for carrying or preserving fish after capture, which may be used in all parts of the river.

(12) A casting or bait net, not exceeding 30 feet in circumference, to be used only in obtaining bait to be employed in angling, the sack or purse thereof not being more than 6 inches in depth when extended to the utmost, which may be used in all parts of the river.

7. No fish of the species hereinafter mentioned shall be taken in or out of the River Thames, or having been taken, shall be had in possession, or exposed for sale on the River Thames, or on the shore thereof, or on any lands adjoining or near to the river, of less than the respective sizes and dimensions following:—(This section is not intended to apply to any person who takes such fish accidentally, and forthwith returns the same to the water with the least possible injury, or to any person who takes roach or dace when angling with rod and line).

8. The times and seasons for fishing in the River Thames, and for taking the following fish therein, and the Close, or Fence Seasons, when such fish shall not be fished for or taken therein, are as follows:—

Pike or jack, perch, roach, dace, chub, rudd, barbel, carp, tench, bream, grayling, gudgeon, pope, crayfish, bleak, minnow and every other kind of fish known as fresh-water fish, except as aforesaid	From the 16th of June to the 14th of March following, both days inclusive	From the 15th March in each year to the 15th June following, both days inclusive.
Flounders, place, soles, and dabs, whittings, shrimps	May be taken all the year.	
Smelts .. .. .	From the 26th July to the 24th March following, inclusive.	From the 25th March to the 25th July following, both days inclusive.
Lamprens .. .. .	From the 24th August to the 31st March following.	From the 1st April to the 23rd August following, both days inclusive.

Nothing in this section shall apply to any person who shall during the period between the 1st day of April and the 10th day of September, both days inclusive, take, or attempt to take bleak, minnows, or gudgeon for use as bait for trout.

9. The places hereinafter mentioned are the preserves staked and marked by the Conservators for the preservation of the fishery, and no person shall take up or remove any stake, burr, boat, punt, or any other thing placed for the purpose of impeding fishing, or wilfully disturb the said preserves or spawning beds in any way, and no person shall fish or attempt to take fish in any of the said places, except by angling with rod and line:—

Richmond.—From Richmond Bridge to the Duke of Buccleuch's grounds—a distance of 700 yards in length, or thereabouts.

Twickenham.—From the upper end of the Lawn at Pope's Villa to the Island, being 400 yards in length.

Kingston.—From Mr. Park's lawn at Teddington through the backwater (the Crowlock) up to the Lower Malthouse at Hampton Wick, being 1,960 yards in length.

Thames Ditton.—From Lord Henry Fitzgerald's—Eastward, 512 yards in length.

Hampton.—From Mousley Lock to Garrick's Lawn, Hampton, being 1,514 yards in length, or thereabouts.

Sunbury.—From Sunbury Weir—688 yards in length, to the Eastward.

Walton.—Walton Sale—250 yards in length.

Shepperton.—Upper Deep—240 yards Eastward of Creek rails.

Lower Deep—200 yards Eastward of the Public Drain.

Weybridge.—From Shepperton Lock round the course of the River to the Weir—830 yards in length.

Chertsey.—From the Weir to 80 yards below the Bridge, being 445 yards in length.

Penton Hook.—From the Weir round the Island and up to the Lock at Penton Hook, being 1,150 yards in length.

Staines.—From the City Stone to a point 210 yards below the Road bridge at Staines.

10.—No person shall do, aid, or assist in doing the following things, or any of them, that is to say:—

- (a.) Fish with, use, trawl, lay or set a prohibited net or engine, or apparatus.
- (b.) Have in his possession while on the river or on the shore thereof, or on any lands adjoining or near to the river, a prohibited net or engine unless he shows to the satisfaction of the Justices before whom he is charged, that he had not the same in his possession with intent at the time of such possession to fish with, use, trawl, lay, or set the same in the river.
- (c.) Fish for or take, or attempt to take any fish by using, baited or unbaited hooks, or wire or snare, or any other engine for the purpose of foul hooking, commonly called snatching or snaring.
- (d.) Fish from any vessel, boat, or punt, for or take, or attempt to take above Richmond Bridge any fish except in the day time, that is to say between the beginning of the last hour before sunrise, and the end of the first hour after sunset.
- (e.) Fish for or take, or attempt to take any fish within the fence season for the same.
- (f.) Buy, sell, or expose for sale or have in his possession any fish that has been caught or taken within the fence season for the same, in the River Thames.
- (g.) Take or attempt to take, or disturb any fish when spawning.
- (h.) Take, destroy, or spoil any spawn, fry or brood of fish or spat of oysters.
- (i.) Use more than two rods at any one and the same time for angling.
- (j.) Use eel spears commonly so called for the purpose of taking fish.
- (k.) Attach any net, engine or other device to any anchor, or fix the same in any manner so as to cross any part of the River Thames.

(2.) Lay night hooks or night lines of any description whatever, or any fixed hooks or lines by night or day above Kew Bridge.

11. On and after the 1st day of January, 1883, every person following the business of a fisherman on the River Thames, or who shall keep to be let for hire for fishing in the River Thames any boat, punt, or vessel, shall cause his name and place of abode to be duly registered in a book to be kept for that purpose by the Secretary to the Conservators of the River Thames, at their office in London, which is now situate at 41, Trinity-square, Tower-hill, and every such person shall pay one shilling for every registry of each boat, punt, or vessel, and on every registry the Secretary to the said Conservators shall deliver a number for each boat, punt, or vessel to such person, and such person shall cause to be painted and kept in legible characters of not less than two inches long and broad in proportion on the stern, and on each bow of each boat, punt, or vessel such number, together with his name and place of abode, so as to be plainly seen in the day-time, and if such person shall neglect to cause such boat, punt, or vessel to be duly registered, or such number, together with his name and place of abode to be painted and preserved in legible characters as aforesaid, or shall wilfully suffer the same to be altered or defaced, and if not renewed he shall be liable to a penalty for a breach of these bye-laws, and it shall not be lawful for any person following the business of a fisherman on the River Thames, and having a boat, punt, or vessel for that purpose, or who shall keep a boat or boats, punts or vessels, to be let for hire for fishing, to use or let for hire for fishing any boat, punt, or vessel without having the same registered and his name and place of abode together with the registered number legibly painted thereon as hereinbefore mentioned.

12. No person shall put down in the River Thames, at the mouth of any creek, river, or backwater communicating with the River Thames, or running into the said river, or at any mill or sluice, any net or device whatever to stop, catch, or hinder the fish, or spawn, or fry of fish from coming into the said River Thames.

When a prohibited net, or engine, or other apparatus is seized under the provisions of the Acts, or any or either of them in such case made, or these bye-laws, the same may be burnt or otherwise destroyed by order of the justices before whom the same is brought without prejudice to the infliction of a penalty on, or other remedy against the person offending, in respect of such net, engine, or apparatus.

13. Nothing in these bye-laws shall prevent any person, provided he has the previous consent of the Conservators in writing under their common seal, from obtaining fish for the purposes of artificial propagation or scientific purposes, or from having in his possession salmon roe or trout roe for any of those purposes, or from taking or attempting to take salmon or trout when spawning, or near the spawning beds.

14. Nothing in these bye-laws, except the provisions relative to the fence season, shall take away, or abridge the right, if any, of the owner or occupier of a private fishery, if any, or any person having authority in writing from any such owner or occupier to do any of the following things within the limits of such private fishery only: that is to fish for, or to take or attempt to take fish and eels by means of nets commonly called cast nets and crayfish nets, or by grig or ground weels for eels, or by night lines, or by means of eel bucks or stages, so far only as

the same or any of them can be legally used irrespective of these bye-laws. Provided that on a special license being obtained from the Conservators in writing, under their common seal, and not otherwise, such owners or occupiers, or persons having authority as aforesaid, may in such private fishery only take fish by means of a net commonly called a hoop net, having a mesh of not less than two inches from knot to knot when wet, or eight inches all round, and not being more than six yards long, or by means of a net commonly called a drag net, and having a mesh of not less than two inches from knot to knot when wet, or eight inches all round.

15. Any person committing any breach of or in any way infringing any of these bye-laws other than and except catching or attempt to catch or kill any fresh water fish during the fence season shall be liable to a penalty of, and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding, £5, and for catching or attempting to catch or kill any fresh water fish during such fence season shall be liable on a first conviction to a penalty of, and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding, 40s., and on a second or any subsequent conviction to a penalty of and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding, £5, which said penalties respectively shall be recovered, enforced, and applied according to the provisions of "The Thames Acts, 1857 to 1878," and of the statutes in such case made and provided.—Dated this 15th day of February, 1883.
