REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command, The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS Part 1. (section 5) of the Explosives Act, 1875 (hereinafter referred to as the Act), prohibits the keeping of gunpowder in an unauthorised place, but such prohibition is to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's expressly declared not to extend to a person keeping for his private use and not for sale gunpowder to an amount not exceeding on the same premises 30 lbs.:

And whereas by Part II. (section 39) of the Act it is declared that, subject to the provisions subsequently in such Part II. contained, Part I. of the Act relating to gunpowder shall apply to every other description of explosive in like manner as if the provisions of such Part I. were re-enacted in such Part II., with the substitution of that description of explosive for gunpowder:

And whereas by Part II. (section 40, subsection 4) of the Act it is provided that for the maximum amount of gunpowder limited by Part I. of the Act to be kept for private use and not for sale, there shall be substituted in the case of explosives other than gunpowder the following amounts, viz.:—

(a.) Where such explosive consists of safety cartridges made with gunpowder, an amount containing not more than five times the maximum amount of gunpowder above mentioned; and

(b.) In the case of any other explosive, the amount prescribed by Order in Council:

And whereas by Part II. (section 43) of the Act it is provided that Her Majesty from time to time, by Order in Council, may prohibit, either absolutely or except in pursuance of a license of the Secretary of State under the Act, or may subject to conditions and restrictions the manufacture, keeping, importation, conveyance, and sale, or any of them, of any explosive which is of so dangerous a character that in the judgment of Her Majesty it is expedient for the public safety to make such Order.

And whereas the explosives by this Order prohibited from being kept for private use without a certificate are of so dangerous a character, that in the judgment of Her Majesty it is expedient for

the public safety to make this Order.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the abovementioned provisions of the Act Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and prescribe, with respect to the keeping of explosive for private use and not for sale, as follows:

(1.) There shall not be kept for private use any explosive which is not an authorised explosive, or which is an authorised explosive of the fifth

(fulminate) class.

(2.) Subject to the exceptions hereinafter contained, there shall not be kept for private use any authorised explosive other than such amounts of gunpowder and of safety cartridges made with gunpowder, and such percussion caps, safety fuzes for blasting, and railway fog signals, as are authorised by the Act, and such amount as hereinafter mentioned of the following explosives; that is to say.

(a.) Cartridges for small arms which are not safety cartridges, and are made with gunpowder, if containing not more than five

pounds of gunpowder;

(b.) Cartridges for cannon or blasting made with gunpowder, and not containing their own means of ignition, if containing no larger amount of gunpowder than is for the time being allowed to be kept for private

(c.) Fireworks, if not more than five pounds in weight, or to an unlimited amount if obtained for immediate use and kept for a period not exceeding fourteen days in a safe and suitable place, and with all due precautions for the public safety.

(3.) The exceptions from the foregoing provision are as follows:—

(a.) If a person who requires any authorised explosive (other than one of the fulminate class) for any industrial, agricultural, sporting, or other special purpose, obtains a certificate under this Order that he is a fit person to keep the same, he may during the continuance of the certificate, keep for private use, for the purpose specified in the certificate, and not for sale, the explosive specified in the certificate to an amount not exceeding, whether or not contained in cartridges, ten pounds and in the case of detonators, not exceeding one hundred in number;

(b.) The certificate under this Order may be in the form set out in the Schedule to this Order, and may be granted by the chief officer of police or by some person authorised in writing in that behalf by such chief officer, or in case of the refusal or failure to grant any such certificate, or of the revocation of any such certificate, then may be granted by a court of summary jurisdiction for the county or borough (having a separate court of quarter sessions) in which the applicant resides, sitting at some court-house or place appointed for the administration of justice by such court and may be under the hand of the clerk of such court.

(c.) Provided that the certificate shall not continue after the end of one year from the date thereof, or after the grant of another certificate under this Order to the holder thereof, nor after any earlier time at which the certificate, if granted by the chief officer of police or some officer authorised by that chief officer, is revoked by the the chief officer, or if granted by a court of summary jurisdiction, is revoked by a court of summary jurisdiction acting for the same county or

borough.

(4.) The amount of any kind of explosive kept for private use by a person in pursuance of this Order shall be in substitution for the like amount of any other kind of explosive (whether gunpowder or not) which might otherwise be kept by him in pursuance of the Act or this Order, and the amount of such other kind of explosive shall be reduced accordingly; provided, that if the explosive so kept is in any other form than that of cartridges for small arms, the explosive of which the amount is so reduced shall be some explosive other than safety cartridges made with gunpowder.

(5.)—(a.) The expression "authorised explosive" in this Order means any explosive for the time being authorised to be manufactured for general sale or to be imported for general sale, whether with or without a license.

(b.) The expression "chief officer of police" in this Order means the chief officer of police within the meaning of the Act, for a police district in which the applicant for or holder of a certificate resides.

(c.) A reference in this Order to any particular explosive shall be construed with reference to the Act and to the classification of explosives contained in an Order in Council (No. 1) of the 5th day of August, 1875, made in pursuance of section 106 of the Act.

(d.) Subject as aforesaid, this Order shall be construed in like manner as if it were part of the Act.

(6.) This Order shall come into operation at the expiration of ten clear days after it has been published in the "London Gazette," with the following qualifications:—

(a.) Until the expiration of twenty-four clear

days after such publication any person may keep for any industrial, mining, or sporting purpose, the like amount of explosive which he might keep if he had obtained a certificate from the chief officer of police.

(b.) Any certificate may be given or other act done for bringing this Order into effect before the expiration of the said ten days.

(c.) If a person has applied to the chief officer of police for a certificate before this Order comes into operation he shall not be liable to any penalty for doing anything which he might do if he had obtained such certificate, until the chief officer has refused in writing.

to grant the certificate applied for, or until

the expiration of one month from the time

of such application, whichever first happens. (7.) On this Order coming into operation, the Order in Council (No. 8) of the 27th day of November, 1875, relating to the keeping of explosives for private use and not for sale, shall be revoked, without 'prejudice to any prosecution or punishment for the breach thereof. And whereas the explosives by this Order prohibited from being kept in registered premises are of so dangerous a character that in the judgment of Her Majesty it is expedient for the public safety to make this Order:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the abovementioned provisions of the Act, Her Majesty is

pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and prescribe, with respect to the keeping of explosives in registered premises as follows:—

(1.) There shall not be kept on premises registered for mixed explosives any explosive which is not an authorised explosive or which is an authorised explosive of the fifth (fulminate) class,

- (2).—(a.) There shall not be kept on any premises registered for mixed explosives any explosive (other than gunpowder, safety cartridges made with gunpowder, cartridges or charges for cannon or blasting made with gunpowder and not containing within themselves their own means of ignition, percussion caps, safety fuzes, or fireworks), except in pursuance of a certificate under this Order, that the occupier of the registered premises is a fit person to keep, during the continuance of the certificate, such of the explosives allowed by the above-recited Order to be kept on registered premises, as are specified in the certificate.
- (b.) The certificate under this Order may be in the form set out in the Schedule to this Order and may be granted by the chief officer of police, or by some person authorised in writing in that behalf by such chief officer, or in case of the refusal or failure to grant any such certificate, or of the revocation of any such certificate, then may be granted by a court of summary jurisdiction for the county or borough (having a separate court of quarter sessions) in which the premises are situate, sitting at some court-house or place appointed for the administration of justice by such court, and may be under the hand of the clerk of such court.
- (c.) (2.) (a.) There shall not be kept in any store licensed for mixed explosives any explosive other than gunpowder, safety cartridges made with gunpowder, cartridges or charges for cannon or blasting made with gunpowder and not containing within themselves their own means of ignition, percussion caps, safety fuzes or fireworks) except in pursuance of a certificate under this Order that the occupier of the store is a fit person to keep, during the continuance of the certificate, such of the explosives allowed by the above recited Order to be kept in a store, as are specified in the certificate.

(b.) The certificate under this Order may be in the form set out in the Schedule to this Order, and may be granted by the chief officer of police or by some person authorised in writing in that behalf by such chief officer, or in case of the refusal or failure to grant any such certificate, or of the revocation of any such certificate, then may be granted by a court of summary jurisdiction for the county or borough (having a separate court of quarter sessions) in which the store is situate, sitting at some court-house or place appointed for the administration of justice by such court, and may be under the hand of the clerk of such court

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Areas (namely),—(1.) in the parishes of Llangwyfan, Llanfaelog, and Llanbeulan, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on or towards the east by the high-road leading from Gwalchmai Upper village past Talyllyn Chapel to Aberffraw, on the south partly by the London and North-Western Railway and partly by the high-road leading from Tycroes Station to Bryndu village, on the west by the high-road leading from Bryndu village through Pencorneisiog as far as Llainwen, and on or towards the north by the high-road leading from the last-mentioned road by Llainwen past Tyddyn-y-gwair and Ddrydwy to Carreg Cafal Cross-roads; (2.) in the parishes of Llandyfrydog, and Llanfihangel-tre'r-Beirdd, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on or towards the east by the road lending past Tfcram Lwyd and Felin Esgob in a southerly direction to Menaddwyn, and on the south and west by the road leading from Menaddwyn past Clorach and Llandyfrydog Church and Bodneithior until it forms a junction with the first-mentioned road; (3.) in the parishes of Trefdraeth, Llangadwaladr, Aberffraw, and Cerrigceinwen, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on or towards the east by the highroad leading from Cefn Cwmmwd to Bodorgan Station, on the south partly by the same road and partly by the road leading westward from Bodorgan Station, on or towards the west by the highroad leading from the last-mentioned road to Carregonen and thence to Tynybuarth and Penterfyn, and on or towards the north by the road leading from Penterfyn into the road first abovementioned; (4.) in the parish of Llanfair Pwllgwyn-gyll, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on the north-west by the high-road leading from Llanfair turnpike to Four Crosses, on the north-

[or being clerk of the court of | east by the highway leading from Four Crosses into the Holyhead and Shrewsbury-road, on the south by the Holyhead and Shrewsbury-road, and on the west by the road leading from the Holyhead and Shrewsbury-road near Llanfair Church to the first-mentioned road; (5.) all that part of the parish of Trefdraeth, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on the east by the parishes of Llangeinwen, and Newborough, on the north by the parish of Llangristiclus, and on the west by the high-road leading from near Henblas Lodge past Paradwys Chapel and Trefdraeth Church and Feiston to Hermon village, and on the south partly by a road leading from Hermon village to Malltraeth Sands and partly by Malltraeth Sands; (6.) in the parish of Holyhead, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on the north by the Steam Mill-road, on the east by the Old Post-road, on or towards the south partly by the Porth dafarch-road and partly by a cartway leading from the lastmentioned road to Mrs. Thomas Treseifion, and on the west by the high-road leading from the said Treseifion to the town of Holyhead; (7.) in the parish of Pentraeth, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on the north by the highway leading from Pentraeth to Beaumaris, on the east by a river which passes under Glanygors Bridge on the said road, on the south-west by the highway leading from Menai Bridge to Pentraeth, and on the west by a private-road leading from Plasgwyn Lodge on the last-mentioned road to Plasgwyn Lodge on the first-mentioned road; (8.) in the parishes of Aberffraw, and Llangadwaladr, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on the west by the high-road leading from Aberffraw village to Tanyllyn, on the north by the high-road leading from the lastmentioned road past Tymawr towards Trefdraeth to a point where the said road passes under the London and North-Western Railway, on the east by a road leading from the last-mentioned point in a southerly direction past Llyncoron, and on the south by the road leading from Llangadwaladr Church across Aberffraw Common to Aberffraw village; (9.) in the parish of Holyhead, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on or towards the north by the road leading from the Llaingoch-road past Carreg Lwyd and Mill Bank to Stryd, on the east by the road leading from Holyhead past Stryd to Penrhosfeilw, and on the south and west by the southerly and westerly boundary of Gors Wen farm and by the southerly and westerly boundary of land in the occupation of Mrs. Panton; and (10.) in the parish of Llanidan, in the county of Anglesey, bounded on the north-east by a road leading from Twlly clawdd to Rhosfawr, on the west and north-west by a road leading from Rhosfawr in a southerly direction to the boundary of Llanidan parish, on the south by a road running partly along the said boundary from Tredna to Tai Cochion, and on the east by a road running thence past Trefarthin to Twlly clawdd aforesaid, - which were declared by Orders of Council to be Areas infected with foot-andmouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those Areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order. cease to be Areas infected with foot-and-mouth

THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Berlin, enclosing the following translation of the Regulations which have been promulgated by the German Bundesrath, in accordance with section 2 of the Imperial Ordinance of the 6th ultimo, for prohibiting the indirect importation into Germany of pigs, pork, and sausages of American origin.

Notice.

In its sitting of the 11th of April, 1883, the Bundesrath gave its consent to the following regulations for carrying out the Imperial order relative to the prohibition of the importation of pigs, pork, sausages, &c., of American origin, of the 6th of March, 1883.

Regulations for putting into execution the Imperial order relative to the prohibition of the importation of pigs, pork, sausages, &c., of American origin, of the 6th of March, 1883.

1. When pigs, pork, including sides of bacon and sausages of all sorts, are imported from abroad, the non-American origin of the same is to be attested to by the certificate either

(a.) Of the German Consul appointed for the

foreign district concerned, or

(b.) Of the competent police authorities of the

land of origin.

In the latter case, (b.) the competency of the police authorities who certify must be specially attested by the German Consul (a). This attestation, however, will not be required for certificates of origin drawn up and attested to in accordance with the Treaty of February 25th, 1880, between this Empire and Austria-Hungary, as regards trade with that country.

If the certificates of origin are not drawn up in in German, the importer must in addition produce an officially certified German translation, should the authorities charged with the control of the importation or the preparation for the entry

require such.

The certificates of origin must not be drawn up more than thirty days before the arrival of the consignment at the German frontier; the certificates are to be given up to the Customs Office at the frontier where the goods enter, or to whatever authorities control the importation, and they will be retained by them.

2. In the importation of live pigs from abroad the certificates of origin must define as clearly as possible the number, kind, colour, and any other particular marks; it must further be especially certified that the animals were bred in (Austria-Hungary, Belgium, &c.), and that for the last 30 days before being sent to Germany they have been at a place within the district of the office certifying as to their origin, and the name of this place must be given.

In the importation of sucking-pigs (pigs of less than 10 kilo. weight) it will be sufficient in the certificate of origin to describe the number and kind, and also to certify that they were bred in

Austria-Hungary, Belgium, &c.).

3. In the importation of pork, &c., including sides of bacon and sausages of all kinds from abroad, a certificate must accompany the goods in which—

- (a.) The kind, the number of the cases, and the way in which they are packed and the address, must be given; larger pieces may be identified by the seal of the police authorities concerned; further
- (b.) The certificate must contain the name and residence of the merchant who prepared the goods in question, and an attestation that the residence of the merchant is within the district of the certifying (non-American) office; that the manufacturer has not occupied himself with using pigs, pork, and bacon of American origin, nor with the sale, purchase, or dealing in such articles of American origin; that the goods imported, finally, have been prepared from animals of non-American origin.
- 4. When no doubt exists that the authorities who have certified are the competent police authorities of the country of origin, the head of the Customs House at the frontier, or the authorities who control the importation, may decide to dispense with the consular attestation to the certificate of origin (No. 1).

In the importation of live pigs (No. 2) the certificate of origin (No. 1) may be dispensed with by the same authorities if no doubt exists that the animals come from other countries than America, especially if their non-American origin is proved by invoices, original bills of lading, and mercantile correspondence, or in any other manner.

- 5. The above regulations may be put out of force as regards frontier trade by the local governments; and no special proof of origin is required in cases where individual goods of the sort in question form part of the luggage of travellers.
- 6. If the requisite certificates of origin are wanting on the importation of the live-animals or goods in question, or if the certificates do not fulfil the existing regulations, or if the consignment does not correspond with the certificate of origin, and no sufficient explanation of the fact is given, the goods must be taken back in accordance with § 139 of the Customs Union Law, unless proceedings have to be taken for contravention of the prohibition of importation.
