

## (PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 21st day of June, 1883.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The limits of the following Place which is declared by order of the Local Authority for the county of Aberdeen, dated the twenty-second day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia (namely),—the byres on the farm of Drums, parish of Foveran, occupied by James H. Harvey, —are hereby extended so as to include the Place described in the Schedule to this Order, and the Place described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-second day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

A Place comprising the byres on the farm of Drums, parish of Foveran, in the county of Aberdeen, in the occupation of James H. Harvey, together with the two grass fields on the said farm known respectively by the names of Sannane and Hillfield.

## (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 22nd day of June, 1883.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—so much of the parishes of Kelham, and Averham, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east the Great North-road from Muskham Bridge to New-lane End, on the south from the said New-lane End an imaginary line by Gravel Pit field across the Kelham-road to Averham field, on the west from the said Averham field an imaginary line to Kelham Hills, and on the north an imaginary line from the said Kelham Hills to Muskham Bridge aforesaid,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the nineteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

(No. 147.)—ENGLAND—EAST COAST.

HUMBER RIVER ENTRANCE.

*Spurn Point High Light—Alteration in Character.*  
WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 258 (1), of 30th November, 1882, on intended alteration in the character of the high light exhibited at Spurn Point, northern side of Humber River Entrance.

The Trinity House, London, has given further notice, dated 24th May, 1883, that the following alteration has been made:—

The light is now occulting, with one occultation of three seconds' duration every half minute.

The low light will remain a fixed white light as heretofore.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 148.)—MEDITERRANEAN.

ITALY—WEST COAST.

*Gulf of Spezia—Lights Exhibited on West End of Breakwater, Light-Vessel withdrawn.*

THE Italian Government has given notice, that on 8th May, 1883, the lights (vertical) hitherto shown from the light-vessel moored off the western extremity of the breakwater, Gulf of Spezia, would be exhibited from the western head of the breakwater.

The upper light, fixed red, is elevated 42 feet above the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of five miles.

The lower light, fixed green, is elevated 38 feet above the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of about three miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses.

The lights are shown on a wooden mast; the keeper's dwelling (adjacent) on red supports, is coloured dark yellow.

During the day a red flag will be hoisted on the mast.

The light-vessel has been withdrawn.

NOTE.—The lights of the light-vessel near the eastern extremity of the breakwater, will shortly be exhibited from the eastern head of the breakwater.
